### **Kibitzing on VuGraph**

There will be deferred kibitzing in the KO as there was in the Round Robin:

To kibitz, go to the RealBridge kibitzing website, enter your name and click on Log In. That will take you to a screen where you can select the event to kibitz.

After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams #5, you will be taken to a lobby with a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table, as well as the board being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.

At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. You can type chat into the chat window.

Some things you can do to get more information:

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted/Explained. Click on the bid to see the explanation.

- -- "Rewind" using the slider underneath the "table." Move the handle to the left to go to earlier tricks.
- -- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of the South player's name to get a scorecard for the match.
- ----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all of the tables.
- ----You can also click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.
- ----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.
- --In the upper left corner:
- ----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).
- ----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right should you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

#### **TIMING OF DEFERRAL**

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The first half KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board. For the second half of the KO matches, the delay will be until the quarter is scheduled to be completed, so players will not be able to get useful state of match information. That means that the 3rd quarter kibitzing will start at 6:25 EST.



On Board 7 every N/S pair played in a diamond contract. Five pairs played in 2DX on the following auction:

North can be held to eight tricks on a straightforward defense.

East leads a heart to West's ace and West returns a heart, trumped by East. A spade is played to West's AJ. West exits with a diamond and waits for his heart trick, or, in the alternative, West can exit with a heart and wait for his diamond trick.

The H7 was led at every table.

Against 2DX, two West players, Grue and Diamond, did not believe the this lead was singleton. Those two players ducked the ace and dummy's H9 held the trick. A spade was discarded on the CA and declarer took nine tricks for +380.

In Levine/Gupta, Eddie Wold won the HA and exited with the CJ to dummy's

ace. Michael Rosenberg read the diamond position. He took a first round finesse to the D9 and collected ten tricks for +580. (a 12 IMP win for Gupta when Zia/Lee defeated 3D at the other table).











In Donner/Rosenberg, Brent Xiao won H7 with the HA and exited with a diamond. Declarer, Sandra Rimstedt inserted the D9 to score nine tricks.

In Lall/Rasmussen, Alan Watson led the H7 and Melody Bi won the ace. Melody continued with the H5 (suit preference for spades). Holding no more trumps, Watson exited with the CK to dummy's ace. Declarer, Jim Krekorian led a diamond to the ace and scored another 380.


In the Donner/Rosenberg and Lall/Rasmussen matches +380 was a push.

Zia and Chip Martel both passed the West hand in first seat and defended a 3D contract



Lee led the H7 to Zia's ace and Zia returned the H5, trumped by Lee. Lee returned a spade. Dummy played the king. Zia won the SA exited with the D5.

Meckstroth won the DA and played the ST. Lee rose with the SQ and continued the suit. Meckstroth conceded one more trick for -100. (As mentioned earlier, 12 IMPs to Gupta)



Mark Feldman led the H7 to Martel's ace. Martel exited with the D6. Migry won the DA, cashed the DK and exited with a spade to dummy's king. Martel won the SA and played the SJ. Feldman overtook the spade and continued the suit. Migry had two more red suit losers and scored -100.

At the other table of the Bramley/Rosenthal match, Dana Berkowitz, West, opened 1H and over the negative double bid 2H. Steve Robinson bid 3D with the North hand. Eldad Ginossar led the H7 and Dana won her ace. Dana switched to a club. Robinson won the CA and, with no information about the bad diamond break, led a diamond to the ace and scored +110.

# Some Suggestions For Dining at Home Between Sessions! Pandemic Pleasures...

#### **Pot Stickers**

#### **Ingredients**

#### **DUMPLING**

- ½ lb (227 g) ground pork or turkey
- 2 green onions, minced
- 2 Tbsp (25 g) bamboo shoots, minced
- 1 tsp (5 g) ginger, minced
- 1 Tbsp (9 g) cornstarch
- 2 tsp (10 ml) soy sauce
- ½ tsp (0.33 g) white pepper
- flour for dusting surface

#### **DIPPING SAUCE**

- 6 Tbsp (89 ml) soy sauce
- ¼ C (59 ml) Chinese black vinegar, or balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tbsp (30 ml) sesame oil
- 2 Tbsp (31 g) chili garlic sauce

#### COOKING

- 22 round pot-sticker wrappers
- 2 Tbsp (30 g) vegetable oil
- ¾ C (148 ml) water

#### **Directions**

#### **DUMPLING**

Combine all ingredients thoroughly; set as ide in ightly industric purface with flour to lay assembled dumplings. To assemble dumplings, put 1 T (14 g) filling in center of a wrapper. Press lightly against work surface to form a flat bottom. Brush wrapper edges with water; fold in half; press to seal.

#### **DIPPING SAUCE**

Mix all sauce ingredients together well.

#### COOKING

Heat 1 T (15 ml) oil in a nonstick frying pan on medium high; swirling to coat bottom. Add half of the pot stickers seam side up and cook until bottoms are golden brown, about 3 minutes. Add ½ C (74 ml) water, cover, reduce heat and cook until water is absorbed, about 3 minutes. Remove from pan and repeat with remaining pot stickers. Serve with dipping sauce.

