Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

2023 USBCs Hospitality

Although the Covid situation has improved, it is still out there. To keep our players and staff safe, we want to keep the number of people in the suite to a minimum at any one time. Our wonderful hostesses, Maya Alela and Marie-France Benoit will host you in our usual suite (Room 2321). Grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, except that on the first Monday and Tuesday, when lunch will be available in the Copper, Sage, and Maize meeting rooms off the corridor running from the hotel's front door to the back door.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, with some hot options. There will be individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. Maya & Marie-France will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available. We ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that container to take with you. Then, as quickly as you can, go someplace else to eat.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Hospitality Suite at all times. There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before selecting your food.

Lunch will be available in the hospitality suite from 2-4 (the first half of play each day ends at 2:15; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early.) There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit and berries. Also, all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators

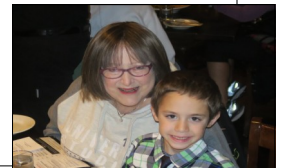

World Bridge News...

The **Bermuda Bowl**, **Venice Cup**, **d'Orsi Senior Bowl** and the **Wuhan Cup** are for national teams, respectively Open, Women, Seniors and Mixed, representing their countries, qualified from the 8 WBF Zonal Conferences.

The **World Transnational Open Teams** is open, without any qualification, to all teams, national or transnational, which want to participate, accordingly to the conditions of contest.

The **World Bridge Teams Championships**, the oldest WBF Championship, grew out of private initiatives principally by the late Norman Bach. The first world championship for the Bermuda Bowl was held in 1950, in Bermuda, 8 years before the World Bridge Federation itself was formed. After the first event of the series, the Bermuda Bowl developed into a regular challenge match between the USA and the winners of the European Championship, but in 1957 the contest widened to included teams representing other zones of the WBF.

In 1974, in Venice, Italy, a new event was launched, the Venice Cup. It started as a challenge match between women's teams from the USA and Italy (Europe 's representative) and today it is the equivalent of Bermuda Bowl for women, organized under the same laws and format.

A third series, the Senior Bowl, for senior players was added in 2001. Ernesto d'Orsi, Past President of the WBF and a member of the WBF Committee of Honor and the WBF Executive Council, presented the d'Orsi Seniors Trophy for the winners of this Championship at the World Teams Championships held in Brazil in 2009.

In March 2018 in Philadelphia the Executive Council added a fourth series for Mixed Teams starting from 2019 in Wuhan, China. This new event was named after the City of Wuhan which presented the prestigious trophy and provided, and will provide for the future editions, replicas for the winners.

Meet the Players

Chris Willenken's mother was in a generation where everyone in college knew "something" about the game. When he was a bored teenager, she said, "Hey, you know, you like all these other games, you really should check out this bridge game. Why don't you go get a book out of the library?"

Chris went to the library in the Poconos and checked out Charles Goren's big book of bridge, the 1953 edition. In his words, "that's how he learned to play four card majors and new fangled 1953 gadgets like negative doubles..." At the time, Chris believes he was 15 years old.

Chris was well accepted in the Poconos Bridge Club, a welcome young edition to the group. He remembers being very shy at the time and having his mother arrange games for him.

Chris made his way to the Manhattan Bridge Club where players like Blair Seidler, Lapt Chan were also young hot shots. Randy Lazarus was there too.

Some of Chris's best memories were remembering driving half an hour home from club games and sitting in the driveway for another half hour discussing hands from the game.

Chris used to play with Glenn Milgrim, a great player and junior mentor from the New England area. He played with Michael Rosenberg, a teammate of Chris's in this event on the Rosenthal team.

Chris claims that winning the Blue Ribbons is nice but it is "not a major." He contends that a three day pair event requires beating up on lots of little guys, whereas, winning an event like Reisinger requires beating up on truly great players.

Chris played with Eric Greco in the juniors. They didn't play in the Junior Trials "in the day" because ACBL used to run the Junior Trials opposite the major events in which they wished to play.

Today, Chris is a great player in his own right.

He is part of the great Berkowitz family, married to David and Lisa's daughter, Dana.

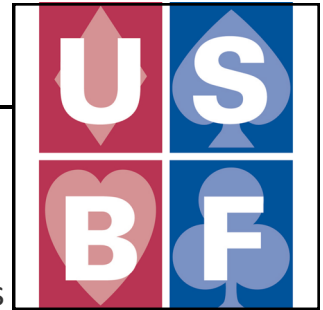

Who am I? My name is Samantha Punch, Professor of Sociology at the University of Stirling, UK. I lead the international work of BAMSA.

What is BAMSA? *Bridge: A MindSport for All* (BAMSA) is a research project working collaboratively with bridge organisations to increase the number of players and transform the image of the mindsport.

BAMSA believes that bridge can be promoted as a potential solution to tackle big societal issues of social isolation, loneliness, mental health problems, inclusivity and healthy ageing.

