On this third club Declarer trumped with the Queen and Sontag did not overruff. This was an excellent play. Now he was guaranteed two trump tricks and the contract was defeated.

## Judge cites 42 Beatles songs to teach beer thief a lesson

A judge sentencing a Beatles-loving beer thief quoted 42 of the band's song titles in his verdict.
Andrew McCormack, 20, was asked to recommend to a US court what his sentence should be for stealing beer.
He wrote: "Like the Beetles say, Let It Be". But his cheeky quip did not impress Gregory Todd, a 56-year-old district court judge in Montana.
In a sentencing memorandum Judge Todd first corrected McCormack's misspelling and then gave the defendant a lesson in The Beatles discography.
He replied: "Mr McCormack, you pled guilty to the charge of Burglary. To aid me in sentencing I review the pre-sentence investigation report.
"I read with interest the section containing Defendant's statement. To the question of 'Give your recommendation as to what you think the Court should do in this case', you said, 'Like the Beetles say Let It Be'.
"While I will not explore the epistemological or ontological overtones of your response, or even the syntactic of symbolic keys of your allusion, I will say Hey Jude, Do You Want to Know a Secret?
"The greatest band in rock history spelled their name B-e-a-t-1-e-s.
"I interpret the meaning of your response to suggest that there should be no consequences for your actions and I should
Let it Be so you can live in Strawberry Fields Forever.
"Such reasoning is Here, There and Everywhere. It does not require a Magical Mystery Tour of interpretation to know The Word means leave it alone.
"I trust we can all Come Together on that meaning.
"If I were to overlook your actions and Let It Be, I would ignore that Day in the Life on April 21, 2006.
"Evidently, earlier that night you said to yourself I Feel Fine while drinking beer.
"Later, whether you wanted Money or were just trying to Act Naturally you became the Fool on the Hill on North 27 th Street.
"As Mr Moonlight at 1.30am, you did not Think for Yourself but just focused on I, Me, Mine.
"Because you didn't ask for Help, Wait for Something else or listen to your conscience saying Honey Don't, the victim later that day was Fixing a Hole in the glass door you broke."

Jacob Morgan of Madison WI timed the play perfectly to bring home this tough $4 \boldsymbol{a}$ contract from his Round of 8 match against the Russ Ekeblad team.
South, Marty Harris, cuebid $3 \boldsymbol{v}$ to try for a notrump game, but settled on the Moysian fit when Morgan denied a stopper. East, Brad Moss, got off to the best

| Pass | Pass | Pass |  | defense by cashing three top hearts, then leading a fourth heart for the unhelpful ruff-sluff.

Morgan was at the crossroads. If spades were $3-3$, he could ruff in dummy with an honor, pull trump and claim ten "easy" tricks. If spades were 4-2, he must ruff with dummy's 8 and maneuver from there.

His only clues were Moss' $2 v$ opening on a five-card suit (more attractive with a doubleton spade than with xxx?) and Fred Gitelman's pitch of the $\$ 4$ on the third heart. Neither provided much help, so Morgan had to trust his instincts.
On a day when little else had been easy, perhaps Morgan had the feeling that this layout would be just as challenging, so he went with the line that catered to $4-2$ spades. He ruffed the fourth heart with dummy's 8 . Gitelman refused the overruff, pitching the club deuce, and Morgan carefully pitched a club from his hand. He cashed dummy's queen and jack of spades, then ran top clubs through Gitelman until he conceded.

Note that Morgan's line of play succeeds when spades are 4-2 and when spades and clubs are 3-3.
In the open room, Lew Stansby and Chip Martel played $4 \boldsymbol{A}$ after a similar auction. The defense was the same to the first four tricks, but Stansby guessed for spades to be 3-3 and ruffed the fourth heart with dummy's queen. That resulted in minus 50 and a 10-IMP win for the Morgan-Harris team.

Bramley, as is his style, made a takeout double on his flat 12 count. His experience with the bid has been excellent and he's sticking with it.

Four spades was not an easy make. Sidney had to time things well, preserving proper entries to the dummy, to give himself the best shot for success. At trick two, he led a spade toward his hand; Smith ducked. Sidney continued with a spade toward dummy. Smith won this and cleared the spades. Sidney was just where he wanted to be... in dummy! He led the nine of diamonds; Cohen played small; Sidney ducked and he could no longer be stopped from making. Smith won the ace, but Lazard still had the ace of clubs in dummy to reach his king of hearts for a club pitch.

At the other table, East failed to make the takeout double and they played in a part score. 10 IMPs to Deutsch.
 Deutsch simply bid the game.

In the other room, Meckwell opened a strong club and found the 5-3 heart fit from the North hand. Bramley led a low diamond to the King and Ace. Meckstroth, likely fearing a diamond ruff, played a low heart to the Ace. This proved fatal. He was now forced to lose two hearts, a diamond, and a spade for down one.

In 3NT, Kranyak played the hand really well. Soloway led the six of clubs. John won in hand with the ten. He led a small heart to the queen and king, and when the heart position revealed itself on the next round of the suit, John collected three clubs, four hearts, a diamond and a spade to make his contract ... and score 10 IMPs for Deutsch.

Rarely does a team get a positive double game swing against a team like Nickell. Baze did well to jump to five diamonds on the North hand in the Open Room. Distribution is a powerful weapon. Meckstroth led a spade which Cohler ruffed in dummy. He led a heart off the board toward his singleton king. Rodwell rose. He played a club to Meck's ace and Meck continued with clubs. Cohler went into a crossruff, ruffing out all his spades. He then led the king of diamonds from dummy and claimed eleven tricks when Rodwell had both the short diamond and short club.

In the Closed Room, Nickell chose only four diamonds on the second round of bidding. Now, when four spades doubled got back to him, he knew not what to do. Should he pull his partner's double or should he defend? He decided to defend. As perfectly as things sit in diamonds for $\mathrm{N} / \mathrm{S}$, so do they sit perfectly for $\mathrm{E} / \mathrm{W}$ in spades. Bramley brought home the game for +790 , and for the first time in the match, Deutsch took the lead.
