Knockouts, January 21-24:

- One match per day. 56 boards per match.
- There will be a short Captains' meeting on January 18th to set the KO bracket. The precise method of setting the bracket is set forth in the Special Conditions of Contest. Summary: the top 4 teams from Round Robin Stage 1 will select their opponents for the Round of 16 from the bottom 8 qualifiers. Watching online, Even delayed, Is the best way to see How a hand's bid and played!

Quarter 4: 8:30 pm
To kibitz, go to the RealBridge kibitzing website, enter your name and click on Log In. That will take you to a screen where you can select the event to kibitz.
After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams \#5, you will be taken to a lobby with a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people on the right. The table listing shows the team \& player names at each table, as well as the board being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.
At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.
There is a chat window on the right of the screen. You can type chat into the chat window.
Some things you can do to get more information:
If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted/Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation.
-- "Rewind" using the slider underneath the "table." Move the handle to the left to go to earlier tricks.
-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.
----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.
----You can also click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.
----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.
--In the upper left corner:
----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).
----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).
The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right should you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

## Timing of Deferral

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.
The first half KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board. For the second half of the KO matches, the delay will be until the quarter is scheduled to be completed, so players will not be able to get useful state of match information. That means that the 3rd quarter kibitzing will start at 6:25 EST.

## Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

## Coconut Cookies

Start to finish: 22 minutes (10 minutes active)
Servings: 24 cookies

## Ingredients

- 600 grams all-purpose flour
- $1 / 2$ teaspoon baking soda
- 500 grams unsalted butter, softened
- 500 grams brown sugar
- 80 grams dried coconut, shredded
- 100 milliliters coconut milk
- 6 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract


## Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 F (176 C)
- In a bowl, sift together the flour and baking soda
- In another bowl, beat butter with brown sugar until smooth

- Beat in eggs one by one until well blended
- Mix in the coconut milk and vanilla extract
- Fold in dry mixture of flour and baking soda, and then the dried coconut until evenly distributed throughout the batter
- Using an ice-cream scoop or 1/4-cup measure, scoop cookie dough onto a baking sheet and mold into a circular shape
- Bake until slightly puffed but barely colored, 9-12 minutes

Salmon Patties
PREP TIME15 mins
COOK TIME10 mins
TOTAL TIME25 mins
SERVINGS4 servings
If the mixture is too wet to form patties, add a little more shredded bread (not the crusts) to t mixture. If too dry, add a tablespoon of water.
Ingredients


- 1 (14.75 ounce) can salmon, drained of all but 2 tablespoons of liquid, flaked
- 1 large slice bread , crust removed, shredded (1 cup, 50 g )
- 3 tablespoons green onion, chopped
- 1 medium garlic clove, minced
- 1 tablespoon fresh dill, chopped, or 1 teaspoon dried
- 3 tablespoons minced green bell pepper
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 large egg
- $1 / 2$ teaspoon sweet paprika
- 1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- $1 / 4$ teaspoon salt
- Several turns of freshly ground black pepper
- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Method

1. Mix patty ingredients:

In a large bowl, gently mix together the salmon (including 2 tablespoons of the can liquid), bread, green onion, garlic, dill, bell pepper, flour, egg, paprika, lemon zest, lemon juice, salt and pepper.
2. Form patties:

Form 8 patties, about $1 / 2$ inch thick.
3. Chill at least 30 min :

Cover the patties and chill in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes (or up to several hours) to help them firm up.
4. Brown in skillet:

Heat olive oil over medium high heat in a large skillet. Cook the patties until nicely browned on both sides, about 3-4 minutes per side.

Ingredients

- 8 ounces cooked chicken (about 2 cups shredded)
- 1 teaspoon oil
- $1 / 4$ yellow onion, minced (about $1 / 3$ cup)
- 3 cloves garlic
- 15-ounce can tomato sauce
- $1 / 3$ cup water
- 4-ounce can mild green diced chilis
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- $1 / 2$ teaspoon cumin
- 8 taco-sized flour tortillas
- 8 ounces cotija cheese
- To serve:
- Cilantro
- Radishes, thinly sliced
- Sour cream
- Avocado
- Jalapeño

Method


1. Shred chicken:

Shred the leftover chicken so it's ready when you need it. You should have about 2 cups.
2. Make the sauce:

In a large, high-sided skillet set over medium heat, add the oil. Once the oil shimmers, add onion and garlic and cook for 1 minute, just until softened.
Add tomato sauce, water, diced green chilis, chili powder, oregano, and cumin. Stir together, then let the sauce simmer on medium to medium-low while you assemble the enchiladas.
3. Assemble the enchiladas:

Put about 2 tablespoons of shredded chicken down the center of each tortilla. (You don't really have to measure the meat. Just divide it evenly among the tortillas!) Sprinkle about 1 tablespoon cotija cheese (just eyeball it) across the chicken, and spoon 1-2 teaspoons sauce over the cheese.
Fold in the sides of the tortilla, roll it up, and put it seam side down in the sauce. Nestle them in the pan. Repeat this until the pan is full. Spoon sauce over the top of the enchiladas.
4. Top with cheese and cover:

Sprinkle additional cotija cheese over the top of the enchiladas. Cover with a lid and let them simmer until the cheese is melted and the tortillas look puffy, like they soaked up some sauce. This should take about 5 minutes.
5. Garnish and serve:

Lift the lid and sprinkle cilantro and thinly sliced radishes over the top. Serve alongside sliced avocado, jalapeño, and sour cream.

