## Day Two of the Quarterfinals

Fleisher started the day down 62 to Gordon. It's an interesting match with Berkowitz on Gordon and Willenken on Fleisher. Willenken is married to Berkowitz's daughter, Dana, a fine player in her own right. As Lisa Berkowitz told her daughter on the phone yesterday, "Someone you love will win this match!"

Fleisher made an amazing run in the first four boards on day two, scoring 45 IMPs in the first four boards.

In both rooms South opened 1D. Willenken, like most of the Wests who were faced with a 1D opening, doubled. Berkowitz bid 1H; Rosenberg 1S; Sonty passed and Willenken, with 8 probable tricks in his own hand, bid the NT game. With hearts 4-4 and diamonds 3-3, it all came down to the spade guess. Willenken ducked the heart lead, won the second heart with the ace, played six rounds of diamonds, and ran the ST. Contract making.

Apparently, Gordon/Pratap play that 2D over a nebulous 1D opener is natural. While it's fun to use gadgets, this wasn't the time. Gordon overcalled 2D and played it there... Honestly, Gordon deserved better. 3NT is a poor game requiring both 3-3 diamonds and 4-4- hearts. 7 IMPs to Fleisher.

Usually when opponents interfere, it becomes harder to get to game. In the Closed Room where Gordon overcalled 2C, it apparently had no effect. Moss made a simple raise to 2 S ; Pratap supported Gordon's clubs; Delmonte, liking his partner's support and facing a non-minimum made a game try with 3 H . Moss knew he was down in the match. Hearts looked better than spades to him given both his length and suit quality. He raised to game.

Gordon led the CA, followed by a diamond which Ish ruffed. Ish played two rounds of spades and two rounds of hearts, picking up the onside queen. He ruffed another diamond to hand, ruffed a club in dummy, pulled the last trump and claimed 11 tricks. 11 IMPs to Fleisher


## VuGraph Information

The 2015 USBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Round of 16, in which we will cover 2 or 3 matches. The Round of 16 will start Sunday, May 10th. From the Quarterfinals on, we will cover all of the tables in play. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the BBO website where you can log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USBC matches you want to watch. There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, who may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are Chicago times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the BBO Vugraph schedule site)

During the Semifinals and Finals, all of the teams will play the same boards.
During the Round of 16 , each team will play a different set of boards.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Web Vugraphs are posted about half an hour after completion of the Vugraph show.

You can find the hand records for USBC matches on the USBF site, linked to the scorecards you can get to by clicking on 2015USBC under "Event Results" in the upper left of each page

No Electronic Devices are Permitted in the Playing Area. This applies to players AND kibitzers.
Severe penalties will be assessed for violation of this rule. Please turn off all cell phones and check them at the door. The USBF reserves the right to wand anyone entering the playing field.


It's interesting field protection when both tables play the same opening bids. Here, both Easts were able to open 2D showing three suits, short diamonds and 1115 HCP .

In the Open Room, where Berkowitz was playing 4H, Rosenberg led a diamond to Berk's A; Berk ruffed a diamond; played a club to the queen; and ruffed a second diamond. He then cashed the A and K of clubs, pitching spades. In the end, he lost three trump tricks to make four hearts.

In the Closed Room, the auction was more exciting. Gordon doubled Delmonte's 2D opener, thinking he was showing diamonds. Pratap must have thought Gordon was showing a good hand takeout for his double. He feared that the opponents were stealing white on red. Backing up his thinking, he romped in with four spades. When Ish doubled, East/West could have escaped to 5D. That won't be a great success but it likely would have failed two less tricks.

Having no fit and no tricks, four spades went light five tricks for -1400. 14 IMPs to Fleisher.

## Seeding Information

The teams in the USBC are seeded based on a combination of Individual Positioning Points \& ACBL Performance Points, including masterpoints. The seeding points for an individual player are capped at 65 . Teams are seeded based on the average seeding points for the team, except that the three teams with byes are seeded on the basis of their PPs. The teams and their seed positions are listed in the table below. Note that the top 4 finishers in the Round Robin receive additional seeding points, which may change the seeding order for the Knockout stage. Teams may also add or drop players before the USBC, which would change their seeding points.

In the Closed Room, Willenken decided not to bid over the strong club opener. Sontag and Berkowitz had a natural auction to reach 3NT. With diamonds having been bid twice, and spades three times, Rosenberg was faced with the choice of leading the K from KQJ of hearts (declarer's 1st suit) or leading the singleton queen of the unbid suit. He chose poorly on this hand. He led the HK. Declarer won the singleton ace in dummy and went to work on spades.

Willenken won the spade and shifted to a club but it was too late. Declarer won the club in dummy and played a second small spade. Willenken won this and shifted back to hearts. Declarer had nine tricks when spades split.

In the other room, Pratap had no problem leading his queen of clubs after Gordon's overcall. Declarer won the club in dummy and played the DK getting the bad news. He ducked a spade and clubs were continued, setting up the defenders' clubs. When Gordon gained the lead with his second high spade, he cashed for down three. 11 IMPs to Gordon.

Clubs broke 3-3 and Kamil was able to discard his losing diamond, making four spades.

In the Closed Room, Seamon won his spade king and put through an immediate diamond. Stewart won his ace and played a second spade. Seamon was able to win his ace and cash two rounds of diamonds to defeat the contract one trick. 10 IMPs to Cayne
