Watching online, Even delayed, Is the best way to see How a hand's bid and played!

To kibitz, go to **the RealBridge kibitzing website**, enter your name and click on Log In. Select event. After you select Kibitz JLall Online Teams #5, you will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names as well as the board being played. There will also be information about whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz it.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window.

Some things you can do to get more information:

If there is an asterisk next to a bid, that means it was Alerted or Explained. Click on bid for info. To "rewind" the play using the slider underneath the "table" with hand diagram, just move the vertical handle on the slider to the left to go to earlier tricks.

-- Click on the "Scores" button to the left of South's name to get a scorecard for the match.

You can use this to get lots of information:

- ----Click on a board number to see the hand record and results at all tables.
- ----You can click on a number in a yellow box to get to the hand record from some screens.
- ----In the hand record screen, click on a result to see the bidding and play at a specific table.
- --In the upper left corner:
- ----Click on the yellow box with 4 little boxes to get the match scores for all the matches (that will be IMPs and for the Round Robin will not include scores from previous rounds).
- ----Click on the yellow box with 3 bulleted lines to get Cross-IMPs for the pairs (that will be just for this match).

The Scores information is also available in the lobby using the button at the upper right, in case you want to check on scores before deciding which table to watch.

TIMING OF DEFERRAL

The Round Robin matches will be deferred until each round is completed.

The KO matches will be deferred for half an hour or until each board has been played at all tables, so there may sometimes be a period when nothing new is being shown because one or two tables are very slow to play the board.

Bridge News...



A great opportunity to see juniors in the USBF junior training program take part in an exhibiton match.

James Holzhauer (of Jeopardy! fame), and Zach Grossack will each captain a team. Commentators are international stars of the game, Larry Cohen and George Jacobs. They will comment live on RealBridge. You will be able to ask them a question in text or in video.

What system are they playing? All players are playing the same standard 2/1 system... but will they bid the same way? Once the players have settled on the team convention card, you will be able to see it online with one click.

How do you watch? Go to kibitz.realbridge.online ... No account is needed, just put your name in and join the event.

Spinach Dip... Perfect to Munch while Kibitzing

12 cups water
2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon. kosher salt, divided
3 (10-ounce) package fresh spinach (or 1 [2-pound] bunch spinach, trimmed)

Step 1 a large bowl with ice water; set aside. Bring 12 cups water and 2 tablespoons salt to a boil in rige stockpot over high. Add spinach; cook, stirring constantly, until wilted, about 1 minute. In a slotted spoon or a spider, transfer spinach to prepared ice water; let cool 1 minute. Make the Pickled Onions and Jalapeños:

Place onion and jalapeño in a medium-size heatproof bowl or jar with a lid. Bring water, vinegar, sugar, and salt to a boil in a small saucepan over medium-high, stirring occasionally to dissolve sugar and salt. Pour vinegar mixture over onion mixture in bowl. Let stand at room temperature for 1 hour. Cover and refrigerate for up to 1 week.

Make the chorizo refried beans:

Cook chorizo in a medium-size nonstick skillet over medium heat, stirring often to break it into small crumbles, until browned and cooked through, 10 to 12 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer chorizo to a paper towel-lined plate; set aside at room temperature for up to 1 hour. Add lard to drippings in skillet; melt over medium. Add onion and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, until onion softens slightly, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in beans (with liquid), cumin, and oregano. Cook, stirring often and mashing beans using the back of a spoon, until mixture is creamy and thickened, 20 to 25 minutes. Stir in reserved chorizo and season to taste with salt. Remove from heat. Cover and keep warm for up to 1 hour. Reheat over low, if needed. The chorizo refried beans can be refrigerated for up to 2 days. Rewarm gently before continuing.

Make the goat cheese-spiked queso:

Toss together Monterey Jack cheese, American cheese, and cornstarch in a medium bowl until evenly combined; set aside. Bring evaporated milk, onion powder, and garlic powder to a low simmer in a medium saucepan over medium, whisking occasionally. Gradually add cheese-cornstarch mixture, whisking constantly, until cheese is fully melted and mixture thickens slightly, 2 to 3 minutes. Reduce heat to medium-low, and add goat cheese. Cook, whisking constantly, until queso is smooth and creamy, about 2 minutes. Stir in green chiles. Remove from heat. Cover and keep warm for up to 1 hour. Reheat over low, if needed. The queso can be refrigerated for up to 2 days. Rewarm gently before continuing.

Make the Guacamole:

Using a fork, mash avocados in a medium bowl to desired consistency. Add onion, cilantro, lime juice, and salt; stir to combine. Season to taste with additional lime juice and salt. Press plastic wrap directly onto surface of guacamole, and refrigerate for up to 4 hours.

