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

Hospitality Suite

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day'

Breakfast: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and surprise treats. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. They will be making coffee and will have individual packages of sugar, sweetener, and dairy & non-dairy creamers. For those of you who prefer Keurig coffee, that will also be available in the hospitality suite. We are limiting access to 6 players at any one time, so we ask that you come to the suite, pick up a large to go container and put the smaller packages in that to take with you as quickly as you can, and then go someplace else to eat. **Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Hospitality Suite at all times.** There will be a hand sanitizer station near the door and we encourage you to sanitize your hands before choosing what to take.

Lunch: From 2-4 pm (the first half of play each day ends at 2:35; we encourage those of you who are sitting out the 2nd quarter to go early). There will be a main dish (sandwiches, chicken, main dish salads, pizza) as well as individually packaged tuna salad, green salad, cheese, fruit, and berries. Also all the individual packages of add-ons we have for breakfast. Water and soft drinks will be available in refrigerators.

Let us know what you want: If there is a menu for a future day's lunch hanging on the wall outside the Hospitality Suite, please mark what you want, so we have a better idea of what to order.

Playing Rooms & Player's Break Room

We will have bottled water in the playing rooms and if there is a refrigerator in a playing room we'll stock it with soft drinks.

We will also have bottled water in the Player's Break Room (1321), as well as soft drinks, nespresso, some packaged snacks, and some fruit.

Masks that cover your nose & mouth must be worn in the Player's Break Room at all times, so you may not eat and drink in the room.

General Face-to-Face Tournament Information to Players

The USBF Board of Directors met earlier this week and confirmed:

1. Face-to-face play in Schaumburg will be with 2 players per room.
2. Players will not be required to get Covid tests, but will be provided with information about where they can be tested (in Woodfield Mall) if they want to be. Staff will be tested approximately once a week.
3. We will comply with the Illinois mask requirements, which currently require masks in public areas indoors. Our default will be for both players in the playing rooms to wear masks, but if the 2 players in a room agree on a different rule we will allow whatever they agree on, assuming that is in compliance with the Illinois requirements.
4. We will ask each player to sign a Covid-related waiver of liability form before they start play. Jan will be sending the text of the waiver to all of you in the next day or so, and will have printed forms in her office (room 1321) at the Hyatt for participants to sign.
5. Hospitality will be limited - "grab & go" breakfast and lunch will be distributed in our usual hospitality suite (room 2321), but everyone will have to go someplace else to eat. We will allow only 6 players in the suite at any one time. The suite will not be open for socializing at other times. We will have water, soft drinks, coffee and snacks in the Players' Break Room (1321), and there also, we will limit the number of people in the room at any one time. Eating in the Break Room is not allowed. Masks will be required in the hospitality suite and in the Players' Break Room.
6. There will be air purifiers in each playing room and in 1321 and 2321.

KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the <https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/> website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time!

Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

Nail biting!

Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of the match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together!

When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information:

Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons:

While surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

Replay:

After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!

We will hold the event as carefully as possible to protect the health and safety of players, volunteers and staff. Because of this, meetings and other large social gatherings outside of gameplay will be very limited (details are available on the [Austin NABC website](#)). We hope to hold these events during NABCs in 2022.

All NABC attendees, staff and volunteers must be fully vaccinated to attend the Austin NABC and have face masks properly worn when present in the tournament areas. We have procured VOW Digital Health to manage the verification process for vaccinations. Further details on all health and safety requirements are available on the Austin NABC page of our website

Please do not attend the Fall NABC if you are not prepared to follow the safety protocols. They are in place to protect all attendees, and no exceptions will be made.

Mask Rules

Attendees are required to wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth in all public areas in the hotel. That means the hotel lobby, corridors, and elevators, as well as the **Hospitality Suite** and the **Office/Players' Break Room, where masks must be worn at all times. Therefore, there is no eating or drinking in those rooms.**

Our attorney has told us that the Cook County Mask Mandate forces us to require masks in the playing rooms. Therefore, we have adopted the following policy about that:

*Masks are required in playing rooms. If you are observed not wearing a mask in a playing room, there will be a 2 IMP penalty for the first offense in a segment, a 4 IMP penalty for the second offense, an 8 IMP penalty for the third offense, and a 16 IMP penalty for the fourth and subsequent offenses; however, if you and your opponent agree to something other than both wearing masks, any IMP penalties for not wearing a mask will apply to both of you equally and there will be no other penalties. You may remove your mask briefly to eat or drink. **However, if you call for a director (for any reason), and you are not wearing a mask properly when the director enters the room, the penalty will apply to your team for your next match in the event.** There is no eating or drinking in the playing room when the Director present.*

In addition, anyone who is penalized more than twice (over the course of the entire event) in situations where his/her opponent was wearing a mask while s/he wasn't, or where the director was called, may be subject to additional conduct penalties.

You should bring masks to the tournament with you; we will not be supplying masks.

