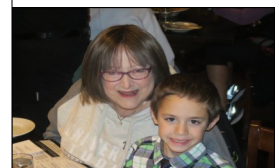

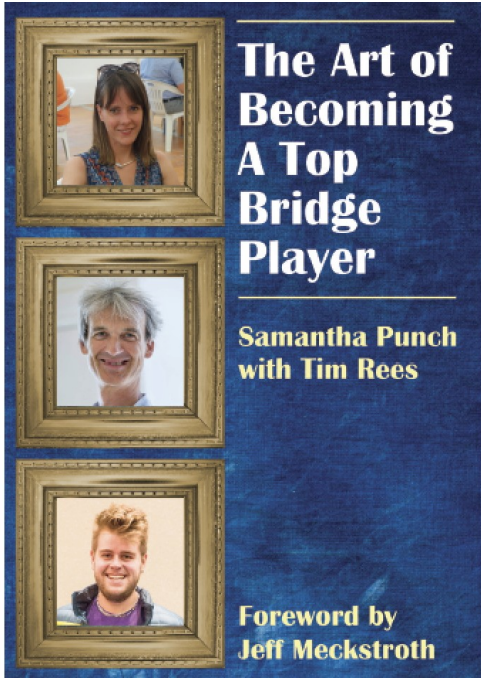


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Master Point Press



This year, as we did last year, we will be tracking time used by each pair and penalizing a team if their pairs use significantly more than their allotted time. Each pair is allotted half of the session time, which is actually more time than they should be using, since some of the time at the table is "neutral," not charged to either pair. Pages 23 & 24 of the USBF General Conditions of Contest have the penalties charged; Appendix A has details of time keeping.

The penalty scale has been adjusted somewhat based on our experience last year, but the major change we've made for this year is in how time taken is shown to you at the table. Each player has a "pair clock" showing the amount of pair time remaining in the segment. The pair clock appears on the screen to the left of the table clock at the start of each board. The clock does not update during the bidding (otherwise it would provide information about which player on the other side of the screen was taking time) and I believe it is no longer visible during the play because that place on the screen is used for something else. The clock will be outlined in red if the time remaining is less than the allocated time for the remaining boards.

