When you're down in a match, needing a swing, you do desperate things. Sometimes you get lucky and sometimes you don't. On this hand, from the third quarter of the Finals, Moss and Gitelman took a shot, disdaining their nine card spade fit to play in 3NT. Even if the opponents find a club lead, declarer can still make his contract by guessing the spade position. As it was they led a diamond and switched to hearts, making it easy to take nine tricks. Declarer actually took ten when he guessed correctly in the spade suit. Gitelman gets credit for his aggressive raise to 3NT. If he had rebid three spades, partner would likely have put the hand in four and they'd be down off the top.

In the Closed room, Freeman and Nickell played in the automatic four spades on an interesting auction. Martel opened a weak notrump. Nickell showed a one-suited hand, and Stansby used a Lebensohl sequence in an attempt to play in three clubs. This, of course, meant that a club lead would be automatic against 3NT. In spite of his double club stopper, Freeman chose a four club bid to get partner to bid his suit.

It is unusual to find a hand where both tables play in different Moysian fits. In the Open Room, Moss opened a weak two diamonds and Gitelman furthered the preempt to the three level. Rodwell made a takeout double and Meckstroth only had enough values to bid the part score in hearts. (Game is not a great proposition, but with all the finesses working and all the suits splitting safely, it happens to work.)

In the Closed Room, Freeman elected to pass the North hand, and the auction started with three passes. Now Rubin could start with a strong club and essentially take his time getting to game. Freeman's diamond overcall prevented the opposition from finding the failing 3NT. This left the Moysian heart or spade fit.

Note that if East/West elect to play in their eight card club fit, they are short a trick because of the position of the jack of hearts.

In one room, Gitelman/Moss bid and made the aggressive vulnerable game. In the other, the opponents stopped in two spades. Rubin could not believe he should let them play there. Backing up his thinking, he bid a balancing three clubs. Lucky for him, the opponents let him play it there undoubled. Rubin went down three non-vulnerable tricks for an eleven IMP swing to Ekeblad. After seven boards in the second quarter, Ekeblad had closed the gap to -45, picking up 34 IMPs in those seven boards.
