Disdaining the old-fashioned one diamond opener, Perlman and Bjerkan both opened one club on the South cards. West overcalled one diamond at one table and two diamonds at the other table. In both cases, East bid a constructive two hearts and the partnership reached four hearts.

Both tables made 11 tricks.


At a third table, Palmer opened a nebulous precision diamond. West now overcalled a natural two diamonds and East jumped to three no-trump. It would seem that East could have shown her heart suit. In this case, it didn't matter when South led a small spade and declarer made 11 tricks.

At the final table, Quinn opened an old fashioned one diamond. This seems best holding a four by one hand with a singleton heart. If partner happens to respond one no-trump, you can easily play in the minor you hold.

West had no call over one diamond. And Wittes chose the perfect time to respond one heart on her two count. East bid a natural two hearts and played it there... losing ten IMPs in the process.

So much for science!!

To Double or Not to Double...



Lewis, holding the West cards, chose to open an off shape 2NT. Apparently North/South had not discussed their methods over 2NT, and Wittes passed the North hand even with the favorable vulnerability. Gwozdzinsky jumped to five diamonds on her eight card suit.

Amazingly, this was passed out. One would think Wittes might have found the sporting double on her 15 count. This contract went down one when the club finesse lost.

Four spades is cold on this hand. Do you and your partner have a means of showing a major two-suiter in this auction? Perhaps you should.

Consider the fact that if South traded the deuce of hearts for West's deuce of clubs, six spades would be cold.

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All About Kibitzing

WHEN CAN YOU KIBITZ IN THE PLAYING ROOMS?

You will be able to kibitz at any of the tables during this event. However, except in the Open Room during the Round Robin, you will be subject to the following regulations:

Kibitzers may enter the room ONLY at the start of play for a segment. Once play has started, the room will be closed. A kibitzer who leaves the room may not return until the start of the next session.

Cell phones and other electronic devices are not allowed in the playing rooms, even if they are turned off. Any kibitzer who is found with a cell phone wil be evicted and not allowed to kibitz during the remainder of the tournament.

When a match is being shown on BBO Vugraph, no kibitzer may sit on the same side of the table as the Vugraph operator.

SCREENS


All of the USWBC is played with screens. If you've never kibitzed at a table with screens before, you need to know that it is quite different from kibitzing at a regular table. You need to be seated at an "open" corner of the table (not next to the screen) in order to see much, and once there are 4 kibitzers at a table it will be very hard for additional kibitzers to see.

USBF KIBITZING RULES

The USBF **General Conditions of Contest** contain specific rules about kibitzers. They are designed to promote security at the tournament and are set forth in the conditions of contest section labeled "Security." They are:

- 1. General Rules
 - a. During any use of duplicated boards across multiple matches, Kibitzers must select one table for kibitzing and may not move to any other table during a session or segment.
 - b. Kibitzers may not speak with players, must watch only one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see more than one hand at a time, may not sit in such a position as to see a computer screen in use for Internet broadcast, must check communication devices with the Director, cannot call attention to irregularities other than a board being placed incorrectly on the table (arrow positioning), but may serve as witnesses to a possible irregularity.
- 2. In the Open Room:
 - a. If there is a live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room, kibitzers shall abide by the same rules as those applicable to the Closed Room.
 - b. If there is no live, or nearly live Internet broadcast of any match in the Open Room then kibitzers, media, and NPC's may enter and return until such time as any table from the closed room has finished the segment. Once any table in the Closed room has finished, no one may return to the Open room after leaving unless escorted while absent.
 - c. In either event, Open Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room and returning (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).
- 3. In the Closed Room:
 - a. Kibitzers must enter the Closed Room before play commences. Kibitzers in the closed room are required to remain until the segment of play is completed at the table they are watching or to leave the playing area entirely. Closed Room kibitzers are expected to abide by the same rules as the players regarding leaving the room (e.g. be escorted to the restroom).
 - b. Except as expressly provided in these conditions and appendices, NPC's shall be subject to the WBF General Conditions, Section 17.
 - c. No one other than the Internet broadcast personnel and Tournament Directors may watch any computer screen or any other mechanism for enabling the Internet broadcast at any time in either the Closed or the Open Room.

Bidding Over Preempts...



Many pairs have abandoned two diamonds as a weak preempt, however, all of the Norths in the Semi-finals preempted either two or three diamonds. In every case, a spurious result ensued.

Against Bjerkan and Weinstein, Levitina opened two diamonds. Bjerkan make the seemingly clear-cut takeout double. Weinstein ignored her good five card club suit to bid her moth-eaten four card heart suit. She also ignored her nine highs and a singleton when she chose to bid a non-constructive two hearts. Bjerkan raised to three hearts, and now, of course, Weinstein accepted. The defense was fairly normal and four hearts was defeated two tricks.

At the other table in this match, Glasson opened three diamonds; Palmer doubled; Deas also ignored her good club suit when she bid three hearts. Palmer could go no higher. Similar defense resulted in a one trick set and three IMPs to Dinkin.


In the other match, Wittes opened two diamonds. Gwozdzinsky, apparently feeling unprepared to hear a four card major response, chose to overcall three clubs on a poor five card suit. Quinn threw in the random three spade bid with the

South hand. Lewis, knowing her partner had a good hand with bad clubs, cue bid her singleton spade. Wittes, thinking sacrifice, doubled with her three spades to the eight. This was redoubled and pulled to the final contract of five clubs.

The double of four spades was fatal since Quinn now led a spade instead of the normal diamond. Declarer discarded two diamonds and claimed up five clubs.

We don't have the auction at the other table, but Sutherlin/Mancuso also disdained the ten card club fit and played in four hearts... down FOUR for a loss of 14 IMP's on a hand where the par result is four clubs making 130 East/West.

Maximum Punishment ... the Trouble with Thinking



Poor Bjerkan... She opened one spade and bid game when her partner showed a four card limit raise. There was no opponent bidding ...

The opening lead was the queen of clubs. Realizing that her best chance to avoid four losers would be to pitch a diamond on the fourth round of clubs, she ducked the opening lead!! The defense was brutal. Ace of diamonds, diamond ruff, club ruff, diamond ruff, club ruff ... oops... down three!

At the other table, again with no opposition bidding, Levitina won the opening club lead, drew trumps in two rounds, and when clubs failed to work, led up to the king of diamonds... making four!

14 IMPs to Dinkin.

Even at unfavorable vulnerability, it is hard to picture LHO holding AQT sixth of diamonds and a singleton club. After all, many people would bid over a strong notrump holding the South hand.

Usually you want your partner to think... on this hand, it was a clearly a liability. Too much knowledge is a dangerous thing.

Vugraph

The 2009 USWBC will be covered on BBO Vugraph starting with the Semi-finals. We hope to cover all 4 tables in play in the Semi-finals and both tables in the Finals and Playoffs. To watch the Vugraph online, go to the **BBO website** where you can either log on directly from your browser, go to "Vugraph" and choose which table to watch or download the BBO software to run BBO on your computer. If you choose the latter approach, after downloading, install the software on your computer, log on, follow the directions to become a BBO member and you'll be magically transported to the Lobby of the largest bridge club in the world. Click on the button labeled EXPLORE BRIDGE and then on the button labeled VUG-RAPH THEATRE and you'll be able to choose which of the USWBC matches you want to watch.

There will usually be a "yellow" user on BBO called USBF. If you have general questions, please ask USBF, not one of the hard-working Vugraph Operators, some of whom may prefer not to respond to private messages. Thank you.

Each day's schedule is the same (these are California times; to see the times for your time-zone, go to the **BBO Vugraph** schedule site)

All of the teams will play the same boards, unless one match gets sufficiently far behind that they have to start later than the other match, in which case, for security reasons, they will play different boards.

After a session, you can review the Vugraph action on our Web Vugraphs, which show each hand played with a link to bidding and play records. Take a look at the older events currently available (under Archived Results) to see what we'll have for the 2009 USWBC. Web Vugraphs are posted within about half an hour of completion of the Vugraph show.