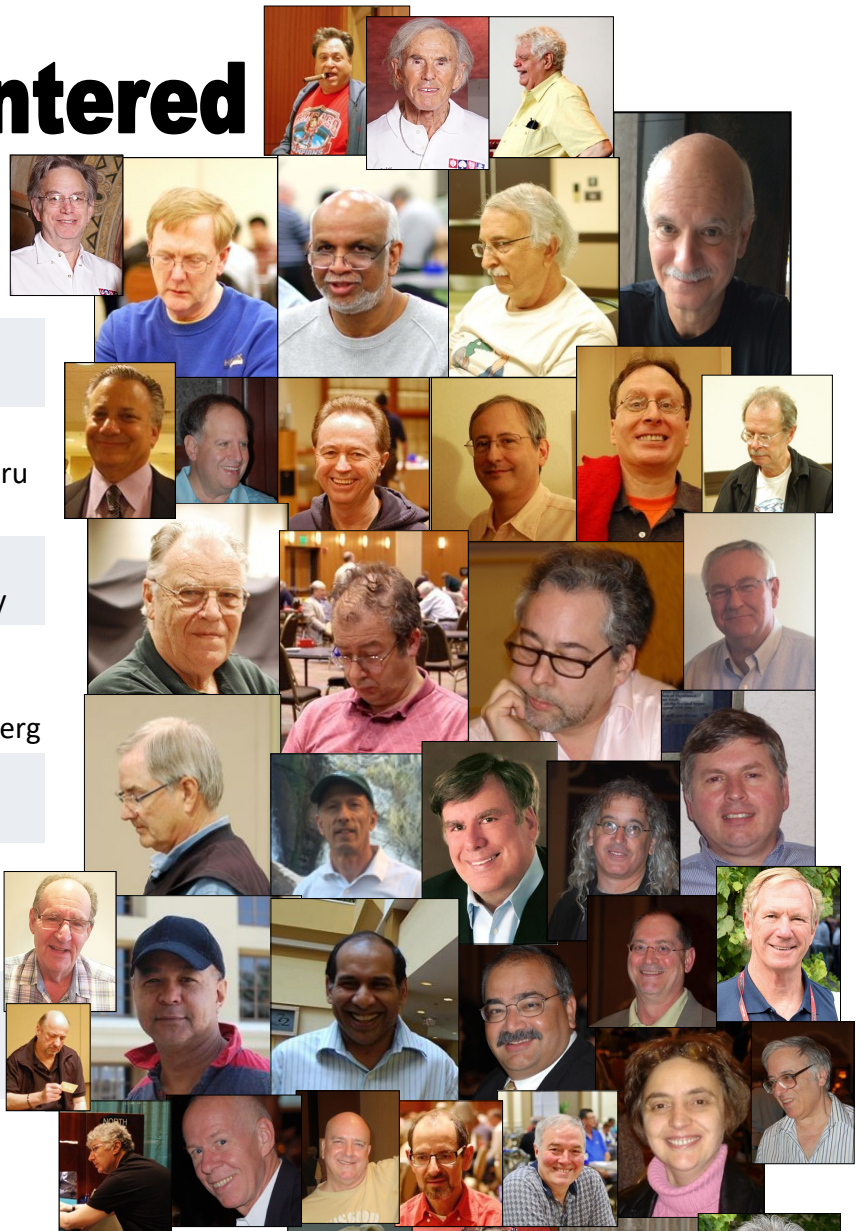

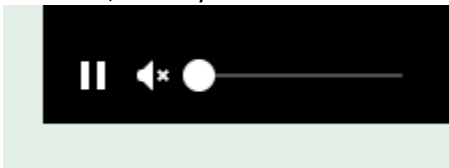
In the '50s, I was a clerk typist at our base headquarters in Verdun, France. We were a tough group. How tough? Our motto was "We never retreat, we just backspace."

## 2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an x on it. Click there to unmute. If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:



Click on the speaker to unmute.

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.

### Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)

**For all KO days** of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :

Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT

BREAK

Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT

**For Round Robin days**, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's.

To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

**Deep Involvement:** Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens – 2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

### Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

### More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

### Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

### Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

# Kibitzing...

## 2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each **day of play**. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

**Breakfast:** From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

**Lunch:** On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.

After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

**Let us know** if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

### Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

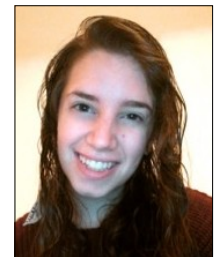
We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

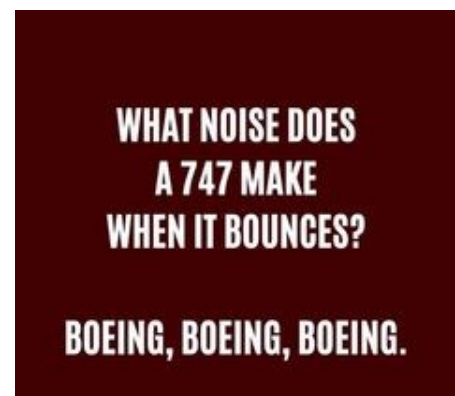
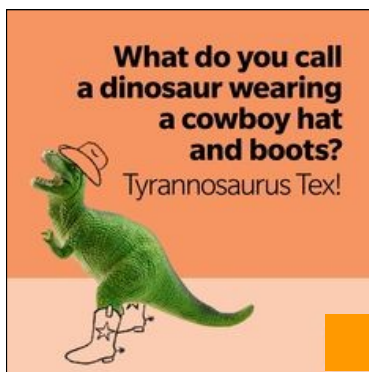

Shawn Quinn took up bridge as something to do with her mom. In November, 200 she was the top-ranked woman player in the world, at the time, replacing Jill Myers in that role.

