



Detroit is nearly one million people coming from more than 100 ethnic and nationality groups, giving an exciting diversity to the city. Together with its Canadian sister city, Windsor, Detroit represents the largest metropolitan area on any international border in the world. Despite a 4,000 mile long common border, approximately one-third of all U.S. -Canadian border crossings take place here. And where else can you drive straight south to enter Canada? Detroit's international flavor is further enhanced by the steady stream of ships passing by on the Detroit River, one of the busiest inland waterways in the world. The river carries more shipping traffic than any other river in North America and Detroit ranks as one of the major U.S. ports. The opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway in 1959 made Detroit an international port and nearly 1,000 foreign ships use the Port of Detroit facilities annually.

Detroit's eye-catching Civic Center borders the river at the foot of Woodward Avenue. Dominated by the grandeur of the ultramodern Renaissance Center (world headquarters for General Motors) with its towering 72-story Marriott Hotel, the riverfront area features scores of handsome buildings surrounded by gardens including the Veteran's Memorial Building, the City-County Building, the Ford Auditorium, Cobo Conference/ Exhibition Center, Joe Louis Sports Arena, and the Hart Plaza--a vital riverfront park designed by sculptor Isamu Noguchi featuring the Dodge Fountain, a futuristic creation. Modern office buildings, luxury condominiums, and apartments adjoin this area. But Detroit is more than just buildings!

Detroit is Symphony -- and a very fine one at that. In the winter season, the Symphony performs at Orchestra Hall and summer brings cabaret concerts and the outdoor Meadow Brook Festival. And, as a Detroit tradition, ticket subscribers who can't attend a particular concert call the box office prior to curtain time to make their tickets available to students that day for a reduced price.

Detroit is Theatre -- the Fisher (just north of Wayne State's campus), Star, and Gem theatres feature top-flight productions. "The Wiz", "Annie" and "Cats" all enjoyed long runs in Detroit and many pre-Broadway hits are included on the playbill. In addition, the Hilberry Theatre on Wayne State's campus features one of the country's only graduate repertory theaters.

Detroit is Sports -- For the spectator sports enthusiast, Detroit boasts the Pistons basketball, Lions football, Red Wings hockey, and Tigers baseball teams.

Detroit is a Melting Pot -- and proud of it. There are at least 67 designated ethnic communities within Detroit (such as the Swedes, Albanians, Yugoslavians, African-Americans, Belgians, Mexican, Polish and Lebanese). This ethnic conglomeration is featured all through the summer with a series (every week) of three-day free ethnic festivals at the riverfront Hart Plaza.

Detroit is Restaurants -- Esquire and Holiday rate it as one of the five best restaurant towns in the United States. There are the usual fine steak and seafood establishments plus dozens of small ethnic restaurants where the menus may be printed in two languages. Greektown cuisine is fantastic and within a graduate student's budget! Eastern Market, a maze of shops and open-air stalls, features fresh produce, meats, cheeses and specialties for creative home cooking.

Detroit is Museums -- Greenfield Village is one of the most elaborate and extensive collections of fully restored historical buildings and items anywhere, including such gems as the Wright Brothers' Cycle Shop and Stephen Foster's home. Craftsmen demonstrate their ancient or revived talents, while weekly events like antique car gatherings, musket shoots and pottery festivals spice the season. The adjoining Henry Ford Museum, an extensive collection of automotive and other transportation vehicles are featured. Although the Village and Museum are national tourist attractions, Detroiters get special recognition--season memberships are available, and horse drawn sleigh rides through the grounds are featured at Christmas-time.

Detroit is the Renaissance Center --"RenCen," the waterfront complex, is larger than New York's Rockefeller Center. Its towering glass and steel structure (a 72-story Marriott Hotel with four adjacent office towers and two new towers) is an architectural tribute to the city's rebirth and to the Detroit investors with the wisdom and vision to build it.

Detroit is Belle Isle -- a 982-acre scenic island located in the Detroit River, 1.5 miles upriver from the heart of downtown. The park is an enchanting combination of great variety including frequent free concerts, canoeing on lagoons, biking and running on wooded trails, a Nature Center, an Aquarium, the Dossin Great Lakes Museum, a Conservatory, Greenhouses, and a vast picnic area.

The matches are being played "BAM" style, so the same lineup plays for two segments at a time, and you will not be able to compare until after 2 segments have been played.

The 14 board matches will be played in 7 board halves. Each player on each team must play against each other team ("Balanced Play Requirement").

Vugraph

The 2011 USSBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Quarter-finals. We hope to cover 4-8 tables in play in the Quarter-finals, all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the USA1 Finals and USA2 Finals. We may be able to cover some of the matches in the earlier rounds of the USA2 Bracket as well.

The 2011 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals and Playoffs.

To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website** where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USWBC matches you want to watch.

There will usually be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, some of whom may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

In the Quarterfinals, each match will play a different set of boards. In the Semi-Finals and Final, all of the teams will play the same boards, but for security reasons, if one match is sufficiently behind that we have to start it later than the other one, we will not start the Vugraph broadcast until both matches have started play.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the older events currently available (under Archived Results) to see what we'll have for the 2011 USSBC. Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.





What an unlucky hand for Beatty and Jacobs, found on BBO, practicing against Ferguson and Casen, on different teams, but all in the Trials.

Casen led his singleton club. Jacobs won in dummy and played a spade toward his hand. Ferguson couldn't go wrong. With stiff ace, he won the trick and immediately played back a club, scoring the uppercut to defeat the hand. 9.3 IMPs to North/South!

There was little to the play. The Board was won in the bidding. Casen led his ace of hearts and switched to a low diamond, ducked to North's queen. North cashed his spade ace and Jacobs claimed ten tricks.

Clearly, looking at the hand, Ferguson and Casen had a great save in clubs. The vulnerability was in their favor and they have just three losers: one spade, one heart and one diamond. Had they bid five clubs, they would have intended it as a make, not a save. After all, they do hold 25 HCP's between them!

Since clubs could have been a 3 card suit, Beatty's jump to four hearts really but North/South's feet to the fire and this time they got burned. 11.5 IMPs to East/West!

Sometimes aggressive overcalls pay off and sometimes they don't. This was one of the latter. Jacobs overcalled one spade on his JTxxx. It could have worked.

When the opponents bid 3NT, Jacobs' side had five top tricks: two hearts and \leftarrow KT98 three spades... but it required a heart through the king from Beatty at trick **J3** one or trick two.


Beatty, predictably, led the king of spades and Jacobs, playing standard signals, played the deuce. Perhaps Beatty should have worked out to shift to a heart since the diamond and club aces were in dummy. It wasn't too late.

However, he continued with the spade ace to clear the suit, playing Jacobs for the king of clubs instead of the queen of hearts. The result: 8.6 IMPs to North/South.