Covid Waiver

We are going to ask each player in these events to sign a COVID-19 Waiver of Claims. It is being sent to you by email and you may sign it electronically and return it to Jan (marteljan@gmail.com) or you can sign a printed waiver at the site. Waivers will be available to sign in room 1321 starting Oct. 5th at 9:00 am. **Everyone is required to sign the form before the start of play!**

(a) Mr. R lives in Dehradun and the brakeman's nearest neighbor earns exactly 3 times as much as the brakeman. Therefore, neither Mr. R nor Mr. J is the brakeman's nearest neighbor, so it must be Mr. S.

(b) S beats the fireman at badminton and the passenger whose name is the same as the brakeman's lives in Noida. Mr. R lives in Dehradun and Mr. S lives between Noida and Dehradun. Therefore, it must be Mr. J who lives in Noida and J is the brakeman.

(c) S is not the brakeman and he is not the fireman. He must be the engineer.



In the 4th Segment of the Mixed on Sunday, in Lewis/Xu, Anne Brenner and Dave Caprera were the only pair to bid and make 3NT on Board 60. Most others stopped in a NT partscore.


Caprera opened 1C strong; Brenner responded 1D negative; 2NT showed 21-23 HCP; 3C was Stayman; pass over 3CX denied a club stopper; XX was “transfer Stayman” and 3S denied a four card major.

Brenner placed the contract in 3NT.

Smith led the CK, which held the trick. He switched to the SQ which was also allowed to win. Smith continued with the S5. Kamenova played the SK and Caprera won the SA. Caprera cashed five rounds of diamonds on which Smith discarded a heart and a spade to produce this position:


Caprera exited with the ST and Smith was endplayed. Caprera took nine tricks and scored +400, winning 7 IMPs, when, at the other table, Disa and Itabashi stopped in 2NT, collecting the obvious eight tricks, when a fourth best spade was led.

Smith can defeat the contract by continuing with the SJ at trick three. This will keep him off the endplay and will setup an entry to Kamenova’s hand, if Caprera wins the trick.



Perhaps Smith could have worked this out. Since Caprera denied a four card major, Smith knows that Kamenova has at least three spades. Caprera’s denial of a club stopper tells Smith that Kamenova’s club holding is strong. Kamenova must hold at least two or three high club honors with length in the suit. If Kamenova gets the lead, the defense will prevail, by taking two spades and three or more club tricks.

In Sunday's Mixed events, every E/W pair played in 4H. Six declarers were defeated one or two tricks. One declarer succeeded when the defense erred. Only Chris Willenken (Rosenthal) found the foolproof line of play.

Botta led the C3, won by dummy's ace. Willenken had work to do in every suit. Rather than trying to cross to his hand to play a diamond toward the KQ, Willenken played the DK from dummy.

Zach Grossack won the ace and returned the C5. Willenken won the king. Botta followed with the deuce and Willenken discarded the S9 from dummy. Willenken played the DT, on which Botta discarded the S4. Willenken won the DQ and led the SJ from dummy. Grossack covered with the SQ. Willenken played the SK and Botta won the ace.


Botta exited with the S8. Grossack followed with the three and Willenken won the ten. By this time, Willenken had a pretty good count of the hand. If the opponent carding was honest (so far it had been), North was known to have started with four clubs, four spades and one diamond. This left her with four hearts. Also, the fact that Botta did not lead her singleton diamond might suggest that she holds long trumps. Willenken led the H2. Botta followed with the six and Willenken played dummy's H9!

Willenken led a diamond from dummy and trumped with the H7. Botta overruffed and returned the S6. Willenken trumped in dummy with the H4 and discarded the C6 from his hand. This was the four card end position:

Willenken led a diamond from dummy and trumped with the HK!

He led the H5 to dummy's jack, cashed the HA drawing the last trump and scored his tenth trick with the D8.

11 IMPs to Rosenthal when Grue/Tebha played 4H down two at the other table.





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

The key to Board 37 from the 7th segment of the Mixed event is to avoid 3NT.

At both tables of the Donner/Rosenthal USA1 Semifinal match, East opened 1D and South made a takeout double. West redoubled and North preempted 2S. This was passed around to West. Both West players bid 3S. When Migry Campanile held the East cards, she bid the obvious 4D. Her partner, Chris Willenken, cuebid 4S and Migry cooperated by cue-bidding 5C. Willenken bid 5D, which ended the auction.

A club lead will defeat 5D when North is able to win the DA, lead a spade to South and score a club ruff. This is a highly unlikely lead from South, holding the ace/king of spades. Joe Grue led the SA and continued spades. Migry won the spade continuation, drove out the DA and eventually took the heart finesse for eleven tricks, scoring +400.

At the other table in this match, Zach Grossack held the East cards. Zach opened 1D. Berkowitz doubled; Botta redoubled; Ginossar bid 2S and it passed back to Botta.

When Georgia Botta cuebid 3S, Grossack got creative. Zach bid 4C, his good three card suit. Botta was unsure what Grossack was showing, but she had good support so she raised to 5C, which became the final contract.


5C was doomed from the start. Dana Berkowitz led the SA and continued with the SK. Grossack trumped the spade in dummy and led a diamond to his queen.


