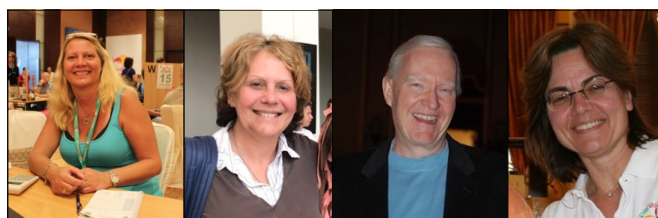

Try to Solve This Pickleball Puzzle

Kenny, Abby, and Ned got together for a round-robin pickleball tournament, where, as usual, the winner stays on after each game to play the person who sat out that game. At the end of their pickleball afternoon, Abby is exhausted, having played the last seven straight games. Kenny, who is less winded, tallies up the games played:

Kenny played **eight** games

Abby played **12** games

Ned played **14** games

Who won the fourth game against whom?

How many total games were played?

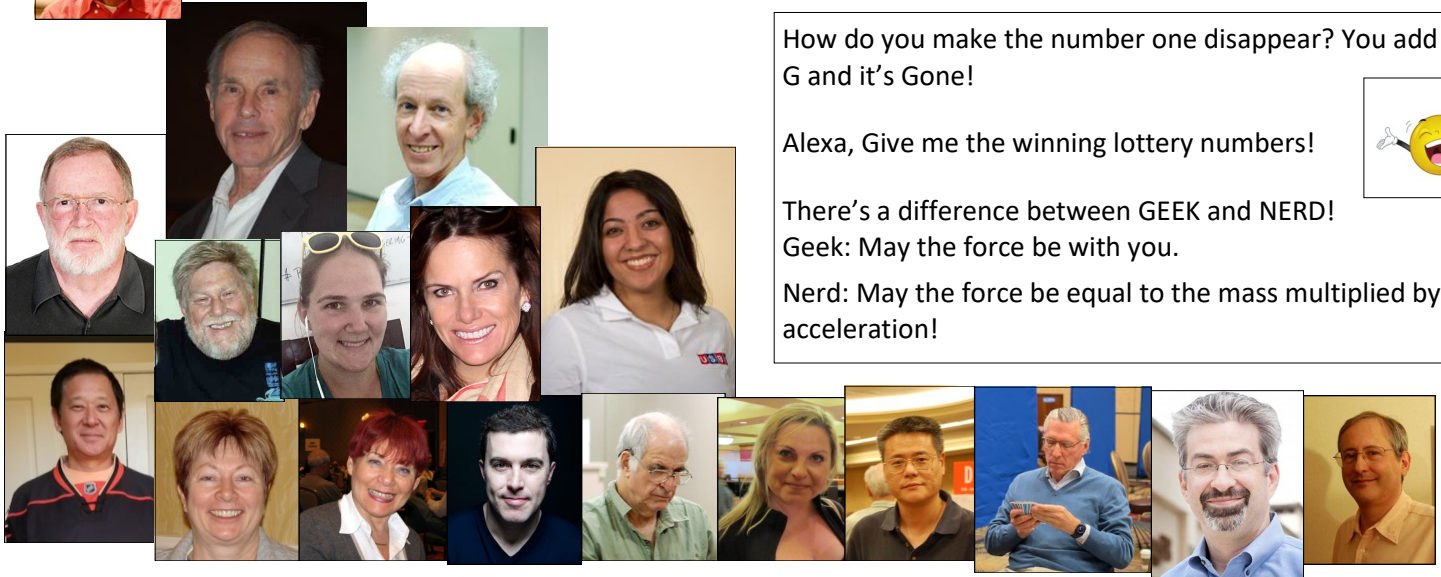
Answer:

Solution

First, we need to figure out how many total games were played. We get 34 when we add up the game totals, but since two players play each game, there were 17 games played. Now, with a brief insight, the solution quickly unravels. The insight is that in a three-person round-robin, every player plays at least every other game. Since 17 total games were played, every player must have played at least eight games. And, in fact, since Kenny played exactly eight games, we can infer which ones, as highlighted below:

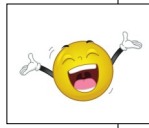
Now, had Kenny won any of his games, we would have seen him play two games in a row. Instead, it must be the case that he lost every game he played. Thus, we can conclude that Kenny lost the fourth game. But against whom? Well, we know that Abby and Ned played against each other in every game that Kenny didn't play, which are all the unshaded squares above. In addition, we know Abby played the last seven straight games. This means we know for sure that Abby played games 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17, which amounts to 12 games, accounting for all of her games. So Ned must have played all other games against Kenny, such that Ned beat Kenny in the fourth game.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