BAMSA's new study

The new project aims to develop academic evidence that demonstrates the skills and wide-ranging benefits that bridge, as a mindsport, can offer young people. The study will investigate the benefits and challenges of teaching bridge in schools. The goal is to encourage schools to take bridge as seriously as chess, and mindsport education as seriously as physical education.

How can donating help?

The funding pays for the researchers to interview school teachers, bridge teachers, pupils and parents to explore what helps and hinders learning bridge. Knockout Day 2

Board 13 was a clear misfit.
In the Closed Room of USA1 Millens v Lewis, it was an up and down bumpy ride for North/South that had a happy ending.

Rimstedt got the expected answer when she inquired: Her partner's suit was spades. She was surprised though when he showed a max! With her 18 HCP she was pretty sure there was a game in the cards.

Her best decision at this point would have been to pass 3NT. 3NT cannot be defeated. She could envision many different hands that would be consistent with the bidding that would make 4S solid and 3NT was no certainty.

Sandra bid 4S and when Molson doubled, Sandra was startled awake and pulled to 4NT.

Korbel, knowing that partner had the spade suit scrambled, holding the DA and knowing that neither hearts nor clubs were breaking, doubled.

4NT can be easily defeated... but to legitimately do it, Korbel needed to lead HIS suit, not partner's... not easy to do on this auction. A heart lead gives the defense time to knock out the ace and king before they are out of entries... and since East hold three hearts, there is no problem with communication to West's hand.

Unfortunately for Korbel, he tracked the singleton S3 he believed Janice's double suggested. Molson won the SA and tracked the D3. Rimstedt played the king and Korbel won the singleton ace. He played the C3 and Rimstedt inserted the nine which held. She played dummy's last diamond. Molson split her JT and Sandra won the queen. She knocked out the DJ and claimed 10 tricks... +810, a little seen score!

At the other table, Paul Lewis opened 2S. Linda asked for a feature and Paul showed one in clubs. Linda bid 4S and they played it there.

Millens led the DJ. Huang won his singleton ace. He played the C3 back, Millens ruffing. Millens played a small diamond and Shan ruffed with his singleton spade. A second club ruff followed and Millens waited patiently for her two remaining trump tricks. Contract down 3 vulnerable tricks. 15 IMPs to Millens

In the other USA match, both tables reached 4S N/S, one doubled and one not... both failed two tricks... 7 IMPs to Wildavsky.

Both tables in the Dinkin/Pollack match in USA2 played Board 22 in 5C.

Dinkin made it easy on Caprera when he led the HA followed by a low spade. Caprera won the SA and played a club to dummy. He cashed the HK, discarding his losing spade.

He ruffed a spade, played a club to dummy, ruffed another spade, played a club to dummy and ruffed the last spade. He conceded the DQ and took his 11 winners!

At the other table in this match, Robbins led a small spade. She won the SA, pulled trump, and led a heart toward dummy's king. Robbins won his ace and cashed his high spade. Robbins exited his hand with the H5 and Sobel needed to take the Chinese finesse in diamonds to succeed. It is always unfortunate when the best play fails and the lesser play succeeds. Sobel played the DA and took the straight finesse. Contract down one! 12 IMPs to Pollack

Parker/Cappelletti also swung 12 IMPs, however the it bore no resemblance to Pollack/Dinkin. In the Open Room, Adam Grossack and Parker took the 5H save over 5C at favorable. They had the right idea since 5C can be made. They went down three for -500. Mike Cappelletti led the D9 to his wife's ace. Allison cashed the CQ and played a diamond to Mike's king. Mike cashed the SA and played a spade to Grossack's king. Grossack knocked out the HK, ruffed the spade return, and claimed a total of 8 tricks. Contract down 3.

In the other room of this match, Rubenstein/Tebha had a mostly unimpeded auction to 6D.

4NT was not alerted or explained and from the final contract, it is evident that Tebha thought it was looking for a minor suit slam with Rubenstein holding at least 4-4 in clubs and diamonds.

It could have worked... just not on this hand! Like Dinkin, Cohler led the HA and shifted, but 6D was doomed and Cohler could have led a cigar! When the heart held, Gary shifted to this singleton club.

1C=2+

2C=nat, forcing 1 round

3H=splinter

Tebha won the club in dummy and piched her losing spade on the HK. Tebha won the king, cashed the HA discarding a spade, and played the DA.

She hooked the DJ and when that lost, she conceded down one.

In the USA1 SemiFinal matches, this board swung a total of 27 IMPs.

West opened 4S and found a great diamond suit in dummy... too bad he can't enjoy it! An unfriendly South has both the heart ace over the king and the spade king over the queen.

Two Norths took the attitude, "Why should West suffer when I can suffer instead??" They overcalled their 6-card club suit at the 5 level, got doubled and played it there.

No one was successful in any contract.

Of interest, is the Frequency Chart. Note that South is a much better declarer than North. In clubs, South takes one more trick... In Diamonds, South takes four more tricks... In hearts, South takes two more tricks... In spades, South takes three more tricks... And the piece de resistance, in no-trump, South takes eight more tricks!!

Those are really big variances and if nothing else, make for interesting reading!!