Prep time: 5 minutes.

Cook time: 12 minutes.

Makes 4 servings.



#### **Ingredients**

# **Tomato Basil Feta Macaroons**

#### **COOKIE**

- 34 C (64 g) almond meal
- 34 C (98 g) confectioners' sugar
- 2 lg egg whites
- 34 C (177 ml) water
- 34 C (144 g) sugar

#### **FILLING**

- 2 Tbsp (30 g) feta cheese
- 2 Tbsp (30 g) cream cheese
- 2 Tbsp (5 g) basil, finely chopped
- Few drops lemon juice
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 med ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded and finely diced



#### **Directions**

#### COOKIE

Preheat oven to 340°F (170°C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Place a damp kitchen towel on counter. Place almond meal and confectioners' sugar in medium bowl; stir to combine. Place 1 of the egg whites in another medium bowl and beat with an electric mixer until firm shiny peaks form. Spoon into almond mixture, folding in gently to combine. Place remaining egg white in a medium bowl and beat until soft peaks form. Set aside.

Place water and granulated sugar in a small saucepan. Place over medium low heat, stirring frequently until sugar has dissolved. Continue to boil until mixture reaches a temperature of 245°F (120°C) on a candy thermometer. Very gradually pour sugar syrup into egg white, constantly beating with an electric mixer until shiny peaks form. Add almond mixture and gently fold in.

Spoon mixture into a large pastry bag fitted with a large round tip and form 24 small disks about 2 in (5.1 cm) across, leaving an inch of space in between. Let stand at room temperature 20 minutes. Bake for 12 minutes. Remove from oven and, leaving macarons on parchment paper, move paper to damp kitchen towel. Let cool to room temperature.

#### **FILLING**

To make filling, place feta, cream cheese, basil, lemon juice, salt and pepper in a small bowl, mashing with a fork to combine. Stir in tomatoes. To assemble, spread mixture thinly between 2 macarons.

Prep time: 38 minutes.

Cook time: 12 minutes.

#### Shrimp and Crab Wontons

#### **Ingredients**

- ½ C (170 g) finely shredded cabbage, preferably Savoy
- Kosher salt to taste
- 6 oz (170 g) shrimp and lump crabmeat, chopped
- 1 C (50 g) spring onions, finely chopped
- 1 Tbsp (14 g) ginger purée, or finely grated ginger
- 1 tsp (5 g) soy sauce
- 1 tsp (4 g) sesame oil
- 1 Tbsp (15 g) cream cheese
- 1 14-oz (398-g) pkg wonton wrappers
- 2–3 C (473–682 g) vegetable or peanut oil

#### **Directions**

Combine cabbage, salt, shrimp and crab, onions, ginger, soy sauce, sesame oil and cream cheese in a bowl and mix well. Separate wonton wrappers and arrange on a dry surface. Place a scant tsp of filling in center of each wrapper; wet edges and seal by bringing opposite corners together, forming a triangle. Bring 2 remaining corners together toward center and seal with a pinch.

Preheat oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Working in batches, fry wontons until golden brown, about 6 minutes. Remove with a slotted spoon and transfer to paper towels. Serve hot with your favorite dipping sauce, such as hoisin; sweet and sour or Chinese mustard.







Platnick preferenced clubs and Diamond responded 3S showing spade shortage.

4D was keycard for clubs and 4H showed 0 or 3 keycards.

Rasmussen led the SK.

Platnick won the spade and trumped a spade in dummy. The CQ was led and ducked around the table.

Platnick led the C6 to his jack. Rasmussen won the CK and continued clubs. Platnick won the CA and cashed the C9, drawing the last trump.

Brian played four rounds of diamonds and led the HJ. South played low and declarer finessed, taking twelve tricks and making his contract.

At the other table, Bi/Watson stopped in 3NT and took ten tricks.

### Excerpted from a Waterloo, Canada Publication, originally published 10/19/2012, updated 4/9/2020 Bridge Pro Unveils his Secrets as a Hired Gun... Article was updated Apr. 09, 2020

WATERLOO, Canada - If you've got a bridge tournament you simply must win, then **Daniel Korbel** is the man you want sitting on the other side of the table. But it'll cost you.

For the past six years, the 30-year-old Waterloo man has made a living as a hired gun at major bridge tournaments around North America. He's paid by well-heeled players to be their partner in card games they really, really don't want to lose.

"If you're worth \$200 million, you'd certainly hire a gardener and a maid and whatever else. What's the difference with a bridge pro?" Korbel said. "Some of these guys just love to win. If you're very competitive, this is a good way to improve your chances."

Unlike poker tournaments, bridge tournaments rarely have prize money. Instead, professionals earn their living through these affluent "sponsors" - players who happily pay upward of \$30,000 or more to a top pro to be their teammate at a week-long national tournament.

A regional tournament might net a pro \$5,000 to \$9,000 for seven days' work, Korbel said. His clients have included doctors, lawyers and judges, he said, and generally people with the spare cash to buy their way to bridge bragging rights.

