

Practicing on RealBridge, the Nickell teammates were dealt a highly distributional hand. The foursome had a perfect auction through 5D. Levin held a 6/6 in hearts and clubs with just enough cards to present a very tough decision... and Greco's jump to 4H made bidding 5H sound reasonable. 5H might make (what if Greco's SK were the HK?) or it might be a good save. Taking the high road, Levin took the push. When laying down dummy, he said, "I'm going to smoke. I'm sorry if I'm wrong."

Five hearts failed with the obvious three losers. Nick led the DA and it was over.

Nick judged well to bid 5D over 4H with a silent partner. He had a lot of offense against 5 H , holding the trump ace/king and the outside diamond ace. However, even if Nick leads his stiff club and works out how to reach Katz by underleading the DA, his ruff is with a natural trump trick and the contract comes home. 5 H went down one.

In the words of Joey Silver, "Next hand!!"

2024 USBCs Kibitzing - There will be delayed kibitzing for all of the 2024 USBCs on LoveBridge You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. If you get to the voice commentary and there is no sound, you need to "unmute." When you first get to the page, there is a small icon of a speaker in the middle of your screen with an $x$ on it. Click there to unmute.If you miss that icon, move your cursor to the bottom left of the screen and you should see a something like this:

Click on the speaker to unmute.
Vugraph is delayed for 30 minutes or until all tables have completed play on a board, whichever is later.

For Round Robin days, each kibitzing segment will start 30 minutes after play starts. No voice for RR's. To listen to commentary, search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentators. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.
Deep Involvement: Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into 4 small screens -2 of them showing the 2 tables of the match you choose, the other 2 having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the $2 \times 2$ view you can personalize the content in all your windows. (The $2 \times 2$ view is not available on mobiles.)
Think together!
When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do.

## More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner, the arrow takes you to the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

## Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.
Replay:
After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board, the same buttons move you through the list.

## 2024 USBCs Hospitality

We are returning to our pre-pandemic hospitality, with the hospitality suite (room 2321) open most of the day for socializing, Vugraph, and snacks. We will be providing breakfast and lunch each day of play. Marie-France Benoit will be our lead hostess, with help from Jacob Morgan and Julie Arbit, who makes the best guacamole. If you're at the tournament and can volunteer to help with hospitality (pick up items at Costco or nearby stores or restaurants, preparing food) please let Jan or Marie-France know.

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be the usual breakfast food: cereal, bagels, toast, salmon, fruit, juice, coffee and tea. For those who prefer Keurig coffee, that will be available. So long as the suite doesn't become too crowded, you are welcome to eat there. No masking requirement.

Lunch: On the first four days of each event we will be serving a buffet lunch in a hotel banquet room, usually the Slate and Cyan rooms at the front of the hotel; we will have signs in the Player Break Room and Hospitality Suite with daily location. The hotel will be supplying what they do best: salads and chips. We will be bringing in 2 or 3 hot dishes from a local restaurant each day. There should be enough room for you to eat in the hotel banquet room, but you are welcome to take food from there to an outside table or to your hotel room. Lunch will be served from about half an hour before the morning session is supposed to end until about half an hour after the afternoon session starts.
After the first 4 days of each event, lunch will be available in the hospitality suite at the break. There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, berries, cookies or other desserts. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators. As with breakfast, you are welcome to eat in the hospitality suite unless it is too crowded.

Let us know if you have specific needs. Our hosts will do their very best to accommodate you.

## Playing Rooms \& Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.
We will have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, Nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit. Please keep your voices down in the Break Room where we are working.

Masks will be required in playing rooms only if your screenmate asks you to wear one. You do not have to put on a mask when you summon a director or ask for coffee, water or an escort outside to smoke.

## The Boomers name honors the Greater Prairie Chicken, a native bird of Illinois.

The word "boomer" is a nickname for the male Greater Prairie Chicken. It refers to the loud booming sound the bird makes as it "dances" to assert its dominance over other males during mating season.

The birds gather on flat prairie land, which is known as a "lek" or more commonly as the "booming grounds". As they strut, stomp, flutter, and fight one another, the chickens display a few remarkable traits.

Greater Prairie Chickens have orange patches on each side of their faces, around their jowls. These patches inflate, as they are in our Boomers logo, and it's from here that the chickens produce their signature sounds. The male chicken also has a yellow-orange comb of feathers above his eyes and a ring of feathers around his neck. Both rise when the bird is performing its courtship display.


## Schaumburg <br> Boomer?

- They were prevalent in Schaumburg within the last 100 years.
- They used to be served as a delicacy at fine restaurants.
- Numbers of them declined significantly in the $20^{\text {th }}$ century as the amount of unfarmed prairie land has diminished.
- Listed on the Illinois Endangered Species Protection Board, there is a Prairie Chicken Recovery Plan.
- Members of the grouse family, they weigh between one and two pounds.
- Legally, they cannot be hunted in the State of Illinois.
- Populations live mostly in the Great Plains states, especially Kansas and Nebraska, with much smaller populations in Illinois, lowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota.
- Prairie Ridge State Natural Area in Newton and Salem, Illinois is the only area where Prairie

## Buenos Aires, Argentina

The World Bridge Games will be held at the Centro de Convenciones de Buenos Aires, Argentina.
Each WBF member NBO in good standing is invited to send one National team in each category (The Vanderbilt Open Teams, The Torlontano Women's Teams, Seniors' and Mixed Teams) to the Team Championships. Each WBF member NBO in good standing is invited to send any number of Pairs, in good standing, to the National Pairs Championships (Open, Women's, Seniors' and Mixed).

NBOs and Players are reminded that by registering for and entering any WBF event they accept to play against all other NBOs/Players in the event. There will be no special "arrangements" done to avoid certain encounters. Registering/Entering and not respecting this Statutory rule will result in immediate disqualification from the rest of the competition as well as further severe consequences for the NBO and/or Players, as the case may be.

The Pablo Lambardi Transnational Open Teams and the BAM Transnational Open Teams are open to all players in good standing from a WBF member NBO.

Accommodation: Our local partner, "Popart", is a major organiser of large international events in Argentina and will offer a range of accommodation alternatives at very attractive prices. Further details will be published soon.

## Anti-Doping

All players are required to comply with the WBF Anti-Doping Regulations. Please ensure that all team members and partnerships have checked the latest WADA Prohibited List which came into force on 1 January 2024. If they are required to take any medication detailed there, they must apply for a Therapeutic Exemption Certificate (TUE) in good time - at least 30 days before the start of the event. Please ensure they read the guidelines for completion of the TUE which must be in English and must also have diagnostic information - also in English from their physician.

Please note that the use of any form of diuretic is banned. This is medication that is commonly prescribed in conjunction with other, non-prohibited medications.
For the World Bridge Games, players from the Open, Women's and Mixed events (Teams or Pairs) are liable for testing. Players taking part in the Senior Teams or Pairs need not register a TUE unless they are also playing in an Open, Women's or Mixed event (Teams or Pairs).
Failure to comply with the Anti-Doping Regulations may result in the player testing positive for a banned substance in which case they could face a four year ban from international or national bridge.

Some countries are required to present Visas. The United States is NOT one of those countries... however, be sure your passport is current if you are playing in this USBC.
