There are 100 lockers that line the main hallway of Chelm High School. Every night, the school principal makes sure all the lockers are closed so that there will be an orderly start to the next day. One day, 100 mischievous students decide that they will play a prank.

The students all meet before school starts and line up. The first student then walks down the hallway, and opens every locker. The next student follows by closing every other locker (starting at the second locker). Student 3 then goes to every third locker (starting with the third) and opens it if it's closed, and closes it if it's open. Student 4 follows by opening every fourth locker if it's closed and closing it if it's open. This goes on and on until Student 100 finally goes to the hundredth locker. **When the principal arrives later in the morning, which lockers does she find open?**

Hint

Make sure you pay attention to all of the factors.

Answer to puzzle above:

The key here is to consider which students will open or shut any particular locker. Let's take an example of locker 24. Student 1 will open it, since student 1 opens every locker. Student 2 will then close it, since student 2 closes every even locker and 24 is even. Student 3 will open it and then student 4 will shut it, since 24 is a multiple of both 3 and 4. Student 5 will pass it by since 24 is not a multiple of 5.

This example makes it clear that each student will change the status of all lockers that have a number that is a multiple of the student's number. Conversely, every locker will have its status changed by the students that are numbered by one of the locker's factors. Thus, locker 24 will have its status changed by students 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 12, and 24.

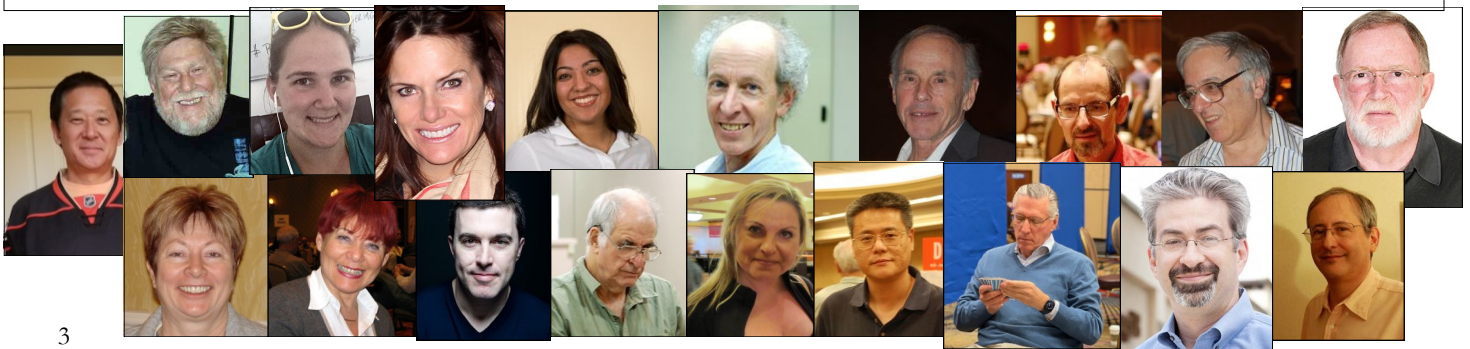
Now, how does this lead us to figure out which lockers are opened at the end? Locker 1, which has one factor, will clearly be open at the end, since the only student who touches it is the first student, who opens it. Locker 2, with two factors, will be closed, since the only two students to touch it are student 1, who opens it, and then student 2, who closes it.

Locker 3, also with two factors, will also be closed at the end. On the other hand, locker 4, which has three factors (1, 2, and 4), will be open, shut, and then open again. This line of thinking leads us to the conclusion: Only those lockers with an odd number of factors will be left open at the end of the prank.

So which numbers have an odd number of factors?

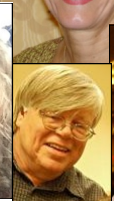
Consider that a factor is an integer that, when multiplied by another integer, produces the number of interest. Thus, factors are always paired with "another integer." For instance, the factors of 24 are paired in the following way: (1, 24), (2, 12), (3, 8), (4, 6). Since factors come in pairs, most numbers have an even number of factors. **The only exception occurs when factors are paired with themselves.**

Let's look at the factor "pairs" for 16: (1, 16), (2, 8), (4, 4). In this case, 4 is paired with itself to produce the number 16. Thus, 16 has an odd number of factors: 1, 2, 4, 8, 16. Factors are only ever paired with themselves in the case of perfect squares, which means that perfect squares are the only numbers with an odd number of factors! **Therefore, the lockers that are left open are: 1, 4, 9, 16, 25, 36, 49, 64, 81, and 100.**

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list. Push every button and enjoy!