## Practice on RealBridge...

When Nickell and Katz's teammates are busy, they frequently practice online against Stan and me. This practice is good for all of us. It helps us hone our systems and remember bids that infrequently arise. For us, it is especially good because we discuss the hands in the days following the sessions with Ralph and he critiques our bidding and play without inciting our fighting! Our practice sessions usually take place on BBO where Ralph and Nick generate a flock of kibitzers. The kibitzers are fun when they chat with the table and we chat with them. Because there are no masterpoints involved, the game is "pure" and discussion is open and beneficial on both sides without being unethical.

This week we tried something new. We played Ralph and Nick on RealBridge. It took me a little time to find the bells and whistles (like "undo"), however, once I got used to it, I really liked the RealBridge platform. As players, we could see each other (at least we could see Stan and Ralph and Nick... I didn't have the time to put on makeup before the game!) And, we discussed aloud any questions that arose. It was very friendly and the only thing missing were the kibs ... and, honestly, being able to talk to one another more than made up for that.


Board 12 was interesting. Stan and I surprised Ralph and Nick by playing strong jump shifts! Apparently, we're dinosaurs, however, on this hand, using the convention made made it really easy to bid the NT grand. Once I bid 2S, Stan asked for keycards. I showed 2 with the queen and he asked for specific kings. I showed the club king. When Stan bid 7 S , I considered passing, but on
 further evaluation, I felt we would be safer in 7NT. I hadn't shown the HK or the DQ, and the DQ had to be worth its weight in gold considering Stan's opening bid was 1D and he followed it up by bidding the grand (clearly implying he held both the DA and DK). I dutifully corrected to 7NT and Stan claimed 15 tricks.


Another comparison between BBO and RealBridge relates to scoring. On BBO, one earns an IMP Pairs score. On RealBridge, one simply judges one's bidding \& play themselves. I would miss the scoring were it not that the field on BBO is so random. It was better not to have a score and simply judge our performance ourselves!

In last week's practice session on BBO, Nickell/Katz reached an aggressive 4 H game when Katz raised to 3 H with a seven card suit and only 3 HCP . This invite/ block tactic is successful in many situations. On this hand, while $\mathrm{N} / \mathrm{S}$ can't make anything, it still takes perfect defense to defeat 4 H .

Suzi, North, led the DA. Dummy played the D3. In an effort to conceal the diamond position, Stan followed with the D4. Nickell completed the "wish trick" with the diamond deuce. A club switch at trick two will defeat the contract. But this is not at all obvious. If South has three or four small diamonds, North can cash a second diamond before deciding what to do next. On the second diamond, South played the D6, hoping it looked like suit preference for clubs. North shifted to the C6. South falsecarded for a second time by winning the CA, concealing the CK. South exited with the S2. Nickell won the spade and trumped a club with dummy's H9. This was followed by two rounds of hearts, on which North discarded the D8 to produce this position:


## Excerpted from a Bridge International Championship Podium Interview 2021...

Jonathan Weinstein (jlw77 on BBO) of St. Louis, Missouri, finished in third place in the very first BBO Bridge International Championship. Scoring a tremendous $65.52 \%$, he also managed to achieve what looks to be the highest individual score of $77.68 \%$ on his first finals board.

Tell us a bit about yourself - what do you do in 'real life', where do live, do you have kids?
I'm an economics professor at Washington University in St. Louis, specializing in game theory. I live in the St. Louis area with my wife and two sons, 8 and 5. I'm now 44.

How did you start playing bridge?
My grandmother was a lifelong bridge nut, so I knew the basics from a very early age, and I became a tournament player during college.

What do you usually like to do or play on BBO?
Family obligations (especially with kids at home during pandemic) make it hard for me to play live games, so the daylong robot games (where I can attend to a household emergency even in the middle of a hand) work well for me. I play some live team games as well.

What tips would you give to players who are new to playing with robots?
Robot advice: (1) Be aware that the robots lead short suits more than humans, both in suits and NT, (2) keep the bidding simple; your guess is better than your partner's.

What other things do you enjoy doing besides bridge? I enjoy chess and backgammon as well as bridge. Along with family and work, that keeps me pretty busy.
