

Most tables played 6C untouched on Board 18 of Segment 6. Hurd and Wooldridge found their way to a 10 IMP pick-up in a most elegant manner... They were always going to gain on the board once Shuster doubled, but exuding confidence has always been a hallmark of youth. Wooldridge redoubled... and then he created the piece de resistance... scoring the 12th trick en passant.

Dinkin led the D6 to the 7, Q, ruffed with the C6. Wooldridge cashed the CK and played the CT to the ace in dummy, Dinkin shedding the S7. Wooldridge played the D8 from dummy. Shuster covered with the ace. Wooldridge ruffed. He played the H6 to the king and led the D9, pitching the S2. He cashed the SQ and led the DT, discarding the H9. The DJ drew the HT from South and SK from declarer. The H7 was played to Wooldridge's ace, everyone following. The HQ was ruffed with the C9 in dummy. And the DK ended the perfect coup!



Board 13 in the fifth segment of the Round of 16 produced a wide variety of results. At the eight VuGraph tables, there were five different final contracts and six different results. At all but one of these tables, North started the proceedings with a very normal 2H call, East made a takeout double and South raised to 3H or 4H. Then the auctions diverged...

In the Warner/Kranyak match, Hinze made a responsive double over 3H and Grainger passed for penalties. Tebha guessed the spades correctly and held the contract to down one.

At the other table in this match, Zolotov played in 4S and took eleven tricks. The opening lead was the HK. Zolotov played a spade to the queen and returned a spade to the ace, dropping the king doubleton. 10 IMPs to Warner

In the Hill/Donn match, over 4H, Bathurst doubled and Lall, passed. This resulted in a two-trick set.

At the other table in this match, Cheek also doubled over 4H, but Bertens did not pass, instead Bertens bid 4NT and Cheek played in 5C making six. 3 IMPs to Donn

In the Dinkin/Wolfson match, Kolesnik jumped to 4S over South's 3H bid. After winning the heart lead, Kolesnik played a spade toward the queen. Wolfson rose with the king and played a second round of hearts. Kolesnik refused to ruff. Now the third heart could be ruffed in dummy. After ruffing the third heart, Kolesnik cashed the SQ, crossed to his hand and played the SA. He played minor suit winners until South ruffed-in with his last trump for +620.

At the other table in this match, the auction diverged from the norm. Dinkin opened 1H with the North hand. This bid shows four or more hearts (could have a longer side suit) and 8-11 HCP. Zia/Rosenberg had a free run to 6C, which only required the SK with North. This was a virtual certainty, of course, since North couldn't get to eight points without that card. The slam came home. 13 IMPs to Wolfson team

Only in the Mahaffey/Robinson match was the same contract, 4S by West, played at both tables.

When Kit Woolsey declared 4S, he had it easy. A heart was led. Woolsey won and played a spade toward the queen. Cohler rose with the king and played a club. Eleven tricks were scored for +650.

At the other table, Lev had a much tougher time. As always, the opening lead was the HK. When Lev won the ace, he played a spade toward the queen, but unlike Cohler, Peter Weichsel ducked! Lev needed to decide how to handle a 4-2 trump break for a maximum of two losers. If North holds a small doubleton spade, all plays will fail. With the actual holding of king doubleton, declarer needs to play the queen as Zolotov did in the same situation.

If North holds ten doubleton or jack doubleton, declarer can succeed by inserting the spade six. South wins and plays a heart. Declarer discards on the heart and ruffs a third round of hearts with dummy's S7. The SQ will smother North's spade jack or ten doubleton.

Declarer can cross to his hand, cash the SA and run his minor suit winners until South ruffs-in.

Since there are two jack or ten doubletons and only one king doubleton, Lev took the two-to-one odds and played the S6 from dummy. This lost to the jack. A heart was cashed, and a third heart was trumped in dummy. Now the spade queen lost to North's king, and the contract was defeated one trick. 13 IMPs to Robinson.

With spring in the air, everyone's starting to think about spring clean-up so Jeff spent all week after school and all weekend doing odd jobs around the neighborhood to earn some spending money. He tilled gardens, raked leaves, cleaned up tree limbs, pruned hedges, and even spent one afternoon babysitting! Each day he worked for a different neighbor on a different chore. He charged each neighbor a reasonable rate for his work, but sometimes he got tips too. By the end of the week, he was quite pleased with the amount that he'd earned and each of the neighbors was pleased with the quality of work that he'd done. Determine the last name of each neighbor, what chore Jeff completed for each neighbor, what day of the week Jeff worked for each neighbor, how long each task took him (2 to 4 hours), and how much he earned for each task (\$20 to \$36).

