Semi-Final Action...

Board 3 in the first segment was interesting. At three of the tables, South opened 3D and North jumped to game. Bramley was the only one to double.

At the fourth table, in Moss/Gupta, Bertens passed in first seat. Gupta opened in third seat and a highly competitive auction ensued. East/West (DelMonte/Moss) bid to 5H which is cold. Bertens wisely took the 6D sacrifice for -300 when the opponents collected the first three tricks.

At the other table in that match, against 5D undoubled, Cheek led a small club, and again, the defense took the first three tricks. 6 IMPs to Moss

In Robinson/Rosenthal, against 5D undoubled, a spade was led and Peter Boyd, declarer, had no problem taking the finesse. It was all a matter of math. If the finesse works, he scores +400. If the finesse loses, he scores -100 instead of -50 ... no real IMP cost.

Against 5D doubled, in the other room, Kit also led a spade. Willenken had a tougher choice. He could take the finesse and score +550 if it worked but he would lose 300 if the finesse failed. Since the opponents are clearly cold for a heart game, a score of -100 would be an 11 IMP positive position; a score of -300 would be an 8 IMP positive position; and a score of 550 would be a 15 IMP gain. Willenken took the middle road. He rose with the SA.

Vugraph... Special "PANDEMIC" instructions...

The **2020 USBF Invitational 1** will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Quarterfinals. All of the matches will be listed in the BBO Vugraph Theatre.

To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website**, log on to BBO, go to "Vugraph" and choose which match to watch. To watch on your smartphone or tablet, install the BBO app and watch using that.

The tables listed in the Vugraph Theatre are not real Vugraph tables, just links to actual tables on BBO where the players are playing. What you will see once you click on a "Vugraph" table is the same thing you would see if you got to the BBO table by searching for your favorite player and clicking on "join" on his or her profile. This means that some things are different from a normal Vugraph table:

1. We aren't able to load a starting score for segments after the first one. Instead, we will be putting the score from previous quarters in the Vugraph Theatre list, and will put (+##) after the name of the leading team in the score box to show how much that team was ahead at the start of the session. You will be able to determine the "real" running score by adding the score shown in the score box to the score after the +.
2. We do not have to have both tables "on Vugraph" to let you choose which table to watch. We only have 4 special Vugraph operators who can set up the links from the Vugraph Theatre to the tables in play. So for the Quarterfinal we will list one table from each match. To get to the other table, click on the blue "hamburger" menu in the upper right of the screen where the hands are shown and select "Other Table."
3. The names you see are the players' BBO names, but all of them will have their real names in the profile you can get by clicking on their name.
4. We will not have the usual pop ups with player pictures and links to convention cards. Instead, each pair has prepared a BBO convention card with links to the pair's USBF System Summary Form and either filled in the BBO convention card or provided a link to an electronic convention card. You can get to the BBO convention card using the hamburger menu, and to the linked system information by selecting the appropriate URL and either copying it and pasting it into a new tab or window, or right-clicking on it and going to it in a new tab or window (the links are not clickable).

There will often be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, although she will also be dealing with tournament issues and may not respond promptly.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are Eastern US times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the **BBO Vugraph schedule site**)

All of the teams will play the same boards throughout the event.



Directions

- Cook noodles according to package directions. Set aside.
- In a large skillet, cook sausage, mushrooms, onion and garlic over medium heat until sausage is no longer pink and vegetables are tender, 5-7 minutes. Stir in flour, salt and paprika until blended; gradually stir in broth. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook and stir 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Turn off heat. Stir in sour cream. Serve with noodles and sprinkle with parsley.

Skillet Mac and Cheese

Ingredients

- 2 cups uncooked elbow macaroni (about 8 ounces)
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1-1/2 cups half-and-half cream
- 3/4 pound process cheese (Velveeta), cubed
- Optional toppings: fresh arugula, halved cherry tomatoes and coarsely ground pepper



Directions

- Cook macaroni according to package directions; drain.
- Meanwhile, in a large cast-iron or other heavy skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth; gradually whisk in cream. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until thickened, about 2 minutes. Reduce heat; stir in cheese until melted.
- Add macaroni; cook and stir until heated through. Top as desired.

