## Esta Van Zandt

(KO #1) M-Tu

Esta Venetia Van Zandt, one of the top players of the Southwest and a two-time North American champion, died April 19, 2008 in Houston. Born in Calcutta, India, Van Zandt was the only child of Seemah and Sam Silliman. She came to the US in 1946 after marrying a young US Air Force navigator, Kenneth Ray Van Zandt. An avid bridge player, she became a Life Master in 1962. She was the first female Grand Life Master in Houston. Her North American titles were the Rockwell Mixed Pairs with Jim Zimmerman and the Chicago Mixed Board-a-Match Teams, both in 1981.

Kay Johnson of Houston was a friend and admirer of Van Zandt. Johnson recalled that Van Zandt made trips with students and friends, even when she was ill. "To Esta, there was family, friends, church and bridge, so there was not much room for anything else." Johnson said, "She was a person who stood out in a crowd. She was a leader and teacher who was dedicated to improvement and enjoyment of the game. In the last days of her life, although bedridden, she would call late at night for the day's results at the Bridge Studio. She wanted the details of all the activities and the interaction of her many friends. We will all miss her and know that she is organizing a game in heaven."


Stephen Drodge and Sean Gannon of the USA2 Junior team bid one level too high to a contract of five spades on this deal from the August World Youth Team Championships in Tai Chang. It took excellent defense to defeat this contract.

Drodge and Gannon's opponents, Pierre Franceschetti, and Nicolas Lhuissier, of France, exhibited fine technique to force an uppercut that allowed Drodge to collect only ten tricks: Pierre led the seven of diamonds to his partner's ace. Nicolas continued with a diamond to Pierre's king. Pierre led a third round of diamonds, Nicolas ruffing with his jack! (Ed note: Not necessary since the seven would have forced the same honor from Drodge... but Lhuissier did not know that for certain.) Drodge was forced to overruff, establishing young Pierre's queen of spades as the setting trick.

In real life, Drodge had no chance at this point. As declarer, however, he was not aware of the position. If he could find now singleton queen with either opponent, or singleton nine on his left, he could come to eleven tricks. This is likely a 2-1 play since there are two singleton queens that make the hand for him and only one singleton nine that does the same. At the table, he went to dummy with a heart and led the ten of spades. This lost to the queen and he was down one.

In the other room, Coudert and Lorenzini bid to game, giving up on the possibility of slam at the four level. Wang led his singleton club in an effort to take four tricks, however, the favorable spade split combined with the long running club suit, produced thirteen tricks for Coudert.

The result: 13 IMPs to France



In the same match, France drew blood again on Board 16. Lhuissier and Franceschetti bid to 3NT while Wang and Wang stopped in a safe 1NT. It is only 14 opposite 9 points and, in reality, 3NT can be defeated on any reasonable lead short of a small club.

The problem is that a small club is so normal!!

At both tables, the auction started out: 1D-P-1H-P-1S-P-1NT... The Wangs, quite reasonably passed it out there, while the French West tried 2H with his K52 of hearts and his singleton club queen. East read this as forward going and jumped to game in NT.

Clearly both auctions scream for a club lead.

Dutifully, both Souths led the six of clubs, fourth from their longest and strongest suit. Unfortunately for them, a low club was the only lead to give declarer his second club trick before the ace of diamonds was disengaged...

And it was the only route to nine tricks.

The result: 10 IMPs to France

In the recent TransNational Mixed Teams in Lille, France, two very experienced pairs of excellent international players took very different views on Board 27. Hemant Lall and Petra Hamman were extremely aggressive on their combined 21 high card points to bid the cold spade slam. Darrin Wolpert and his mother, Hazel, were less aggressive, but still aggressive to bid the 21 point major suit game!

At Hamman's table, Gartaganis led the king of diamonds. Hamman ruffed. She played a heart to dummy to lead the singleton club toward her king. East won the king with the ace and shifted to a trump. Hamman won, played a heart to dummy, pulled the last trump, ruffed a heart and claimed twelve tricks.

At the other table, Wortel led a spade. Wolpert won the king in hand, cashed ace of hearts, king of hearts, and a small heart on which he pitched a low club. Wortel won the heart queen and Wolpert claimed eleven tricks. Wolpert was hoping hearts didn't split so the slam was not cold on a trump lead. Had Wolpert trumped the last heart, he could concede a club and return to dummy with a club ruff to collect all twelve tricks.

The result: 11 IMPs to Hamman/Lall
