Gordon did well in both the bidding and the play. His aggressive 3 H bid propelled his partner to bid game. Once he was there, he needed to make it.

Sontag led the nine of clubs. Gordon won the ace in dummy and led a small spade away from the queen. Sontag won the jack and continued clubs. Gordon again won in dummy and played the SQ.

Berkowitz won the ace and led the jack of clubs for his partner to ruff. Gordon preempted that by ruffing with the trump jack. He ruffed a spade in dummy and cashed the HA. He ruffed a club high, promoting a trump for Sontag, however, he now had a place to pitch his losing diamond while Sonty ruffed. Making four was worth 6.8 IMPs in the IMP Pairs online.

Note that when Berkowitz won his SA, he attempted to promote a trump for his partner. Had he played his DK, he would have cut off dummy. He actually helped declarer by playing the CJ.

## Round Robin Lineup, Assignments and Score Submission Procedures

As usual, you must submit your lineup for each match before you know which team you are playing. Unless you are very late finishing a match, we also ask that you submit the score for each match before starting the next one. We will be giving you "Swiss Team" tickets before each match with your team number, table number and opponent.

To get your assignment ticket for the first match, tell Jan what your lineup will be and she will give you your ticket. For subsequent matches, please return the ticket to Jan after you have finished comparing, with the IMP score on the front and your lineup for the next match on the back. She will give you your ticket for the next match.

After everyone has submitted their lineup for a match, we will post a list of teams, tables $\&$ opponents in each playing area, so if you lose your assignment ticket, you will be able to figure out where to go.

## VuGraph Information

The 2015 USBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Round of 16, in which we will cover 2 or 3 matches. The Round of 16 will start Sunday, May 10th. From the Quarterfinals on, we will cover all of the tables in play. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the BBO website where you can log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USBC matches you want to watch. There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, who may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

During the Semifinals and Finals, all of the teams will play the same boards.

During the Round of 16 , each team will play a different set of boards.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Web Vugraphs are posted about half an hour after completion of the Vugraph show.

You can find the hand records for USBC matches on the USBF site, linked to the scorecards you can get to by clicking on 2015USBC under "Event Results" in the upper left of each page

## Seeding Information

The teams in the USBC are seeded based on a combination of Individual Positioning Points \& ACBL Performance Points, including masterpoints. The seeding points for an individual player are capped at 65 . Teams are seeded based on the average seeding points for the team, except that the three teams with byes are seeded on the basis of their PPs. The teams and their seed positions are listed in the table below. Note that the top 4 finishers in the Round Robin receive additional seeding points, which may change the seeding order for the Knockout stage. Teams may also add or drop players before the USBC, which would change their seeding points.

## Session Entry Fees

Jimmy Cayne was practicing online in one of his famous matches earlier this week. Jimmy was partnered by Dana De Falco and his teammates were Gawel and Brewiak from Poland. Cayne's team was facing a team of Jordanians.

Cayne defended 3NT. He led the club queen and Abu-Jabar ducked! Cayne shifted to a heart... Jabar inserted the ten from dummy forcing the ace from DeFalco. DeFalco returned a club but it was too late to do significant damage. The heart suit was running and Jabar scored his game.

At the other table, Gawel/Brewiak played in 4H. Nimer led a club to the king and ace. Samer cashed his club queen and continued clubs. Gawel ruffed with the ten, Nimer pitching a small spade.

With no other convenient entries to dummy to lead toward the H: KQ9, Gawel was forced to use a diamond to cross. He won the diamond queen and led the heart deuce, inserting the nine. North won his trump ace ace and continued a diamond... Oops! South ruffed and the contract was defeated one trick.

## Puzzle Page ... OCTA-PLUS



Can you work out which eight numbers correspond with the letters A-H on the Octa-Plus diagram? No two numbers are the same. Each number is a whole number and no number is less than 1 or greater than 50.

1. $D$ minus $F$ is either 15 or 16 .
2. $B$ is half of $F$.
3. A seventh of $D$ is a whole number and odd.
4. H is a third of F .
5. E equals H plus D.
6. $G$ equals $E$ minus $B$.
7. $C$ is a fifth of $G$.
8. A is equal to 120 minus the sum of the other seven numbers.

## Answer to Puzzle:

All the numbers are whole numbers (intro). D divided by seven is a whole number and odd (clue 3), so D is an odd number. B is half of F (clue 2), so F is an even number, so D minus F is 15 (1). No number is less than 1 or greater than 50 (intro). D is a multiple of seven and odd (above) and $D$ minus $F$ is 15 (above), so $D$ is 21,35 or 49 and $F$ is 6,20 or 34 . H is a third of $F$ (4), so $D$ is $21, F$ is $6, B$ is 3 and $H$ is 2 . $E$ is 23 (5). $G$ is 20 (6). C is 4 (7). A is 41 (8).
