Lall won the queen and continued spades. Declarer played a club toward the jack; Bathurst won and played hearts. 800 to N/S

In the Fireman/Cayne match, Cayne opened an unusual weak two... a six card suit with everything outside! Wolpert balanced with 3NT. Cayne found the less than inspired lead of the DK. Wolpert won and continued diamonds. Cayne decided to attack hearts. He led low, but no matter what he did, the suit was blocked. Seamon won the HK and knowing that there was no longer a future in hearts, tried the CK. Wolpert ducked. Hearts were played... too late to defeat the contract more than one!

As the commentators on VuGraph mentioned... and as was mentioned earlier in the week in the Daily Bulletin, rebids by preemptor can be a dangerous practice.

In an attempt to do the unusual, Zia opened 2D on his seven card suit. It went pass, pass, and Demuy balanced with 3C. Zia rebid 3D!! Kranyak doubled and Demuy, not clear on whether double was cards or majors, bid 3H. Kranyak pulled this to the miracle 3NT... a contract very unlikely to be reached on any other auction.

Kamil led a fourth best spade; Kranyak ducked and collected his nine for $+400 \ldots$ a great result N/S.

At the other table, Hurd and Wooldridge reached a logical 4D contract $\mathrm{E} / \mathrm{W}$. They had to lose two diamonds, and two black aces for down one. 8 IMPs to Fireman.

Kranyak and Demuy are playing a forcing club system. It can be tactical to bid over the strong opener before they know what they have or before they start to relay. Zia overcalled 1 H and, while reasonable, once the opponents bid 3NT knowing he held hearts, he convinced himself to lead his second suit: spades. Zia led the SA. This was good for Demuy who now had two spades, two diamonds, and five clubs.

At the other table, where Cheek opened a standard 2NT, Hurd led a low heart. This established the hearts so he could cash when he gained the entry with his SA. Cheek went light one trick. 10 more IMPs to Fireman


## VuGraph Information

The 2015 USBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Round of 16, in which we will cover 2 or 3 matches. The Round of 16 will start Sunday, May 10th. From the Quarterfinals on, we will cover all of the tables in play. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the BBO website where you can log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch, or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled VUGRAPH and you'll be able to choose which of the USBC matches you want to watch. There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, who may not have time to respond to private messages. Thank you.

During the Semifinals and Finals, all of the teams will play the same boards.
During the Round of 16 , each team will play a different set of boards.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Web Vugraphs are posted about half an hour after completion of the Vugraph show.

You can find the hand records for USBC matches on the USBF site, linked to the scorecards you can get to by clicking on 2015USBC under "Event Results" in the upper left of each page

In the Closed Room, Berkowitz led a top of nothing diamond to partner's queen and declarer's ace. On that lead, all transportation problems were cured and Diamond coasted home with 14 tricks: 5 diamonds, 5 clubs, 3 hearts and 1 spade.

In the Open Room, it was not so easy. Greco led a top of nothing club against the slam. Gordon won the ace, cashed the queen, led a heart to the ace, cashed the club king and eight, Hampson, pitching a spade. Gordon led a diamond to his ace to work on hearts. When hearts didn't break, the contract was doomed.

Had Gordon been psychic, he actually could have made the hand by cashing the SA before crossing to the HA. Now West will be forced to discard a spade and a heart on the run of the clubs. Declarer can then lead a diamond to the jack, cash the king/queen of hearts and exit a heart. West will have only a diamond left to return. As it went, 11IMPs to Diamond

In the Cayne/Fireman match, Seamon and Cayne played 7D and made it when both the diamonds and clubs behaved. Kranyak and Demuy played 4NT, making seven after receiving a diamond lead. 14 IMPs to Cayne

The teams in the USBC are seeded based on a combination of Individual Positioning Points \& ACBL Performance Points, including masterpoints. The seeding points for an individual player are capped at 65 . Teams are seeded based on the average seeding points for the team, except that the three teams with byes are seeded on the basis of their PPs. The teams and their seed positions are listed in the table below. Note that the top 4 finishers in the Round Robin receive additional seeding points, which may change the seeding order for the Knockout stage. Teams may also add or drop players before the USBC, which would change their seeding points.

## 10. Which weighs more, a pound of feathers or a pound of gold?

The answer is actually feathers. We need proof though. One pound of feathers is more than one pound of gold because the "pound" unit is different. The most commonly used system of weights in the US and Great Britain is the avoirdupois system, where 1 pound $=16$ ounces. This is used for most solid objects, except for precious metals and gems; gold is weighed by a special system, called the troy system, where one troy pound $=12$ troy ounces. Where one avoirdupois ounce is 28.35 grams, one troy ounce is about 31.10 grams. To convert from avoirdupois pounds to troy pounds, multiply the first by 1.2152 to get its equivalent in troy measurement. Therefore, one pound of feathers in troy weight is actually 1.2152 pounds (one avoirdupois pound), compared to one troy pound of gold. And the feathers win.


Hampson led the DQ to dummy's king and Greco's ace. Greco returned the D7 and Hampson dutifully led a club. Declarer won the CA and, not being able to afford a second diamond ruff, disdained the trump finesse, playing ace of spades and conceding the king. Making four...

In the Closed Room, it would appear that a small amount of interference created a large amount of confusion.

Diamond opened one strong club. Platnick bid one diamond, negative. Sontag threw in a 2 C bid on his six card suit, brave at this vulnerability but not insane. Diamond passed and Berkowitz raised to 3C taking up just enough of the bidding room. Platnick doubled and diamond bid 3H. Platnick bid 3S and Diamond bid 3NT. Berk passed and Platnick bid 4D, likely believing the auction would not end here.

It did!

Sontag led the C8, Platnick winning the ace in dummy. A diamond was led to the jack and queen. Sontag led the CT and declarer ruffed. The SQ went to the K and another club forced declarer one more time. Platnick claimed 7 tricks... contract down three for -300 ...

In the Fireman/Cayne match, Seamon and Cayne missed game on this board, playing the hand in two spades. They made four for +170 .

In the other room, Kranyak and Demuy bid the spade game and made it for +620 .

In the Closed Room, David Berkowitz made an excellent decision to bid the slam. East/West held all the right controls and all the right shortnesses.

Diamond led the DT to the stiff ace in dummy. Sontag cashed the ace and king of clubs. He played a heart to the ace and a spade to the ace, and ruffed a heart in hand. He ruffed a diamond to dummy, played the ten of hearts, ruffed in hand when Platnick covered and claimed 12 tricks.

In the Open Room, Greco appears to have made a somewhat conservative decision to bid only game.

In the Closed Room, Wooldridge balanced with a double and Hurd decided to pass and defend. The contract can be defeated three tricks but this requires that West uses his trump ace to ruff a spade.

As it was, a diamond was led to the ace. A spade was returned to the king. Wooldridge trumped a diamond. He played a club to the king and Hurd returned a spade to the ace. At this point, Wooldridge needs to play a third spade. Instead, he tried the ace of clubs and declarer was able to escape for down two.

In the Open Room, Kranyak led a spade against 3NT. Since clubs didn't run, the defense was able to collect five tricks to defeat 3NT.