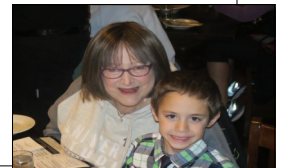

The total Entry Fee for a Team is the sum of the 4 highest paying players, i.e. a maximum of € 1,400 respectively € 1,000.



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The **Bermuda Bowl**, **Venice Cup**, **d'Orsi Senior Bowl** and the **Wuhan Cup** are for national teams, respectively Open, Women, Seniors and Mixed, representing their countries, qualified from the 8 WBF Zonal Conferences.

The **World Transnational Open Teams** is open, without any qualification, to all teams, national or transnational, which want to participate, accordingly to the conditions of contest.

The **World Bridge Teams Championships**, the oldest WBF Championship, grew out of private initiatives principally by the late Norman Bach. The first world championship for the Bermuda Bowl was held in 1950, in Bermuda, 8 years before the World Bridge Federation itself was formed. After the first event of the series, the Bermuda Bowl developed into a regular challenge match between the USA and the winners of the European Championship, but in 1957 the contest widened to included teams representing other zones of the WBF.

In 1974, in Venice, Italy, a new event was launched, the Venice Cup. It started as a challenge match between women's teams from the USA and Italy (Europe 's representative) and today it is the equivalent of Bermuda Bowl for women, organized under the same laws and format.

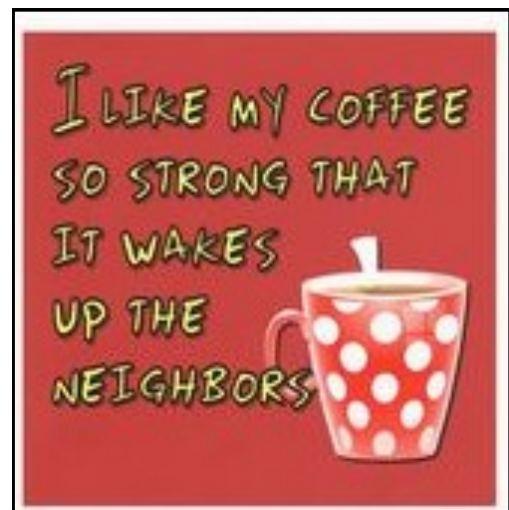
A third series, the Senior Bowl, for senior players was added in 2001. 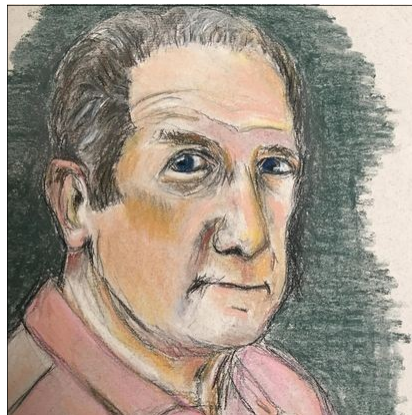

Mitch is married to Jody. They live in LA. In his spare time, he enjoys fantasy league baseball.



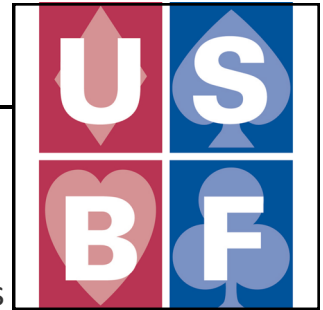

Who am I? My name is Samantha Punch, Professor of Sociology at the University of Stirling, UK. I lead the international work of BAMSA.

What is BAMSA? *Bridge: A MindSport for All* (BAMSA) is a research project working collaboratively with bridge organisations to increase the number of players and transform the image of the mindsport.

BAMSA believes that bridge can be promoted as a potential solution to tackle big societal issues of social isolation, loneliness, mental health problems, inclusivity and healthy ageing.

BAMSA's new study

The new project aims to develop academic evidence that demonstrates the skills and wide-ranging benefits that bridge, as a mindsport, can offer young people. The WBF, together with the platform providers, BBO and Funbridge, will have a pavilion at the Free-To-Play Zone ("FTPZ") that the IOC is providing, June 22-25, for a limited number (10-15) of its recognised "International Federations" during the OEW. It is a great achievement for Bridge to have been selected to exhibit our progress in the field of electronic sports.

