2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge
You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an $x$ on it. Click there to unmute.If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:

Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later
Kibitzing Schedule (EDT)
For all KO days of the 2024 USBCs, kibitzing times will be :
Segment 1: 11:30 am EDT; Segment 2: 1:45 pm EDT
BREAK
Segment 3: 5:00 pm EDT; Segment 4: 7:15 pm EDT
For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's. To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.
Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens -2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the $2 \times 2$ view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The $2 \times 2$ view is not available on mobiles.) Think together!
When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

## More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

## Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.


## 2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each day of play. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.
After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

## Playing Rooms \& Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.
We will have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit. Please keep your voices down in the Break Room where we are working.

Masks will be required in playing rooms only if your screenmate asks you to wear one. You do not have to put on a mask when you summon a director or ask for coffee, water or an escort outside to smoke.

The WBF Committee of Honor was formed in 1972 for the purpose of recognizing the unselfish efforts of individuals in making a significant contribution to the enhancement and growth of bridge throughout the world.

Nominations to the Committee must be made by a minimum of three members of the WBF Executive Council from three separate Zones. Election to the Committee requires an affirmative vote from three-quarters of the Executive Council members, the detailed requirements being set out in article 3.3 of the By-laws. Nomination may only be made in even numbered years. After the amendment approved in 2014 the Committee of Honour may not exceed thirteen living members.

The WBF Gold Pin, the highest award offered by the WBF, is awarded only to members of the Committee of Honour. When the Committee was formed in 1972, only three persons received the required nominations and votes. They were: Geoffrey L. Butler (GB), Waldemar von Zedtwitz (USA) and Charles L. Solomon (USA).

In 1974 the WBF President, Julius Rosenblum, was unanimously elected whilst Albert Morehead (USA) and Baron de Nexon (France) were posthumously elected. In 1976 Ben O. Johnson (USA) and André Lemaitre (Belgium) were elected to the Committee.

In 1978 there were two more nominations, each receiving the unanimous support of all six Zones at that time represented on the Executive Council, as a result of which General Alfred M Gruenther (USA) and Jaime Ortiz-Patiño (Switzerland) were elected.

In 1984 three more persons were elected: Richard L. Goldberg (USA), Nils E. Jensen (Sweden) and Edgar Kaplan (USA). In 1986 Robert Howes (USA) and Ernesto d'Orsi (Brazil) were elected. In 1988, José Damiani (France) was elected. In 1994 Robert S. Wolff (USA) was elected.

In 1998, in Lille Jean-Claude Beineix (France), Mazhar Jafri (Pakistan) and John Wignall (New Zealand) were elected. In 2002, in Montreal, Joan Gerard (USA), Panos Gerontopoulos (Greece) and George Retek (Canada) were elected. In 2004, Istanbul, Gianarrigo Rona (Italy) was elected, receiving the unanimous support of all eight Zones represented on the Executive Council.

In 2014, Sanya, Patrick Choy (Singapore), Marc De Pauw (Belgium), Alvin Levy (USA) and Anna Maria Torlontano (Italy) were elected, whilst Jens Auken (Denmark) and Jean-Louis Derivery (Guadalupe) were posthumously elected.

There were swings in both matches on Board 4 where 2 tables bid the vulnerable game and two stopped short. All the East players led diamonds, Greco being the only one to lead an honor. As the cards lie, it is immaterial.

Declarer can win the first diamond, play a spade to the ace, play the CJ ducked to East's king, win the likely heart return with the king and repeat the club finesse. Now in hand with the CT, declarer can play a heart to dummy's nine and West's queen.

West can exit with the HT , declarer winning their ace. Declarer can play the S 8 to the ten and queen.

West can cash his high heart and declarer has their game!

A footnote for the Cross IMPs, the pairs reaching game were both "young guys": Demuy/Kranyak and Hurd/Bathurst. The pairs avoiding the game were the older guys: Simson/Rodwell and Levin/Weinstein.

Hail to the youth!
No matter how much they outbid and/or outscore us, we want and need the younger players!


On Board 6, Willenken/Wolpert were the only pair to stay out of a grand slam.

Given the favorable splits, there are actually three makeable grands: Diamonds, Spades, and NT

Looking at all four hands, the declarers in those strains have 16 tricks off the top... but the software will only permit them to claim 13!! Sorry...


Against the slam, Wooldridge made a somewhat unorthodox lead of the C2. Admittedly, it is the classical "closest thing to a trick" in his hand...

Bathurst had no choice but to finesse. He had to knockout the SA and if he rose on the club, the opponents would simply win the SA and cash the CK. He wasn't going to defy the odds to cater to a stiff king on his right so he naturally and wisely played the queen. When that held, he knocked out the SA and took his 12 tricks. Well bid and well played!


With spades $3 / 2$, and the singleton diamond in the hand with the SA, there is little to the play.

Grue led the D5. Simson won. He played a spade to the jack, a club to the king and another spade which Grue won with the ace.

Grue exited with his last trump. Simson won in dummy and started cashing the clubs from the top down. When clubs split $3 / 3$, Simson claimed 12 tricks.

#### Abstract

MIXED TEAMS: You will be playing the Mixed USBC on Chromebooks using LoveBridge software. The Chromebooks all have wired mice, which you may use. They have touch screens if you prefer that, and integrated keyboards. You will not be able to go to any websites besides LoveBridge. You may not have ANY electronic devices (except medical devices that the director has expressly approved) in the playing rooms. That includes smart watches, headphones or earbuds, or any other device that can be connected to the internet or to another electronic device.


There will be 2 players in each room, one from each team in a match - N/East or S/W together. For the Round Robin, your N and S players will be stationary - the E and W players will move each round. Your N-S assignments will be posted in room 1321 and on the walls in the hallway, as well as on the website's schedule page.

The way Round Robin seating works is that before each round you must either enter your lineup on your lineup sheet or come to room 1321 and give me a piece of paper with your lineup. After you have done that, I will give you an assignment paper telling you which team you are playing and where your EW players should sit. If no more teams enter, each team will have one sit out during the Round Robin. On $5 / 5$ or $5 / 6$ we will give captains a link to your lineup sheet which will indicate your sit outs.

Under USBF procedures, the last 2 matches will be sequestered. The way that is done is that you are required to turn in your lineup for the last 2 matches before match 10 starts, and the same pair must play NS for both of the last 2 matches. The NS players must remain in their playing rooms for the last 2 matches and the break between matches. After finishing play in the penultimate match, the EW players must remain in their playing rooms until a tournament staff person comes to escort them to their new rooms. Players who are playing only the penultimate match may leave the playing area after they have finished playing and may talk with the pair coming in to replace them. Other than that, there is no comparison or discussion between teammates, and the Chromebooks will be programmed not to show any comparisons at the end of the penultimate match. Players who are coming in for the final match, including those on the team that had the penultimate round sit out, should come to room 1321 and wait there to be escorted to their tables.

Because some of you have said you prefer the opponents' system information on paper in addition to being available on the Chromebooks, we ask each player to bring a copy of their SSF, convention card, and if relevant, the ACBL Multi defense to the table for their opponent. If you need help printing anything, come to room 1321 and we will print it.

After you have finished a match and scored up with your teammates, please check the score on LoveBridge and if you disagree, come to room 1321 and tell us so we can sort it out. Procedures tor mixed de:
