Welcome to the 2021 Senior United States Bridge Championships. This event is being run online and in Schaumburg, Illinois, to select USA1 and USA2 to represent the United States in the World 2021 Bridge Teams Championship in Salsomaggiore Terme, Italy from March 27th-April 9th, 2022.

Ten teams will compete two days in the round robin. Eight will remain to play in the F2F Knockout event in Schaumburg.

The Format: There will be 4 matches on Friday, October 1, and 5 matches on Saturday, October 2. Each match will be 10 boards long.

The F2F USA1 stages will be 2-day, 120-board KO matches.

The F2F USA2 stages will be: a 2-day, 120-board KO R16 in which the 4 losing USA1 Quarterfinalists will play, followed by a 1-day, 60-board KO Quarterfinal, in which the 2 USA1 Quarterfinal losers will play the 2 USA2 Round of 16 winners; a 1-day 60-board KO Semifinal in which the USA2 Quarterfinal winners will play, and a 2-day 120-board Final between the USA1 Final loser and the USA2 Semifinal winner.

#### Play in the KO stages will be on LoveBridge tablets.

The KO bracket will be based on ACBL seeding points and additional team seeding points assigned for Round Robin finish (7 for first, 5 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, 1 for fifth).

While the USBF Board and tournament organizers do their best to make this event the fairest Competition year after year, only YOU, the players, can uphold the ethics, camaraderie and sportsmanship for which US bridge is known worldwide. When old enough for this event, I will do my part to uphold these standards. I ask that each of you do the same. Good luck! Let the games begin!

# Kibitzing the Seniors

THERE WILL BE DEFERRED KIBITZING FOR ALL OF THE 2021 SENIOR USBC.

#### ROUND ROBIN KIBITZING ON REALBRIDGE KIBITZ SITE

To kibitz, go to **the RealBridge kibitzing website**, enter your name and click on Log In. Select **Kibitz 2021 Senior USBC.** You will be taken to a lobby where you will see a list of tables on the left and a chat box and list of people in the lobby on the right. The table listing shows the team & player names at each table, as well as the board number and trick being played. There will be information about the number of kibitzers at a table and whether there is audio/video commentary (a picture of a TV means there is). Click on a table to kibitz there.

At the table, you will see a hand diagram, and the bidding and play as it happened.

There is a chat window on the right of the screen. Anyone can type chat into the chat window.

Above the chat window are two dropdowns, for video commentary. If you want to hear someone who is commenting, select their name from one of the dropdowns. If two people are commenting, select both of them, **one from each dropdown**. The option "BROADCAST MY VIDEO" is for commentators - if you select this, your commentary will be available to anyone who wants to listen to you.

#### KO KIBITZING ON LOVEBRIDGE

You can follow the USBC on the https://vugraph.lovebridge.com/ website. The stream is delayed; go to the schedule below for starting times for each segment.

Popcorn time! Do you want to listen to commentary? Search for the TV icon! It will send you to the page where you can choose from the available live commentary. If it doesn't do anything, no one is commenting.

**Nail biting!** Do you want to be deeply involved? Choose the "Match view" at the starting page of your event. Your screen will be divided into four small screens – two of them showing the two tables of match you choose, the other two having the scoresheet for your match and the current scores of the other matches. In the 2x2 view you can also personalize the content in all your windows. (The 2x2 view is not available on mobiles.)

Think together! When watching a table, click on a name and choose "Kibitz". Instead of seeing all 4 hands, you will see what the player sees, and you can decide what you would do and see whether your chosen player agrees.

More Information: Be well informed and tell your friends: while following the play, you can click many items. The image of the sticker with the number of the board (upper right) takes you to the results of the board, in the bottom right corner the arrow takes you the scoresheet, the DDS shows the double dummy analyses, beside that there is a button for the other table of the same match, at the top left corner you can see the bidding with alerts and the explanations (mouse over), the tricks already played, and the double dummy analysis for the available number of tricks with the par score.

Navigation icons: while surfing here and there in the vugraph, or amongst the archive sessions, there are icons to help you. You can always go back to the main page with the "house" or to the standings with the "scores". If you cannot see the icons, move your mouse, or touch your screen and they pop up immediately. There is also a built-in back button because the back button of your browser will always take you to the starting page. If this is not what you wanted, push next in your browser and you can continue where you were.

**Replay:** After the event you can find every board from every table easily. While replaying the hands, the only surprise can be the way "next board" button works. If you have arrived from a scoresheet, it navigates through the scoresheet. If you have arrived from a screen where the results were shown for a given board then the same buttons move you through list. Push every button and enjoy!

#### Ingredients

- Handful flat-leaf parsley, chopped

#### Directions

- 1. Dice tenders into bite size pieces and set aside. Wash hands.
- 2. Place a large pot on stove over medium high heat. Add oil, butter, vegetables and bay leaf and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Season mixture with salt, pepper and poultry seasoning. Add flour to the pan and cook 2 minutes. Stir broth or stock to the pot and bring to a boil. Add chicken to the broth and stir.
- 3. Place biscuit mix in a bowl. Combine with 1/2 cup warm water and parsley. Drop tablespoonfuls of prepared mix into the pot, spacing dumplings evenly. Cover pot tightly and reduce heat to medium low. Steam dumplings 8 to 10 minutes. Remove cover and stir chicken and dumplings to thicken sauce a bit. Stir peas into the pan, remove chicken and dumplings from heat and serve in shallow bowls.



# Mexican Chicken

#### Ingredients

- Deselect All
- ☑ 3 tablespoons canola oil
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breast, rinsed and patted dry
- Salt and pepper
- 2 (16-ounce) cans pinto beans, undrained
- 2 (10-ounce) cans Mexican diced tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon low-sodium fajita seasoning
  - 1. Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat.
  - 2. Season chicken breasts with salt and pepper. Place in the skillet and sear about 2 minutes per side.
  - 3. Place pinto beans in the bottom of a 5-quart slow cooker.
  - 4. Remove chicken from skillet and place the in the slow cooker on top of the beans. Pour the tomatoes over the chicken and beans and sprinkle with fajita seasoning. Cover and cook on LOW setting for 3 to 4 hours.
  - 5. Stovetop instructions: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Heat the oil in a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Season chicken breasts with salt and pepper. Place in the skillet and sear about 2 minutes per side. Place pinto beans in the bottom of a 9 by 13-inch baking dish. In a medium bowl, stir together diced tomatoes and fajita seasoning. Remove chicken from skillet and place in the baking dish on top of beans. Pour the tomato mixture over the chicken and beans. Cover with foil and bake for 25 minutes or until the chicken is tender.

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. Place the chicken breasts on a baking sheet and rub them with olive oil. Sprinkle generously with salt and pepper. Roast for 35 to 40 minutes, or until cooked through. Set aside until cool enough to handle, then remove the meat from the bones and discard the skin. Cut the chicken into large dice. You will have 4 to 6 cups of cubed chicken.
- 3. In a small saucepan, heat the chicken stock and dissolve the bouillon cubes in the stock. In a large pot or Dutch oven, melt the butter and saute the onions over medium-low heat for 10 to 15 minutes, until translucent. Add the flour and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, for 2 minutes. Add the hot chicken stock to the sauce. Simmer over low heat for 1 more minute, stirring, until thick. Add 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, and heavy cream. Add the cubed chicken, carrots, peas, onions and parsley. Mix well.
- 4. For the pastry, mix the flour, salt, and baking powder in the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal blade. Add the shortening and butter and mix quickly with your fingers until each piece is coated with flour. Pulse 10 times, or until the fat is the size of peas. With the motor running, add the ice water; process only enough to moisten the dough and have it just come together. Dump the dough out onto a floured board and knead quickly into a ball. Wrap the dough in plastic and allow it to rest in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.
- 5. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F.
- 6. Divide the filling equally among 4 ovenproof bowls. Divide the dough into quarters and roll each piece into an 8-inch circle. Brush the outside edges of each bowl with the egg wash, then place the dough on top. Trim the circle to 1/2-inch larger than the top of the bowl. Crimp the dough to fold over the side, pressing it to make it stick. Brush the dough with egg wash and make 3 slits in the top. Sprinkle with sea salt and cracked pepper. Place on a baking sheet and bake for 1 hour, or until the top is golden brown and the filling is bubbling hot.

#### Hospitality Information for Face-toFace in Schaumburg, IL

Because of Covid, we won't be able to provide the full, wonderful hospitality we have in the past, but we will do what we can.

Hosts Evvie Gilbert and Maya Alela for the Open and Women's and Julie Arbit and Christian Jolly for the Mixed and Seniors will be in our usual hospitality suite (Room 2321). They will provide grab and go breakfast and lunch each day, starting on Tuesday, Oct. 5<sup>th</sup>.

**Breakfast**: From 8-10 am. There will be individually packaged cereal, fruit, hard boiled eggs, bagels, and some hot options. Also individual butter, jam, peanut butter, and cream cheese, as well as condiment packages. On Board 50 from the first day of the Mixed USBC, there were some inferences from the auction that should have helped the defenders.

In Rubenstein/Lewis, 4H was bid at both tables. Paul Lewis played it from North and Molson played it from South.

At the table where Lewis was declarer, there were several alerts during the auction:

1C could be a doubleton if 4-4-3-2.

1NT is 15-17 and could have 4S.

2NT was a relay to 3C.

3C was forced.

3D showed a 5/5 inv in the red suits.

Clearly the defenders have been drawn a pretty good picture of the lie of the cards...

Grossack led the S5. His partner won her SA. The defense is at the crossroads! Parker MUST lead a club at trick two or declarer's singleton CT will be discarded on the SQ and declarer will collect the obvious ten tricks! Even though the

singleton club was concealed in declarer's hand, the auction should have warned Parker of the need to shift.

Parker continued spades. Lewis discarded his club, pulled two high trumps, knocked out the DA, ruffed the spade return and claimed ten tricks.