Quinn received an email Oct. 22, 2000 from WBF President Jose Damiani:

It is a great pleasure for me to congratulate you on becoming the top woman player in the world with 2698 MP, in front of Sabine Auken (2676 MP) and Jill Meyers (2598 MP). Quinn credited her good teammates with this great achievement.

Shawn was born in Phoenix and grew up in Southern California, where she attended the University of California at Irvine and Western State University School of Law. Both parents, the late Gwen and Carroll Womack, were Life Masters, and Shawn began playing in 1981 with her mother. "That was really, really enjoyable," she says. "I have a lot of nice memories from that time." She took lessons from Ron Vickery and began playing in tournaments. "I always played in Flight A as a matter of pride," says Quinn. Quinn became a Life Master in 1987 and met Joe Quinn, a chemical engineer originally from Shreveport LA, two years later. The two became involved – both romantically and at the bridge table, where they won 10 regional championships in the first two years they played together. By the summer of 1992, Quinn "started getting serious about bridge. Joe encouraged me – he thought I would do well." At the 1992 Fall NABC in Orlando, Quinn and Jan Cohen led from start to finish in capturing the Life Master Women's Pairs. It was the first North American championship for the two, who had been playing together only a few weeks. At the 1993 Fall NABC in Seattle, Quinn and Cohen teamed with Juanita Chambers, Margie Gwozdzinsky and GerriAnne Klafter to win the Women's Board-a-Match Teams.



Quinn scored a double win in Seattle when she and Joe teamed with Alan Le Bendig and Tom Clarke to win the North American Swiss Teams. Quinn and Cohen – playing with Chambers, Rhoda Kratenstein and Hjordis Eythorsdottir – won the Women's Swiss Teams at the 1994 Spring NABC in Cincinnati. By 1995, Quinn and Cohen's partnership had ended. "I really enjoyed playing with Jan," says Quinn, "but we had different goals."

Quinn, Chambers, Lila Perlstein, Gail Greenberg, Jill Levin and Irina Levitina won the Women's Knock-out Teams at the 1995 Summer NABC in New Orleans -- the first of three consecutive KO wins for Quinn with three different teams.

The following year, Shawn and Joe were married and moved to Katy TX, a Houston suburb. On the bridge front, Quinn's squad (minus Perlstein, who died of cancer in March of that year) won the Women's International Team Trials and the right to represent the United States in the World Women's Team Olympiad in Rhodes, Greece. They added Lynn Deas and won the event – "I had played in Albuquerque but this was really my first world championship," says Quinn. The 1998 world championships were scheduled for Lille, France, but regular partners were unavailable and Quinn and Jill Meyers decided to play. "I went out to California a couple of weeks before the world championships to see if we could work out a partnership," recalls Quinn. The result: Quinn and Meyers, playing with Tobi Sokolow-Jo Ann Sprung and Carol Sanders-Dorothy Truscott, finished 3–4 in the McConnell Women's Teams and won the World Women's Pairs. Later that year, Quinn formed a partnership with fellow Texan Mildred Breed. To date, the pair has enjoyed great success: three North American championships and the 2000 World Women's Olympiad. Quinn has many wins since this information appeared in an ACBL NABC Bulletin in November, 2000. Shawn and Joe have an adorable daughter. Shawn is playing in the Mixed Teams in Schaumburg as a member of the Ivatury Team.

# Playing Procedures Reviewed For Those Arriving for the Mixed, Seniors, Womens

You will be playing on Chromebooks using LoveBridge software. The Chromebooks all have wired mice, which you may choose to use or not. They also have touch screens if you prefer that, and of course integrated keyboards. You will not be able to go to any websites other than the LoveBridge playing site from the playing room Chromebooks.