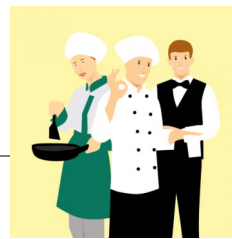

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

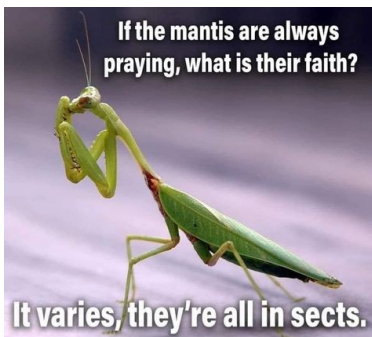

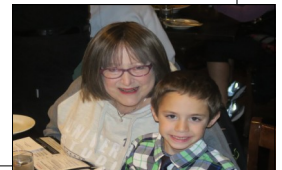

The total Entry Fee for a Team is the sum of the 4 highest paying players, i.e. a maximum of € 1,400 respectively € 1,000.



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The **Bermuda Bowl**, **Venice Cup**, **d'Orsi Senior Bowl** and the **Wuhan Cup** are for national teams, respectively Open, Women, Seniors and Mixed, representing their countries, qualified from the 8 WBF Zonal Conferences.

The **World Transnational Open Teams** is open, without any qualification, to all teams, national or transnational, which want to participate, accordingly to the conditions of contest.

The **World Bridge Teams Championships**, the oldest WBF Championship, grew out of private initiatives principally by the late Norman Bach. The first world championship for the Bermuda Bowl was held in 1950, in Bermuda, 8 years before the World Bridge Federation itself was formed. After the first event of the series, the Bermuda Bowl developed into a regular challenge match between the USA and the winners of the European Championship, but in 1957 the contest widened to included teams representing other zones of the WBF.

In 1974, in Venice, Italy, a new event was launched, the Venice Cup. It started as a challenge match between women's teams from the USA and Italy (Europe 's representative) and today it is the equivalent of Bermuda Bowl for women, organized under the same laws and format.

A third series, the Senior Bowl, for senior players was added in 2001. Ernesto d'Orsi, Past President of the WBF and a member of the WBF Committee of Honor and the WBF Executive Council, presented the d'Orsi Seniors Trophy for the winners of this Championship at the World Teams Championships held in Brazil in 2009.

In March 2018 in Philadelphia the Executive Council added a fourth series for Mixed Teams starting from 2019 in Wuhan, China. This new event was named after the City of Wuhan which presented the prestigious trophy and provided, and will provide for the future editions, replicas for the winners.

Who am I? My name is Samantha Punch, Professor of Sociology at the University of Stirling, UK. I lead the international work of BAMSA.

What is BAMSA? *Bridge: A MindSport for All* (BAMSA) is a research project working collaboratively with bridge organisations to increase the number of players and transform the image of the mindsport.

BAMSA believes that bridge can be promoted as a potential solution to tackle big societal issues of social isolation, loneliness, mental health problems, inclusivity and healthy ageing.

BAMSA's new study

The new project aims to develop academic evidence that demonstrates the skills and wide-ranging benefits that bridge, as a mindsport, can offer young people. The study will investigate the benefits and challenges of teaching bridge in schools. 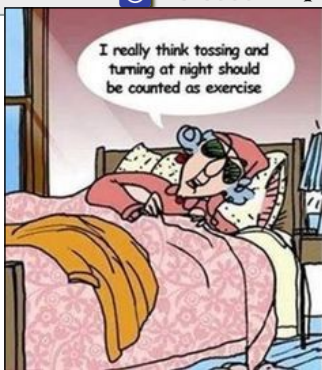
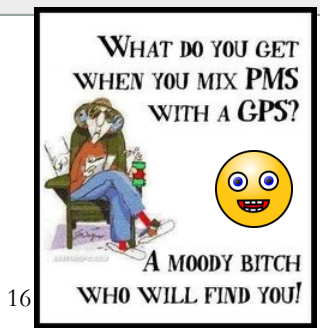

It's ironic that immediately following the Board where every table used a different auction and arrived in a different suit, the next Board was as flat as it gets! Same contract, same declarer, same opening lead (down to the same spot), same result.)

You just can't make up things like this!!



Board 5 is “A Tale of Two Tables” in the Women’s.

First, in Cappelletti/Wittes, Rozanne Pollack was the only declarer to succeed in 3NT... and three of the four tables in the Women’s played it there! What was the difference at that table?