The FTPZ will be a large exposition at the Suntec Convention Centre, and tens of thousands of visitors are expected. It is an important opportunity to showcase Bridge as a modern sport, adopting the latest technology, including Artificial Intelligence.

At our pavilion, we will live-stream tournaments on both platforms with local and international competitors, provide "Minibrige" demonstrations, show play on Lovebridge tablets and various other promotional activities. Many activities can be followed online on YouTube, and possibly Twitch.

Leading up to the tournaments in Singapore we are arranging qualification events on both BBO and Funbridge.

In the Closed Room of Segment 5 of the 2023 Senior USBC USA Stage 1 match between Lusky and Beatty, play was curtailed after thirteen of the scheduled fifteen boards in order to start Segment 6 on time. The North-South pair, Jim Foster – Mark Jones (Lusky) took 78 minutes of pair time, and the East-West pair, Steve Beatty-Fred Stewart (Beatty) took 46 minutes of pair time. The Conditions of Contest (relevant sections below) call for cross-imping of the curtailed boards, and call for minutes to be added to the team’s excess time; the amount of excess time section, however, does not include what to do to calculate the time when boards are curtailed. The TD staff made the interpretation that the pair’s time should be calculated per board, rather than per fifteen board segment; therefore Foster-Jones’s 78 minutes was 26 minutes more than their allotted four minutes per board (rather than 18 minutes more than 60 minutes per fifteen board segment).

The Lusky team appealed this interpretation of the conditions of contest.

The committee unanimously agreed with the interpretation made by the TD staff and felt that an interpretation of “always sixty minutes” would be both unworkable and provide perverse incentives.

Senior Appeal 1

XII.TIME

A. General Principle

In an electronic environment, with complete bidding, play and time records, each pair will be given an amount of time for each segment of play and the pair’s team will be penalized in accordance with section C.3 below for any time taken in excess of that amount whether or not the table as a whole finishes on time.

C. Removal of Unplayed Boards and Penalties

2. In a Knockout Match

In knockout play, the DIC may impose the penalties set forth in Section 3 below based on electronic time and play records. In order to avoid giving any unwanted incentive for a slow pair's opponents to slow down, it is possible for a slow pair to incur a time penalty, even when the table finishes the session on time. The DIC may also curtail boards, but only if it is necessary to allow the next segment of play to start on time. If a board is played at only one table, it will be scored in accordance with Section X. H. 4 above (“Score for a board played at only one table”).

3. IMP & VP Penalties for Slow Play in Electronic Environment

When events are played on either RealBridge or LoveBridge, the time taken by each pair for a segment is available to the director, and IMP or VP penalties will be imposed if a pair takes more than their allotted time for a segment. A team’s excess time is the sum of the excess time taken by all pairs on the team during a match. Appendix A sets forth the general procedures for measuring time and informing players of the time they have used during a segment. Penalties will be imposed on the following schedule:

2. In a KO match, each team's excess time will be penalized as follows:

(continued from page 17)

- a. The first 7 minutes in a match will not be penalized.
- b. The next 5 minutes in a match will be penalized 1/2 IMP per minute.
- c. The next 5 minutes in a match will be penalized 1 IMP per minute.
- d. The next 5 minutes in a match will be penalized 2 IMPs per minute.
- e. Subsequent excess time will be penalized 3 IMPs per minute.

NOTE - for 2023 only, these penalties will be reduced by 50% - that will go in the Special Conditions of Contest for the 2023 USBCs.

X.H.4. Score for a board played at only one table

A board that has not been started when time expires will not be played. If it is likely that a board will not be played at one table, the DIC may prevent the other table from playing it. If a board has been played at one table and not the other, the DIC will assign a score based on the Cross-IMPs for the result at the table where the board was played, as long as the board has been played at least twice. Results from all tables in USBF events playing the same deals will be used in the Cross-IMP calculation. If there are three or fewer comparisons available, the table's result will be added to the Cross-IMP calculation.

Appendix A. TIME PROCEDURES IN ELECTRONIC ENVIRONMENT

When play is taking place on electronic devices, the following procedures will be in place:

1. Each pair is allocated half of the time allocated to the session as its "pair time"
2. Time shall be deducted from each pair's time whenever it is the turn of a player on the pair to bid or play. If a bid or play is being delayed after it has been made and before it is shown to the other players, that time is not deducted from the pair's time.
3. The following time will not be charged to either pair:
 - a. When a bid or play is being delayed after it has been made and before it is shown to the other players;
 - b. When the director has been called and has not restarted the time;
 - c. When a player has chosen to "hold the tray" after both bids have been made on one side of the screen;
 - d. When a player has clicked on the "pause" button to review a hand;
 - e. When a claim has been made and has not yet been accepted or rejected;
4. Each pair shall have a separate clock to measure the time the pair has taken. The clock will be shown to the pair at the start of each board, but not during the bidding and play of the board.