Preheat oven to 350°F. Arrange half of the chips in an even layer on a large rimmed baking sheet lined with aluminum foil. Top with half of the refried beans, chorizo, and queso. Repeat layering with remaining chips, refried beans, chorizo, and queso. Bake in preheated oven until hot, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile, set aside 1/2 cup drained pickled onions and jalapeños (reserving remaining for another use).

Remove nachos from oven. Top with dollops of guacamole and scatter reserved 1/2 cup pickled onions and jalapeños on top. Garnish with chopped tomato and cilantro leaves. Serve with lime wedges.

A hen and a half lays an egg and a half in a day and a half. How many eggs does one hen lay in one day?

Solution

If 1.5 hens lay 1.5 eggs in 1.5 days, it must be that one hen would lay one egg in the same time period: 1.5 days. Now, if one hen lays one egg in 1.5 days, it means that one hen would lay only $\frac{2}{3}$ of an egg in one day. So the answer is $\frac{2}{3}$ of an egg.

You might argue that hens can't lay just a portion of an egg. Fair enough. But then, of course, the whole premise of the problem, which involves 1.5 hens and 1.5 eggs, doesn't make sense from the start. And that invites pondering whether you can answer a problem that isn't well-posed in the first place. (Is the statement "The king of France is bald" false if there is no king of France?)

Kenny, Abby, and Ned got together for a round-robin pickleball tournament, where, as usual, the winner stays on after each game to play the person who sat out that game. At the end of their pickleball afternoon, Abby is exhausted, having played the last seven straight games. Kenny, who is less winded, tallies up the games played:

Kenny played **eight** games Abby played **12** games Ned played **14** games

Put Brain in Motion!

Who won the fourth game against whom?

Solution

At first glance, this seems so impossible. But it's not...

First, to solve, we need to figure out how many total games were played. We get 34 when we add up the game totals, but since two players play each game, there were 17 games played.

Now, with a brief insight, the solution quickly unravels. The insight is that in a three-person round-robin, every player plays at least every other game. Since 17 total games were played, every player must have played at least eight games.

Since Kenny played exactly eight games, we can infer which ones, as highlighted below:



Now, had Kenny won any of his games, we would have seen him play two games in a row. Instead, it must be the case that he lost every game he played. Thus, we can conclude that Kenny lost the fourth game. But against whom?

We know that Abby and Ned played against each other in every game that Kenny didn't play, which are all the unshaded squares above. In addition, we know Abby played the last seven straight games.

This means we know for sure that Abby played games 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17, which amounts to 12 games, accounting for all of her games. So Ned must have played all other games against Kenny, such that **Ned beat Kenny in the fourth game.**

Meet the Players



Tracy Brines and his wife, Maureen

Tracy is captain of the Brines team in this event! He and his wife sound like good natured characters in the bridge world. Below is a story excerpted from the Unit 163 (lowa) newsletter from 2013 telling of Maureen's quest for a T-shirt at the St. Louis NABC...

Meet Tracy and Maureen Brines, new to Unit 163 in 2013. Tracy and Maureen moved into District 14 to take advantage of a job opportunity for Tracy at the Palo Nuclear Plant. They were then and still are accomplished bridge players. Tracy has directed and taught classes and Maureen, while playing less time, stormed into greatness.

The T-shirt story comes about when they went to the ACBL Spring National in St. Louis, Missouri. It was published in the June Bridge Bulletin and followed up in the August edition. Tracy's letters to the editor tell an amusing and interesting story.

Here is the June letter by Tracy Brines: "At the Spring NABC in St. Louis, Maureen, my wife and partner, discovered that the section-top prize was a T-shirt. After about five days of getting beat up in the national events (Rockwell Mixed Pairs, Silodor Open Pairs), she was distraught at not winning a shirt. We played one day in a Daylight Open pairs, having a section top, only to discover that because it was scored across multiple sections, we actually had a pair of section thirds. Undaunted, we went after shirts in the evening side game, our third session of the day. As the game was about to start, I looked around and saw Bob Hamman two tables down, sitting the same direction as we were. All I could think to say was, "Go tell him what size shirt you wear. I am sure he has enough..."

And here is the rest of the story published in the August Bridge Bulletin by Bill Howard of Green Valley, Arizona, entitled, Maureen's Prize: "You published a letter in June about Maureen Brines and her quest to earn a T-shirt at the Spring NABC in St. Louis. For those who are wondering whether she was successful, here's what Paul Harvey would call "the rest of the story." You may recall that Maureen and her husband, Tracy, played in a pairs' game with Bob Hamman playing the same direction in their section, so they missed out on the shirt. Well, my partner Ed Helpert and I went looking for teammates for the Swiss teams on the second Sunday and ran into Tracy and Maureen, who were desperate to find teammates with total masterpoints low enough to keep us in the 'X' part of the A/X Swiss. Ed and I qualified for that honor, so we teamed up with them. Tracy and Maureen played well and we came in first in X, so Maureen got her T-shirt."