(Ed. Note: This is for Jack Oest, USBF Recorder) What saved Rozanne and Cheri was their opening 10-12 NT!!!

All the other tables in the Women’s played from West where the inevitable lead from North was a spade... DOOMED!

At Pollack’s table, after the above auction, Allison Cappelletti made what looks like the “best” lead based on the information she has: She led the CJ (Rusinow). On a spade lead, declarer has no chance! On the lead of the CJ, Roseanne won the ace, knocked out the DA, and even though Cappelletti found the spade lead at this point, it was too late. Pollack collected one spade, four hearts, one diamond and three clubs. 10 IMPs to Wittes

The other tale is how Tebha and Botta got to one of the two truly makeable games: 4H in their Moysian fit. (Note 5D is makeable too)

Botta opened 1D; Tebha responded 1H; **Botta raised with THREE!**

Botta had a ruffing value in spades and playing a Moysian with ruffs coming in the short hand is frequently right.

In this case, it was irrelevant because both East and West hold doubleton spades but the 3-card raise was still successful!

McCallum led the SK which Tebha ducked. Karen shifted to the C7 to the 8, J, A. The D9 went to the king and ace. Baker returned the C4, won by Tebha’s C6! Tebha pulled trump in four rounds. She finessed the DT and claimed 11 tricks!

There was a 14 IMP swing on Board 9 in the Women's. At three tables, declarer played in 4H going down one or two. At one table, declarer played in 4HX and made it!

How did it make?

It is easy to see how 4H could ... and should ... fail. The defense is entitled to two heart tricks, the DA and the CK.

In Baker/Cole, Baker opened an aggressive 2S in third seat on a 5-card suit to the queen.

Her opponents, Tebha and Botta, paid no heed and drove to 4H. McCallum doubled and they played it there.

McCallum led her stiff SJ. Tebha won the ace. Tebha cashed the HA, actually allowing the defense an opportunity to defeat the contract TWO tricks as long as Baker shifts to a club when she wins her DA.

Tebha played a heart to dummy's queen, McCallum ducking. The DJ was won with Baker's ace and Baker played the S9 instead of the aforementioned club!! The S9 was an odd play from the Q into the KT tenace in dummy, but the defense could still recover if McCallum trumps the spade, cashes a trump, and exits with a diamond. Eventually she will score her CK for the setting trick. McCallum, apparently hoping declarer would be forced to take a club hook into her hand so she could draw both of dummy's trump, discarded a diamond! Oops!!

Declarer played two rounds of diamonds and McCallum realized she was endplayed unless partner had the CQ. She ruffed the second diamond, played the HK and led a low club into declarer's AQ! Contract making.

Live by the sword, die by the sword... sometimes when you open a bad 5-card weak two, partner is the one who gets fooled!

Stan set out to work through it himself. After a couple of frustrating hours, he believed he'd solved it but it was not is correct. He worked another hour and figured it out!

Declarer wins the DA and trumps a diamond in dummy. East DOES NOT overruff (discards a spade).

If East overruffs and returns a trump, declarer can win the trump in hand and trump a second diamond with the HK. They can then cross to hand with the CK and run trumps.

The 4-card end position would look like this:

Spoiler Alert: Do NOT read on if you want to solve it yourself!

When East doesn't overruff, declarer must cross to the CA and trump another diamond low. If East doesn't overruff that trick, declarer has 12 tricks (6 hearts, 2 clubs, one spade, one diamond and 2 ruffs.)

Therefore, East must overruff and exit a club or a heart. Declarer now runs the trumps to produce the position above.

There is no hope for the minor suit slam.

A heart lead gains one trick for N/S and they can sit back and rely on the unfavorable trump lie to score their Qxx of clubs!

It is about as unlucky as one can get!

In Cole/Baker, Molson and Disa got to 5C and made it.

At the other table where Tebha and Botta were West and East respectively, Tebha bid and rebid diamonds at the 1, 3, 4, and 5 levels until Botta bowed out gracefully. The 7-0 did not prove a pleasant place to play. Declarer had to lose two hearts, a spade and diamond from the start. 13 IMPs to Baker

Board 21 explains why South is always declarer in the newspapers. Whether you play in clubs, diamonds or NT, South takes more tricks (see frequency table below!)

At the actual tables, there was a 12 IMP swing in each match when one table bid game and the other bid slam. The slams either made or went down while the games all made.

In the Open Room of Cole/Baker, 6D had no play from North when Molson led a spade through the king from her queen to her partner's AJ.

6C from South will make in any case. Bjerkan led the SA. Declarer pulled trump and claimed.