Since Parker was aware that North held at most three black cards, continuing spades would be either futile or fatal. If North held jack/small of spades and one club, declarer would be able to discard his club on the third round of spades, bringing home the game. If declarer had only two black cards, as was the actual case, the only possible winner was the CA and this would go away on the spade continuation.

On Board 97 from the last round of the Mixed Round-Robin, three pairs reached 6H and scored 980.

The Board was a push in the Bauer/Henner match.

At one table, Lilly Justman, East, received the S2 lead. She won in dummy, played a diamond to the king and a diamond to the queen. Justman won the heart return in hand, trumped a diamond, and trumped a spade. She led a club to the king and trumped a spade. When the SK did not fall, Justman trumped a diamond with dummy's HQ. When trumps broke 2-2, the contract was successful.

At the other table, Doug Doub received the C2 lead. Doub won in hand and played a diamond to the queen. North won and continued clubs. Doub won the CK in dummy, played a diamond to the king, trumped a diamond, played the SA and trumped a spade. Doub played his last diamond which South ruffed with the H9. Doub over-ruffed and drew trumps.

In the Donner/Kolesnik match, Zach Grossack received the same starting defense as Doub, but after ruffing one diamond, Zack decided to play for a squeeze position rather than banking on a favorable diamond or trump position. If either opponent held four diamonds and the SK they would be squeezed in the pointed suits. The club threat could also serve to set-up some double squeeze positions. At trick five the position was

Grossack ran his trumps. Both North and South discarded spades on the third round of hearts. On the fourth round of hearts, South discarded a club while dummy and North discarded spades. On the fifth round of hearts, both North and South discarded clubs, while dummy discarded a spade.

The cat was out of the bag. The opening lead had been the "low from odd" C2. Since South had shown up with four clubs, he must also hold a fifth club if the opening lead was honest. Zach cashed his last heart on which North and South discarded spades, while dummy discarded its club to produce this position



When Grossack led the S7 and South followed low, Zach rose with the SA and dropped North's king. +980 was worth 11 IMPs for Donner when the other table played in 4H taking only eleven tricks.

In the Lewis/Xu match, David Caprera, who brought this hand to our attention, declared 4H.

Caprera received the D2 lead (third from even, low from odd). David ducked the lead to his king and returned a diamond. North won the DA and played the H5. Caprera won the HA in his hand and trumped a diamond. The spade ace was cashed, and a spade was ruffed. Caprera led a heart to dummy's queen and trumped another spade. Caprera cashed HK and the H7 playing for double squeeze with South protecting spades and clubs and North protecting diamonds and clubs. When this didn't work, he took eleven tricks.

At the other table in Caprera's match, Disa also played in 4H, taking a similar line and collecting 11 tricks for a push.

David posed the question of comparing the odds among the various lines taken by the various declarers. He suggests that ruffing two diamonds requires 2-2 hearts (a 44% position after one round is played), while ruffing one diamond and two spades bringing down the king is 43%, plus a double squeeze when South has the SK will bring his line of play to 71%. Are other lines mathematically better?

One note is that since the opponents lead a third best diamond, declarer is fairly certain that a diamond overruff won't occur. It is probably best to play the DQ at trick one, hoping that North wins the DA and does not diagnose the position. It would be disappointing for North to return a trump against the slam when their partner holds the cashing DK. The auction at David's table is shown below. The 3H rebid showed 14-15HCP with six hearts and 0-2 spades.

Having stopped in 4H, this is all for an overtrick...

Zach gets the kudos for bidding and making the slam on a clever line of play.

The **World Bridge Federation** consists consists of five continents, following the five rings of the Olympic Movement (America, Europe, Africa, Asia and Oceania) and of eight **Zonal Conferences**. Each Zonal Conference administers bridge in its own geographical area, coordinating the **National Federations** of its member countries.

The World Bridge Federation was formed on 18th August 1958 in Oslo, Norway, by delegates from Europe, USA and South America. In Orlando in September 2018 the WBF celebrated its 60th anniversary.

Gianarrigo Rona, from Italy, former First Vice-President and EBL President (1999-2010) was elected WBF President in São Paulo September 2009 and took the chair in Philadelphia in November 2010. In Nusa Dua, Bali, November 2013, Rona was reelected unopposed and again in Lyon, August 2017, for a third fouryear term which will run until 2022.

The WBF has shown strong and steady growth and its membership now comprises 116 National Bridge Organisations (NBOs) with approximately 1.000,000 affiliated members who participate actively in competitive bridge events (locally, nationally and internationally). Each National Bridge Organisation agrees to fulfill certain requirements, such as opening

its ranks to all its citizens and residents and upholding a standard of ethics acceptable to the WBF.

The WBF Executive Council consists of the President, who acts as Chairman, 17 Members, elected from the eight WBF Zonal Conferences, 2 Members elected from the High Level Players Commission and, starting from 2020, 3 Members elected from the Congress. The President/s Emeritus and the General Counsel are non-voting members of the Executive Council.

"Bridge for Peace" is the official motto of the World Bridge Federation which is partner of "Peace and Sport", l'Organisation pour la Paix par le Sport'.