If you're among the best, professional bridge playing can offer a cushy life. The top pros in the U.S. commonly haul in as much as \$200,000 a year...

It's not uncommon for some multi-millionaires to hire as many as five professionals to make up their team, using the pros to substitute in and out of long tournaments. Some players are so in demand they're hired on retainer for a year to play at several tournaments.

Korbel wouldn't say how much he earns playing bridge, but it's enough to live comfortably and is his main source of income.

He moved to Waterloo from Toronto more than a decade ago to study computer science and later English at the University of Waterloo.

By then, Korbel was already playing bridge at a serious level, to the point he took a few years off school to travel from tournament to tournament, honing his chops. He still stays sharp by practicing ways to keep his concentration at its highest level - a skill that goes a long way in bridge.

"I was 19 when the bridge bug really got me," he said. "I played as much as I could. When I couldn't play in a tournament, I'd play on the internet or read bridge books."

A few years earlier, his father's friend had given him a book on bridge. That was his first introduction to the challenging card game, most popular among seniors, that has its own complicated acronyms and language.

"I read it and I had no idea what it said. So I read it again and I still had no idea," Korbel said. "Since then, it's always captivated me. It's the best game that man has ever invented, in my opinion ... If you like the game, it can hold your attention for a lifetime."


Korbel is a young man in an older person's game, but he's had remarkable success. He started playing for Canada's junior national team.

At the World Mind Games in France years ago, there was a global showdown between the best bridge, chess, checkers, go and Chinese chess players on the planet. Dan and his partner were ranked third in the world. Six times, he's finished in the top 10 at North American Championship events.

Part of his job as a professional is to protect his teammates from other hired pros during games, and to keep his affluent partners happy.

"It's like a marriage in that sense," he said. "I try very hard to keep things in perspective. A lot of the people I play with are highly successful. they've done a lot with their lives. Just because I happen to be very good at a card game, I try to not let it go to my head."

It is not surprising that slam was bid at five of the eight tables. It is a little surprising that it wasn't bid more. At most of the tables, East passed and South opened 2C, later revealing a strong two bid in spades. Some method of ace-ask was employed and the contract was placed in either 6NT or 6S.

At Martel/Feldman's table in Bramley v Rosenthal, Feldman opened 2C; Martel responded 2NT showing three controls (A+K or 3 K's). Feldman bid 3S. Martel responded 3NT and Feldman jumped to the NT slam. 12 tricks without a finesse!! At the other table, D. Rosenberg and Rosenthal had 7 rounds of bidding to arrive in 6S. Push board

Seven rounds of bidding sounds like a lot until one considers the NINE rounds that Casen and Krekorian took in Lal-I/Rasmussen to end in 6NT:



At the other table in Lall/Rasmussen, Tsypkin and Rasmussen took only four rounds of bidding but stopped in the spade game. Rasmussen opened 2C; Tsypkin responded 2D, waiting; Rasmussen bid 2S; Rsypkin countered 2NT; Rasmussen jumped to 4S. With the playing strength of the South hand, Jim would have been better off bidding Blackwood than bidding what sounds like a sign-off in 4S.

Passell and Lair took seven rounds of bidding to bid the spade slam. At the other table in Levine/Gupta, Gupta and M. Rosenberg took only three rounds to stop in game after Gupta opened 1S; Rosenberg bid a semi-forcing NT; and Gupta jumped to game!

In Donner/Rosenberg, Grue, playing a strong club system, opened the East hand 1D (could be 2). Duffie overcalled 1S. B Xiao responded 1NT and Duffy jumped to 6S. (What if 1S had been passed out?) At the other table in this match, Rimstedt opened the South hand 1C (16+); Donner bid 1D showing 0-7. Kevin Rosenberg overcalled 2C, and Rimstedt jumped to 4S played it there.

Truly a hand that was all about the bidding... nothing to the play!




David Berkowitz opened 1C with the South hand and Michael Rosenberg overcalled 1D. Rather than bidding his anemic four-card heart suit, Meckstroth raised to 2C.

Zach Grossack made a responsive double, showing the majors and diamond tolerance. Berkowitz bid 3C and Rosenberg bid 3D.

Zach showed his five-card spades suit and Rosenberg retreated to 4D. Meckstroth led the CK. Michael won dummy's ace and led a heart toward the queen. Berkowitz ducked the HK. Michael drove out the DA. South cashed the CJ and exited with a trump.

Rosenberg won and cashed his diamonds, hoping to squeeze South in the majors. Meckstroth held the STx to protect the spade suit and Berkowitz held the HKT to protect the hearts, holding declarer to 10 tricks, scoring 130...the PAR result on this board.

#### Sometimes PAR isn't good enough



Korbel opened 1C and Passell overcalled 1D.

Roger Lee introduced the heart suit and Mark Lair bid 1S. Korbel showed three-card heart support with his support double.

Passell jumped to 3D and Lair bid 3NT.

Korbel led the H4 and declarer won the H9. Lair led a diamond. Korbel won the ace and tried the HK. This was not a success.

Declarer took six diamond tricks, four hearts and two black aces, scoring +690.

#### 11 IMPs to Levine