- 1. Jeff helped Mrs. Agnew till her garden but it didn't take him 4 hours. Mr. Summer didn't need help on Thursday.
- 2. He spent an extra hour working on Thursday than he did on Wednesday but he wasn't pruning hedges on either day.
- 3. On Sunday, he earned \$8 more than he did when the day he was babysitting, which earned him \$4 more than he earned from Mr. Compton.
- 4. Jeff made \$20 from the job he spent 2 hours doing, which wasn't removing tree limbs.
- 5. Mr. Numen, who didn't ask him to rake leaves, paid him \$32 but it didn't take him 3 hours. The job on Friday for Mrs. Fields took less time than the garden tilling job.
- 6. The hedge pruning job took him 3-1/2 hours to complete, a half hour longer than the job he did on Thursday. Jeff made \$36 from the job he spent 4 hours doing, which was on Saturday.



Migry Zur Campanile was born in Bucharest, Romania, in a year that is a closely guarded secret. She is now a bridge professional and teacher living in New York with her husband, bridge professional and writer Pietro Campanile. They met playing bridge online. Migry has several international top three finishes, beginning with both a gold and silver medal in Athens in 1991 at the European Common Market Championships. Away from bridge, Migry enjoys opera, gournmet cooking (her fabled meatballs enjoy a growing popularity), and jet-setting around the world. "Particularly Seattle, Venice, Yokohama, Albuquerque, Vilamoura, Montecatini, Rhodes, Lille, Salsomaggiore, Maastricht."

Joe Grue, aka JoBoo, grew up in Richfield, Minnesota where he learned bridge from his parents. His early years in Minnesota instilled a diehard allegiance to just about every Minnesota sports team.

In 2001 he moved to New York City at the age of 20 to become a professional bridge player, although not moving into the Murray Hill Brownstone until 2005.

In New York, he fought his way through tough rubber bridge games as well as duplicate games. His endless hours at the bridge clubs honed his skills; his World-Class play without studying bridge literature is impressive and unusual amongst top players. After garnering success and fame in New York, he left NYC for Las Vegas.

Joe is an instinctual player who loves to pull off a great swindle. (He would rather "steal" a hand than "own" it?)





On Board 12, Hinze opened 1NT (15-17). Grainger transferred to hearts, Hinze's KQJT. Warner overcalled 3S and Hinze bid the heart game. Even if Grainger was planning on passing the transfer at the two level and the hand went down one or two tricks in game, Hinze knew he had "honors" so it was an even bet! (J/K)

With only one spade, one diamond, and one club to lose, Hinze scored +420.


In the other room, Zolotow also opened 1NT. Eisenstein also transferred to hearts. Demuy, playing transfers in this auction, bid 3H. Zolotow could have shown his great heart support by doubling... or he could have bid 4H as Hinze did. He decided to pass, however, and when Kranyak bid 3S, he was allowed to play it there.

Eisenstein led a club, won with the ace in dummy. Kranyak pulled trump and played a heart which Zolotow won with the ten. Zolotow cashed the HK and Kranyak claimed nine tricks for +140.

11 more IMPs in this segment to Kranyak

In the Kriegel/Morris match, the Kriegel team also won 11 IMPs on this board when Oren Kriegel bid 4H as Hinze did while Passell chose to pass as did Zolotov.

11 IMPs were also swung in the Donn/Hill match when Kevin Dwyer bid 4H while Sheri Winestock passed 3S.



At all the VuGraph tables, the contract on Board 8 in the 7th segment was 4S. At most tables, the contract failed by two tricks. One only declarer was successful, and ironically, with the start of the Women's event tomorrow, this declarer was none other than Sheri Winestock!

All Norths led a high heart and continued with a second high heart. At this point, some led a club. Others continued with a third heart, giving declarer a ruff and sluff.

So it went at Sheri's table. Sheri pitched a small diamond from dummy on the third heart and ruffed in her hand. She played a spade to the jack which held. She ran the DQ which lost to the king.


There is no defense to defeat the hand at this point.

Lall tried returning another heart, but Winestock trumped in dummy and discarded a small diamond from her hand. She cashed the SK, crossed to a diamond, drew the last trump and claimed.


After winning the DK, an alternative would have been for Lall to return something other than a heart. No matter

what he leads, declarer wins the trick and runs her trumps squeezing South in the minors!!

Cohen furthered his partner's preempt by bidding 4S. Woolsey doubled to show values... willing to defend. Bramley bid 4NT to ask Woolsey to pick a minor. Woolsey had to be happy with that... after all, he holds five diamonds.

Woolsey bid 6D hoping it was right. Cohler led the SA which was ruffed in dummy. Woolsey pulled trump. A small club toward dummy followed; Cohler hopped ace and led a heart, dooming the contract to down one.

In the other room, Pepsi decided to show his suits. Instead of double, he chose 3D over 2S. Hamman bid 4S, and Lev bid 5D with his great support. Weichsel, holding two aces... more than would be expected from a hand with a weak two, doubled.

Hamman led the heart ace and a heart. Pepsi won in dummy, pulled trump, knocked out the club ace and claimed. 12 IMPs to Mahaffey

Both tables in Kranyak/Warner played in 5D and made it.
