In the Sulgrove/Baker match, North/South bid to four spades in the Closed Room. As you can see, six spades is an easy make. This would appear to be a likely loss for N/S, but Linda McGarry and Laurie Kranyak held the East/West cards in the Open Room. These ladies are not known to be shy bidders. The auction in the Closed Room was:

In yesterday's Harris/Robinson match, the final score was 181-190. On this board from the final segment, Harris gained ten IMPs by bidding an aggressive vulnerable game. Here is the auction:

As you can see, the cards lie favorably and East/West can actually make five hearts. Even if the cards were not this favorable, there are many positions in which $4 v$ is cold. Most people would shy away from game on these hands because of the lack of distribution combined with a minimum amount of high card strength. Morgan-Harris did well to evaluate the hand the way they did and bid the game. Harris' three heart bid was a little aggressive, but this is the secret to upsetting more experienced teams.

In the final segment of the Schuett/O'Rourke match, sparks flew on Board 87, shown here. In one room, $\mathrm{E} / \mathrm{W}$ took the sacrifice in six spades and scored +1660 when South led the ace of spades and followed it up with the a low heart. (Perhaps the trump deuce was interpreted as an upside suit preference signal?) When the JTx of hearts came down, declarer was able to use his carefully preserved four of spades as an entry to dummy to discard both of his losing diamonds.

At the other table, six clubs went down one when declarer had no place to park two of his losing hearts.

## Problem Board



Most tables in the Round of 16 USBC arrived at either six or seven diamonds. Seven fails because of the $5-0$ trump split. Six is cold by winning the opening lead, crossing to dummy and running the nine of trumps. However, on a black suit lead, declarer must decide if he is more worried about a 5-1 break in the led suit or a $5-0$ trump split. Probably it is right to protect against the $5-0$ trump split because the black suit singleton will only be able to ruff if it his partner holds the diamond jack. If South has a black singleton, he is slightly more likely to hold diamond length, and therefore, will hold the jack more than $50 \%$ of the time. This somewhat twisted reasoning leads to the conclusion that it is best to cross to dummy and run the trump nine.

In the Schuett/O'Rourke match, Miller and Wickham bid the diamond grand and failed two tricks because of the bad trump split. At the other table, the opponents played and made four spades in the five-two fit on the following auction:

To say the least, the Schuett squad was disappointed when comparing!

## Aggressive Bidding Pays Off Again!



Hampson and Greco are known for their aggressive style. On Board 76, from the final segment of their match against the Schuett team, they reached four spades doubled with the East/West cards. At the other table, the opponents played in a part score, gaining the O'Rourke team a 6 IMP swing.

As long as declarer guesses the diamond position, four spades cannot be beat.

At first it appears that South could get a diamond ruff with his singleton king of spades, however, if this occurs, declarer counters by discarding a club on his fourth diamond, and the opponents are helpless.

Again, it is a basically flat eight count opposite a minimum opener and it produces a game swing.