There will be 2 players in each room, one from each team in the match - North & East together and South & West together. All of the NE rooms are on the first floor; all of the SW rooms are on the second floor.

Because some of you have said that you prefer the opponents' system information on paper in addition to being available on the Chromebooks, we are asking each player to bring a copy of their SSF, convention card, and if relevant the ACBL Multi defense to the table for their opponent. If you need help printing anything, come to room 1321 before you play and one of us will print for you.

After you have finished a segment and scored with your teammates, please check the score on LoveBridge and if you disagree with it, come to room 1321 and so we can sort it out.

## Captains:

Your lineup sheet been shared with you. If you can't open it, or don't understand something about it, please let us know.

For the first segment of play each day, the Away team (the team that does not have seating rights for the segment) should tell the Home team their lineup (by email, text, or an entry on the lineup sheet) no later than 8:50 am (70 minutes before play starts), and enter the lineup on their lineup sheet no later than 9:00 am. If you enter your lineup on the lineup sheet before 8:50 am, that will satisfy both requirements. The Home team should give the Away team its lineup by 8:55 am, and should also enter it on the lineup sheet no later than 9:00 am. Of course, if the Away team doesn't communicate its lineup on time, the Home team has more time.

We ask you to enter the lineup on your lineup sheet because that may be the easiest way to give your lineup to your opponent. If you leave your lineup page open on your computer or other device, it will automatically update with the opponent's lineup when they enter it. Also, especially for the first segment of the day, there are often players who come to the office asking where they're supposed to sit and if the lineup is on the lineup sheet, we can direct them.

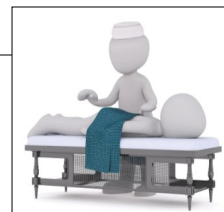
For subsequent segments, you need only notify each other of your lineups (10 minutes before the start of the segment for the Away team, 5 minutes for the Home team), although you are welcome to enter the lineup on the lineup sheet in case one of your players doesn't know where they are supposed to sit and comes to ask us.

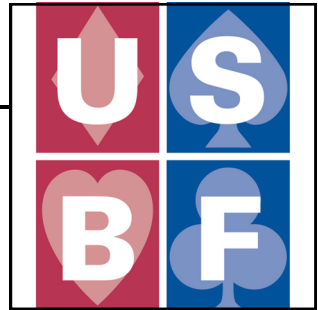

There were three makeable grand slams on Board 1 yesterday. Only one table in each match bid it.

Huang could have been right, but not on this hand.

In Rosenthal/Zhang, Wold and Zhang did not get to any slam. Wold made a negative double over Debbie Rosenberg's 3D call.

Michael pressured on by raising to 4D and taking away the opportunity for Zhang to cuebid or bid 4C below the level of game. Simple Blackwood would have been successful here but Zhang might not have been certain they were playing that in a situation like this with no agreed upon suit.

And maybe they weren't!?!

On Board 4, Both tables in Rosenthal/Zhang got to the vulnerable 3NT and made it with over-tricks.

In Rubenstein/Millens, the contract and the result was not usual and was likely a happy push for E/W at both tables!

How often in IMPs with both sides vulnerable, do you see a 1-level contract penalized, going down FOUR at both tables... on a very reasonable auction? Huang and Tebha get a holding penalties!!

A double over 1C on the East cards is completely normal... both 4-card majors and 13 HCP. A redouble on the South cards with a preference on the West cards is normal too.

So how did both tables end up at the 1-level down 4 for -1100? Sometimes it just happens!

Had the matches been different, this would have resulted in two bid swings... as it was, it was simply two boring pushes!

Note: at the tables, both declarers finessed against the SJ. The position is such that had they hooked the king instead, they'd have saved two tricks and been a slight plus against the vulnerable game. Next board!!

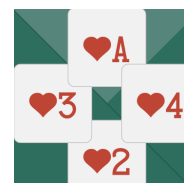