Blackened Tilapia With Zucchini Noodles

Ingredients

- 2 large zucchini (about 1-1/2 pounds)
- 1-1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 3/4 teaspoon salt, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 tsp garlic powder

- 4 tilapia fillets (6 ounces each)
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 cup pico de gallo



Directions

- Trim ends of zucchini. Using a spiralizer, cut zucchini into thin strands.
- Mix cumin, 1/2 teaspoon salt, smoked paprika, pepper and garlic powder; sprinkle generously onto both sides of tilapia. In a large nonstick skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. In batches, cook tilapia until fish just begins to flake easily with a fork, 2-3 minutes per side. Remove from pan; keep warm.
- In same pan, cook zucchini with garlic over medium-high heat until slightly softened, 1-2 minutes, tossing constantly with tongs (do not overcook). Sprinkle with remaining salt. Serve with tilapia and pico de gallo.

Bacon Chicken Club Pizza

Ingredients

- 1 prebaked 12-inch pizza crust
- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 shallot, minced
- 2 cups shredded rotisserie chicken
- 1-1/2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 8 slices ready-to-serve fully cooked bacon, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 3 tablespoons 2% milk
- 2 teaspoons ranch salad dressing mix
- 1 cup shredded lettuce
- 1 plum tomato, seeded and chopped



Directions

- Place crust on an ungreased pizza pan. Combine cream cheese and shallot; spread over crust. Top with chicken, cheeses and bacon.
- Bake at 425° until edges are lightly browned and cheese is melted, 12-15 minutes .
- Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the sour cream, milk and dressing mix. Sprinkle lettuce and tomato over pizza; drizzle with dressing.



Bertens has won numerous national and some international tournaments including the Cavendish Invitational, NEC Cup, the Yeh Brothers Cup, the European Open Team Championships.



In world championships for national teams, he earned a Bronze medal in 2007 and played on the Dutch teams that finished 5th to 8th (quarterfinalists) in 2008 and 2009. Bertens and Curtis Cheek have established a partnership that represented the United States in the SportAccord World Mind Games in Beijing in December 2014. Huub's regular partners in the Netherlands included Ton Bakkeren and Berry Westra.

Huub is married to tournament director, Jeanne van den Meiracker. He has one son and one daughter.



If you don't want to play in the USBF Championships that choose teams to represent the USA in the World Bridge Federation Championships, but do want to aid our events, a **Supporting Membership** can be the perfect way for you to be involved. As a Supporting Member, you are eligible to:

1. Enter the fantasy brackets, run on Bridge Winners, for the USBF trials choosing our Open and Senior teams for the World Championships. The highest-ranking Supporting Member in the fantasy brackets for each of these two events will win the prize of your choice - either an online match against the USBC winners or dinner with them at the next NABC.
2. Receive daily emails during the USBF Championships. These will summarize the previous day's results and provide vugraph information and links to daily bulletins containing pictures and commentary on individual hands.
3. Upon advanced request, make arrangements for you to kibitz a USBF member of your choice for a session once each year – either at an NABC or the USBF Championships.
4. Upon advanced request, we will arrange for you to be one of the vugraph commentators for one session of the team trials.

A Supporting Membership is \$25 for one year (\$75 for 3 years) and the ACBL now offers you the chance to become an USBF Supporting Member when you renew your ACBL membership. If you don't want to wait that long, you can join by choosing the red Donate Now button on the USBF website. Your donation will be used to cover inevitable expenses: attorney fees, accounting fees, website support services, tournament directors, insurance, WBF dues, and vugraph operators. The USBF is an all-volunteer organization. Our meetings are by conference call and at NABCS. Board members and the organization's officers are not compensated for meetings, travel, or hotel expenses.

2020 USBCs CANCELLED

Although the WBF has not scheduled the 2021 World Championship, they have announced that there will be only one World Championship in 2021. It will be held in the late summer in Salsomaggiore, Italy. The USBF Board has therefore cancelled the scheduled 2020 USBCs. We expect to hold 2021 USBCs in May of 2021 to select the teams for whatever World Championship the WBF schedules. *The plan (still to be ratified) is to hold the Bermuda Bowl in 2021 and the World Bridge Games in 2022.*

Captains of teams that were entered in the 2020 USBCs should have received an email telling them of the cancellation and that they can either move their entry to 2021 or receive a full refund of their entry fee. If you are a team captain and did not receive the email, you can **email Jan** at [Marteljan@gmail.com](mailto:Jan@Marteljan@gmail.com) for more information.

Byes to the 2021 Open USBC will almost certainly be based on team performance in the 2019 USBC, Spingold, Soloway, and Reisinger, and the 2020 Soloway, and Reisinger and 2021 Vanderbilt, if those events are held.

