Thanks to the players for cooperating with the rules: playing online and on site with tablets. You did great and we appreciate your patience and willingness to adapt.

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










Gupta came into this match down 46. With a whole day to go, there is plenty of time. The first five boards were flat and a 4 IMP swing one way was followed by a 6 IMP swing the other, so there was no significant change. Feeling the need to move some IMPs, Gupta/Lall pushed to slam on Board 8.



They start off the CAK, but Pratap, on lead, doesn't know that and really, there are just no more than ten tricks for the offense in any case.

Pratap did well to lead a trump. Lall won in dummy and ruffed a small heart. He cashed the DA and ruffed a diamond, played the HK, covered by Morse with the ace and ruffed in hand. He cashed the SA, ruffed a diamond, played the HQ, tossing a diamond from hand, played the C7 to the 4,9,T and actually went down one more than was necessary.

Contract failing 3 tricks for -150.

At the other table, Woolsey/Bramley had a simple auction: Woolsey opened 1H; Bramley bid 1S; Woolsey bid 2S; Bramley jumped to game. Berkowitz led the C3 to Sontag's ace. Sontag shifted to diamonds. Bramley won and played a second club. Berkowitz won and shifted to trump. Bramley won his SA and ruffed a diamond, ruffed out the HA, ruffed another diamond, pitched a diamond on a the HQ, cashed the SK and claimed ten tricks.




On Board 13, in the Open Room, Berkowitz/Sontag embarked on a Precision auction. David opened 1 strong, artificial club and Alan responded in the negative. Bramley stuck his neck out and overcalled 1S on a pretty light hand. Berkowitz bid 2 natural clubs and Woolsey, unable to take a joke, bid 2H. Sontag had an easy double and E/W played it there.

Sontag led the C3 to Berk's king. David returned a heart to Alan's jack. Alan played the HK, burying dummy's ten to Woolsey's ace. Woolsey played a spade

to the king and ace. Berk played a club and Woolsey ruffed. Woolsey took the high spade and led a small diamond toward his hand. Berkowitz won and had plenty of exit cards. He played a club, ruffed in dummy and overruffed by Sontag. Sontag pulled the last two rounds of trump and had nothing but diamonds left to lead. Contract failing 3 tricks. 800 to North/South


In the Closed Room, things proceeded more as one would expect on this hand. North/South reached the vulnerable 3NT game with no opponent interference. They wisely bid it from South to avoid a diamond through the AQ. Since clubs split and diamonds were divided 4-4, it turned out not to matter.


Gupta led a diamond. Pratap won the queen. Pratap played a heart to the king and a club back to his hand. He cashed the CK, unblocking the nine from dummy and claimed 10 tricks.




5 IMPs for Gupta










Zia chose not to show a single suited diamond hand... perhaps because his partner was a passed hand and he didn't see a possibility of game on the hand. Bramley bought the contract at 1NT at favorable vulnerability.

Zia led the D7 to Garner's ace. Garner returned a diamond to Zia and Zia cashed out his six card suit. Zia led the H9 to the 4, Q, A. Bramley played the SK, burying dummy's queen, won with Zia's ace. Zia played a heart to Garner's king and Garner played the S6 to Bramley's jack. Bramley cashed his ST and exited with the C8. North/South took the last two tricks with high clubs. Contract down 4 undoubled for 200 N/S



suit. Good judgment and solid reasoning by Pratap!

10 IMPs to Bramley

Lall led a small heart. Morse won the king. Morse cashed the DA and led a diamond to the king. When diamonds split 2-2, Morse had an easy nine: six diamonds, the heart he already took, and the two black aces.





Sherry decided that, for several members of her family, she'd give each of them a different quilt for their birthday present this year. For each one, she picked a different common quilt block for the main design of the quilt. Then she picked the colors and so each guilt used a different number of colors. As each birthday occurred throughout the year, each new quilt was revealed and presented. The gifts were well-received and the audiences always watched with envious appreciation, hoping that their turn and quilt would be coming too. Determine the full name of each relative (their last names are all different from Sherry's due to various marriages and divorces over the years), the name of the quilt block that each quilt used, the number of colors each guilt used (from 2 to 6), and the relationship of each family member to Sherry.

Ohio Star

1. Ralph, who wasn't Sherry's uncle, didn't receive a quilt

with Ohio Star. Sara Jackson didn't receive the Jacob's Ladder quilt.

- 2. The family member whose last name was Jones received a quilt with five colors but it wasn't a Churn Dash pattern. The Dutchman's Puzzle quilt had six colors but it wasn't given to the relative whose last name was Winter.
- Marcia's quilt had two more colors than Sherry's cousin's quilt but one less than the Ohio Star quilt, which wasn't received by Sherry's aunt.
- 4. The Bow Tie quilt had two colors but it wasn't received by Donna, whose last name wasn't Weatherby. Elliot is her father's sister's brother.
- 5. Sherry's sister received a quilt made with less than four colors. Mr. Maxwell was Sherry's father but he didn't receive the Bow Tie quilt.
- 6. The family member who received the Jacob's Ladder guilt was her grandmother's daughter.

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

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
Samantha Punch's book is recently published and ready for your reading pleasure.



interrupt Highly Effective Relay sequences... but not if the opponents are ready for it). Bramley freely bid 3C. Woolsey bid 4D, RKC; Bramley responded 4S showing 1 keycard; Woolsey bid 4NT, queen ask; Bramley bid 6C showing the queen and no outside kings.

Garner led the DQ. Woolsey won the ace. He cashed the CA and it is easy to see his 12 tricks: six clubs, four spades, one diamond, and two hearts.



Both tables got to 3NT on Board `8. This hand is a perfect example of the discarding complexities that occur when declarer has a long suit to run and a couple of possible sources for developing an extra trick.

Woolsey played it from West and Lall played it from East

At both tables, a spade was led. Declarer won the opening lead and began playing diamonds. On the second round of diamonds, South was faced with a difficult discarding problem. Both South players discarded the H7. On the surface, this seems harmless. The H7 seems unimportant and is unlikely to be protecting anything. It turns out that a black suit discard would allow the defenders to time their subsequent discards in a manner which wouldn't help declarer. The H7 created an unforeseen problem for N/S.


When Woolsey was declarer, he cashed two more diamonds to produce this eight card position...



On the last diamond, Garner discarded the C5 and Zia discarded the H2. Woolsey read the position correctly. He led the C7 to the queen, king, and ace. The CJ was his ninth trick.

If Garner discards a major suit instead of a small club, Woolsey will set-up an endplay where the opponents are forced to break clubs. E.g. if Garner discards a small spade, declarer can cash his major suit aces and exit with a heart. The defenders will be able to take three major suit tricks before breaking clubs, giving declarer his ninth trick.

In the Closed Room, where Lall declared from the East hand, Dan Morse discarded two spades from the North hand and held all three of his clubs. The eight card position was:



On the last diamond, Morse discarded the C5, and Pratap discarded the H3. Lall led the C7 to his king and Pratap's ace. Pratap exited with a spade. Lall won the SK and played the C6 to dummy's jack and Morse's queen. Morse played the S8 to Pratap's queen and Pratap cashed the S5 and the CT to defeat 3NT one trick.