2. After March 27, 2023 but before May 19, 2023, the DIC shall make determinations after consulting with the TAC. Appeals from the DIC's decision may be made to the Tournament Appeals Committee.
3. Beginning May 19, 2023, the DIC shall make such determinations. Appeals from the DIC's decision may be made to the Tournament Appeals Committee.

Board 12 produced a swing of 9 IMPs to Hamman.

4S is makeable. In the Open Room, Pratap and Koneru bid it.

Dunitz led the DQ (Rusinow). When it held, he switched to the S9. Koneru won the SA in dummy. Rather than cashing a second high spade and learning of the bad split, then crossing to his hand with a heart and ruffing a diamond, he played a small spade to the queen.

Had he won one of his small spot cards instead of the queen, he could have survived. He could even have cashed two high spades, played a third spade to hand, trumped a diamond and crossed back in hearts to draw the last trump reversing the dummy.

Koneru played a club to the queen and Grabel’s ace. Grabel played the DA tapping dummy and it was over.

Koneru came to hand with a heart and played another club which Dunitz won. Dunitz exited a diamond, tapping the dummy one more time while Grabel discarded his losing H9. Koneru tried a heart from dummy and Grabel ruffed with the S6. Grabel later scored his ST to defeat the contract two tricks.

Board 4 was interesting across the field. Only three of the ten E/W pairs reached the cold 6S, and each of those earned a 13 IMP swing.

At five tables, West opened a weak 2D. On the surface, this should not keep the partnership from bidding the slam. However, given the wide-ranging nature of 2D openers, none of the pairs were comfortable bidding beyond 4S.

Two pairs in the USA2 Seniors opened 1D and in an abundance of caution,

stopped in 4S. Three pairs (Berkowitz/Cohen, Botta/Tebha, and Meyers/Sanborn) reached the slam after West opened 1D. Cohen/Berkowitz and Meyers/Sanborn do not play a weak 2D. Botta/Tebha do but Botta chose wisely to open 1D. The Berkowitz/Cohen auction (shown above) was the best auction. The other two slam auctions were similar but not as precise... must be true since Berkowitz/Cohen play Precision!!

When Cohen cuebid 4D and showed two aces, David assumed that the slam would be no worse than a 3-2 diamond break. In fact, that was the case. The play is straightforward. If South leads a club, N/S collect one trick. If South leads anything else, the club trick goes away.

The same thing, on a different hand on RealBridge came up last evening, and like Hamman, Stan passed. Nick asked Ralph if in their system this would be forcing. Ralph replied yes and I added that I thought my bid last night was forcing too.

Imagine how the four people at the table felt after the play. It was clear that N/S had missed a

game and maybe even a slam. Think how they felt when, in comparison, their teammates said, "Win 9!"

Had Koneru (N) brought home the slam in the other room, things would have felt differently!! Against the slam, Chambers led the HA. Pratap ruffed in dummy. He finessed the CT. He cashed the DA and was on the road to success. THEN... he cashed the DK and there was no recovery. He played a spade to the jack and a club to the king. He played a spade to the queen and Schermer trumped!! Schermer cashed the DQ and the HK and the hand was down two.

Had Pratap played any card but the DK at the point he was at the time, he could have been successful. He needed to keep the tenace over the DQ in order to maintain control.

Board 50 was wild all the way around, but it produced the greatest swing in the Seniors USA1 Final.

In the Open Room, Schermer and Chambers bid to 6S. Pratap doubled. 6S cannot be defeated.

Koneru led the HA and declarer took five spades, six clubs and the Da, losing only the trump ace!

Between East and West, they hold only 18 HCP. Note that West takes one less trick than East because North could give South a ruff in clubs!!

Meanwhile, in the Closed Room, Krekorian opened 2S. Hamman bid 3S showing a strong single-suited hand. N/S bid to 6H and Casen doubled.

6H can be defeated on the lead of a spade (it IS partner's suit.) However, can you blame Casen for leading the CK? He is looking at CAK and DA. While leading a spade is right, it just feels wrong.

Declarer ruffed the club, drew trumps and forced out the DA. His losers evaporated and he was home with 12 tricks.