For new teams, the entry pages for the 2021 USBCs will be online soon at the USBF website: USBF.org. Closing date for guaranteed entries is currently March 31, 2021. By then we should have firm dates for the events and will adjust those dates appropriately.

Moss got off to a quick lead in the first segment, picking up 12 IMPs on the first three boards. The hands were unexciting and picking up 12 IMPs was impressive. After ten boards this lead had grown to 14 IMPs.

Gupta fought back. On Board 11, he gained 7 IMPs when his team successfully declared one-level partscores at both tables. On Board 12, he grabbed the lead, gaining 10 IMPs when he and Bertens bid a cold 4H contract while Dwyer/Huang stopped in 2H.

Board 13, shown here, added 13 IMPs to Gupta's lead when Bertens and Huang took sharply different views of their 7-5 minor suit fit.

At one table, Gupta opened 1H, Moss overcalled 1S and Bertens bid 2D with his 8 HCP, a singleton and a void. DelMonte bid 3H (a mixed spade raise) and Gupta had no problem bidding the heart game.

In the other room, after 1H-1S, Huang chose to negative double with the 7-5 South hand. With suits of wildly different length and strength, a negative double may create a faulty picture for partner. Cheek showed his spade raise by bidding 2NT (either mixed or better than limit) and Dwyer competed with 3H. Korbelt, holding six cards in spades, had an easy 3S bid. Huang passed!! (In the words of the late bridge great, Grant Baze, "6-5 come alive" He'd have most certainly come alive with a SEVEN/FIVE).

Dwyer started with three rounds of hearts, not expecting Huang to be 7-5 in the minors with a void in spades. Cheek discarded a diamond on the third heart, drew trumps and guessed clubs to make five.

13 IMPs to Gupta.

In Rosenthal/Robinson, both North/South pairs bid and played 5D. Both Peter Boyd and Chris Willenken chose 2D over the 1H-1S bids.

On page 14, we saw how a negative double made the South hand hard to bid. On this hand from the second segment, we see how the lack of a negative double made the hand hard to bid.

At three of the tables in play, the final contract was a major suit slam.

Both tables in Gupta/Moss played in 6H making seven with a perfect lie of the cards and a 7-2 trump fit breaking 3-1.

Once Cheek started with a strong 2C, he and Korbel could never stop short of slam.

DelMonte started with 1H. When Gupta bid 2D and Moss negative doubled, DelMonte was off to the races. He cued 3D; Moss bid 3NT and Ish knew she had to have good cards for him. He jumped to 6H and it was another boring push!

In Rosenthal/Robinson, however, IMPs were swung. Woolsey/Bramley found 6S on a 5-3 fit after an interesting auction where Woolsey opened a strong club. Silverstein overcalled 2D, interfering with any relays. Bramley was not deterred. He showed a positive response with 5+ spades and Woolsey jumped to 5D, exclusion KC. He found Bramley with the spade ace without the spade queen and placed the hand in 6S, which, like 6H, made 13 tricks on the favorable lie of the cards.

In Gupta/Moss, Korbel/Cheek played game in their 5-5 heart fit. The defense took two diamonds and a club and it was done.

At the other table, where Bertens chose to open 4C on his jack high suit plus four diamonds to the AK. Bathurst doubled and when Gupta furthered the preempt to 5C, Lall penalized and they played it there. The defense took their two spades and one club for the par result.

11 IMPs to Gupta, already up six in the match

In Robinson/Rosenthal, Berkowitz and Migry found their ten card heart fit after a 3C-double-Pass-4H auction. Again, the defense took their three tricks and Rosenthal scored +620.

At the other table, the wheels came off the bus. In the absence of an opening preempt, Woolsey opened 1S. Bramley's 2NT showed a conventional raise of limit or better. 3D showed a non minimum with some shortness. Bramley bid 4S to play and Willenken doubled.

Gino led the CA. Willenken signaled with the club jack for a heart switch. Gino led a heart and Willenken ruffed!!

Chris cashed his ace and king of diamonds and defeated the game one trick for +200.

With East as declarer, all three South players led the C6. All three declarers won the CJ and played the S7 to dummy's king and North's ace. **At this point only Gino found the killing play!**

Gino had some "extra" information from the opponent's auction and he took full advantage of it.

Bramley's 2NT rebid showed fewer than three spades!!

When Gino won the SA, he returned the jack knowing that he would bury Bramley's spot whatever it was. In this case, there was no spot and this set up two more spade tricks to go with North/South's three aces!

At all other tables, 3NT was successful.