These sound like the kind of bridge players we all want to meet... at and away from the table!!


In both Lall v Rosenthal and Ge v Reynolds, one South player in each match thought their hand worthy of game while the other passed out the 2H part score. In Lall v Rosenthal, the auctions were identical up to 2H. How would you bid? Lall jumped to game. Willenken passed! Willenken and Eldad play light openers NV. Willenken guarded against a light opener by passing. Perhaps inviting with 3H would have been a good middle





3NT failed E/W at the two tables in Reynolds/Ge after North preempted 2S and South led the SA followed by the S9. North was allowed to hold the second trick and at both tables they led a third spade, East winning the king. It was a mistake for declarer to duck the second spade because it forces a premature discard from dummy, potentially injuring communication. Both Easts (Hall and Steve Chen) played the HJ and finessed it to North's queen so communication was no issue. North cashed out the spades and the contract failed two tricks.

In Lall's Juniors v Brines, Peter Boyd-Bowman failed to overcall spades and his partner made the normal 4th best dia-





mond lead. Declarer played small. Peter played the king and declarer won the ace. There was plenty of time for declarer to lose both the heart finesse and two spade tricks while taking ten for +630!

The best play award goes to Mykaell McCarthy at the other table in the Brines/Juniors match.

McCarthy won the third spade, played the HJ to the HA, cashed the HK felling North's queen, successfully conceding a heart **to South** making 4NT even after the spade ace was led.

On this line of play, declarer combined the chance of dropping the HQ with several other possible positions. If the HQ does not drop, declarer can play a 3rd heart hopefully to South. If hearts are 3-3, success! If hearts are 4-2, South will win the heart and presumably switch to diamonds. Declarer will still have the chance to successfully guess the DKJ position and collect nine tricks.






At 7 tables, North declared 4S. At one table South declared 3NT. 3NT is cold as long as declarer guesses the spade position. Six tables opened 1C on the West hand and North became declarer in 4S. At these six tables, East led a red suit. When East led a heart, declarer inserted the J and West won the ace. At each of these tables, West shifted to the CJ, hoping that the reason their partner neglected to lead the suit they opened was a VOID. East ruffed and eventually scored a second ruff to go with West's two aces. When East led a diamond, one declarer pitched their heart losers, came off dummy with a spade and made the game. At the other declarer misplayed, pitched their heart losers and took a club off dummy, allowing East to ruff and ultimately beating themselves!

Kit Woolsey, playing a strong club system, opened 1D (could be 2) with the West cards. Bart Bramley led the H6 (3rd best); declarer inserted the jack and Kit won the ace. Based on the heart spots, Kit knew that Bart held the HQT and therefore, had no room to hold the CQ.

Kit returned a heart, hoping to score a second heart trick along with his spade ace when partner held the S:Jxxx.

As you can see, it was an unlucky hand for the thinking expert! Declarer (Eldad Ginossar) wrapped up his game and scored 12 IMPs for Rosenthal.




On Board 6, North/South can make slam in either hearts or spades. Sadly for Yang/Chechelashvilli on the Lo team, they could not make 6NT ... especially with North on lead. Ornstein led the CK and the slam failed three tricks!

At two tables where 6H was played, West showed both their suits and East opted for the 4-4 fit. No defense will defeat the slam.

In all other cases, West played in a spade game taking 12 tricks.

It is odd that David C. "corrected" 6S to 6NT. He'd done nothing in the auction to show spade support and his partner placed the hand in 6S. His partner knew the keycard situation and could have bid 5S if he felt concerned about taking 12 tricks.






Joe Viola was a star on Board 10. 4H N/S was bid four times. It is cold unless the defenders can create an illusion.

At the three tables where game made, East led the DJ; Declarer played the queen from dummy; West covered with the king. At these same tables, West switched to either the ace or king of clubs and eventually collected one diamond and two clubs while declarer successfully took the other ten tricks!

At Viola's table, Joe won the opening diamond and correctly analyzed that his side could only legitimately come to three winners: two clubs and one diamond. Joe did not switch to the ace or king of clubs as his expert counterparts did: Joe switched to the C4!!!

Poor Rogoff! He knew that there were two honor jack holdings and only one AK. He played with the odds and inserted the CT! Hall won the jack and continued clubs for down one!!
